

Wiretapping Gets Okay By Senators

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Members of the Senate Judiciary Committee said today they agreed with Atty. Gen. Robert F. Kennedy that new wiretapping legislation is needed to fight increasing Communist espionage activities.

But one, Sen. Kenneth B. Keating, R-N.Y., warned that Congress was not likely to accept the administration's bill until Kennedy backed down from his position that no court order be required for tapping telephone lines of spy suspects.

Proponents of the bill said there was little likelihood Congress would take quick action on wiretap legislation of any kind. Both the Senate and House Judiciary Committees are preoccupied with top priority civil rights bills.

Essentially, the administration bill would permit the government to use information obtained from wiretaps in court. Under present law, wiretapping is permitted but the evidence cannot be used in court.

Kennedy told a news conference Wednesday the Justice Department was "seriously hampered" in anti-espionage activity by lack of laws to permit use of wiretap information as evidence.

The bill also would establish for the first time rigid restrictions on wiretapping. Authorities would have to obtain a court order before tapping lines in the investigation of most federal crimes.

President Plans Holiday

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Kennedy posted a business-as-usual schedule at the White House today but planned to fly to Cape Cod after work for an extended holiday weekend.

The President was scheduled to depart from the executive mansion by helicopter at 4:45 p.m. EDT for Andrews Air Force Base, Md., and a 5 p.m. takeoff aboard his jet transport plane.

His flight to Otis Air Force Base, Mass., is expected to take one hour. He then will proceed 18 miles by helicopter to Hyannis Port, Mass.

Before leaving, however, Kennedy scheduled a day of work at his desk. This included a noon EDT meeting with Labor Secretary W. Willard Wirtz to discuss the threat of a nationwide railroad strike.

The President's wife and two children already are at their rented summer home, Brambletyde, on Squaw Island. This is less than a mile from the home of the President's father, Joseph P. Kennedy, where the helicopter will land.

The elder Kennedy, only partially recovered from the paralytic stroke he suffered in December, 1961, also is at Hyannis Port and the President will visit him during the weekend.

Man Charged In Scandal Wants Sleep

LONDON (UPI) — Stephen Ward, free on bail after 25 days in jail, looked forward today to a rest in the country while awaiting trial on vice charges including living off the earnings of call girls Christine Keller and Marilyn (Mandy) Rice-Davies.

"Sleep, sleep, sleep — that's what I want," the suave, 50-year-old society osteopath and artist said Wednesday night after a magistrate at his pre-trial hearing ordered him to stand trial in Old Bailey Court. He was released on \$8,400 bail.

No date has been set for the trial. Ward's defense attorneys said they would ask for a postponement until September to give them time to prepare the case.

Ward said he hoped to go "off to the country for a complete rest."

He pleaded innocent to the seven vice charges at the final day of the pre-trial hearing. "I deny all the charges completely," he told the magistrate.

Ward has admitted introducing Miss Keeler to War Minister John Profumo, who resigned after conceding he lied to Parliament about his relations with the 21-year-old redhead. She also was intimate with a Soviet assistant naval attaché, Eugene Ivanov, who has been recalled to Moscow.

The charges against Ward allege that:

—Between June 1, 1961, and July 31, 1962, he knowingly lived wholly or partly on the earnings of Miss Keeler and other women.

—Between Sept. 1, 1962, and Dec. 31, 1962, he knowingly lived wholly or partly on the earnings of Miss Rice-Davies and other women.

—On or about June, 1961, he persuaded Miss Keller to procure a girl under 21, identified as "Miss R," for himself.

—On or about Jan. 5, 1963, he attempted to procure a "Miss X" to have intercourse with a third person.

—On or about June 1962, he counseled and procured an abortion for a "Miss X."

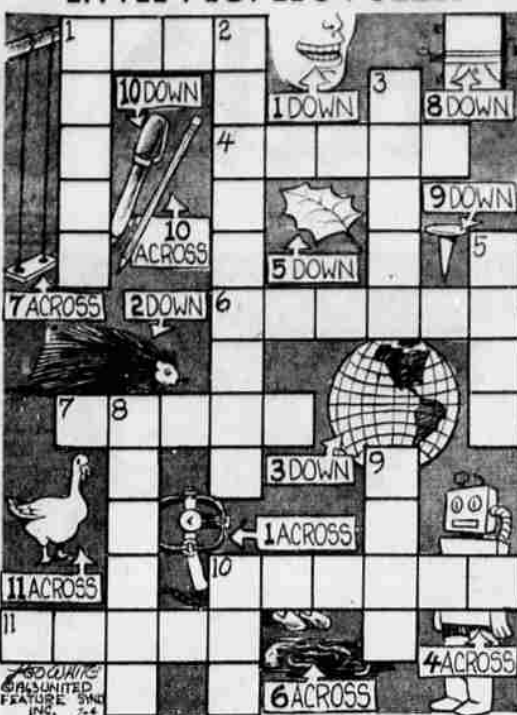
—Helped to procure an abortion for a "Miss N."

—Between Jan. 1, 1963, and June, 1963, he lived wholly or partly on the earnings of prostitution.

The last charge was introduced by the court at the conclusion of the hearing. At the same time, the court dropped two of the charges originally made against Ward—that he conspired to procure girls under 21 years old and that he conspired to keep a brothel.

A Klamath Falls Indian was treated and released by Klamath Valley Hospital after he received stab wounds in the shoulder and face allegedly inflicted by his estranged wife.

William C. Bluecloud, who gave his address as the Marion Apartments, called city police from the Waldorf Cafe at 8:45 p.m. and said his former wife, Maxine, 29, Cozy Hotel, cut him while they were talking in an alley in back of Vern's Tavern.

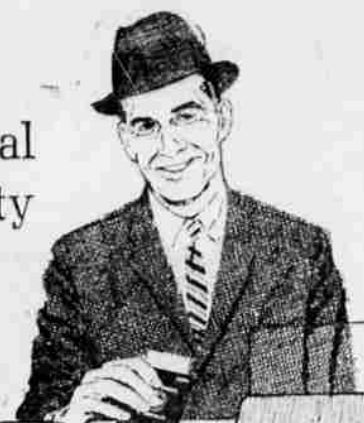
Bluecloud told police he would sign a complaint against Mrs. Bluecloud, but apparently a complaint hadn't been signed as of Tuesday morning.

In relating the details of the incident, the victim told police he met his estranged wife in Vern's and they went outside for a "friendly talk."

He said he told his wife he was going to ride in the rodeo and she said he wasn't going to. Then, Bluecloud said, she started stabbing him. "I tried to be friendly, but she kept on trying to stab me," he said.

Another woman who apparently witnessed the stabbing grabbed Mrs. Bluecloud and Bluecloud.
