This type of information from various parts of the state and from the other states is used in conjunction with surveys in nesting grounds of Canada and Alaska for waterfowl management in the flyway.

Canada Goose Census Reported High

Annually, in the middle of May, local agents of the Oregon State Game Commission and U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service cooperatively census permanent key sample areas of the county to determine the trend in the natural production of Canada geese.

Primary attention is given to the Klamath River, Upper Klamath Lake, Sprague River, the several slumps and lakes of the Basin including Spring, Alkali and Nuss lakes and, until this year, the Klamath Marsh. Census of the Klamath Marsh is now being conducted by federal refuge personnel.

The Klamath Basin is an excellent production area for "honkers" which are of tremendous local value because the birds are usually available for hunting most of the season. Except under very adverse conditions, many birds remain throughout the winter with the Sprague River being especially important.

Nesting is quite early, starting in March with young birds hatched often early in April. In most instances, the hatch will generally be complete by mid-May although exceptions occur. Five to seven eggs may be commonly laid and the young are downy yellow in color. The young grow rapidly and can generally

be found concentrated around pasture lands where grass forms the bulk of the diet. "Baby-sitting" is a common practice and many broods may gather together with one or two adults while the parents are away.

The census this spring of 1,374 young geese is the highest recorded since the start of the count. In 1962, 1,198 young were counted and up until this year, 1961 was the highest at 1,230 young. The Klamath River was the best producer with its highest count of 871 young between Klamath Falls and Keno.

The Sprague River count fell from 144 in 1962 to 90 this year although some late nesting was apparent and the high water this past spring undoubtedly affected nesting. Concentrations of young birds are found on Upper Klamath Lake at Tulana Farms, Wocus Bay and Howard Bay although the latter was also hurt by high water and a break in the dike on a popular nesting area.

Freeway Agreements Get Dunsmuir Council Okay

DUNSMUIR—A council resignation was accepted, a freeway agreement signed, the annual financial report presented, and approval given for acceptance of Mott Airport by Dunsmuir alone, if necessary, at this week's Dunsmuir City Council meeting.

The council accepted the resignation of Richard K. Lachenmyer, who informed the council by letter that he has accepted a position in the Bay Area. Lachenmyer has served on the council since November, 1961, and has been engaged in the men's wear business in Dunsmuir with his father.

The freeway agreement for a traffic interchange in north Dunsmuir, which has been pending for three months, was approved. Councilman Floyd Creason made the approval unanimous by withdrawing his "no" vote after the council agreed to write a letter

to Herbert Miles, district engineer for the state division of highways, listing minor changes, additions, and assurances desired.

Mayor David Anderson refused to delay the decision further as requested by Robert Dewey, chairman of the planning commission, saying, "We have to face the fact that we're in a squeeze, having to share a canyon with a river and a highway. The council learned it had lived within the city's income last year but not within its budget. Dunsmuir's 1962-63 budget was \$174,617; income, \$195,002.27; and expenditures, \$183,609.87. City Clerk Elizabeth Cavin reported that \$26,220.21 in lieu taxes paid the city from motor vehicle license fees kept the city in the black this year. Last year's in lieu tax was \$15,538.22, and this figure was used in estimating the 1962-63 income. Sales tax revenue increased less than \$1,000 over 1961-62.

Councilman Claude Slade recommended that Dunsmuir alone accept Mott Airport as a municipal airport if the city of Mount Shasta does not wish to accept the field as a two-city undertaking. Slade said that L. D. "Babe" Taylor, county tax assessor, has stated the airport, which is to be decided to the two cities from the county, will remain exempt from property taxes.

City Clerk Cavin was instructed to arrange for a meeting with the board of supervisors to arrange acceptance of the airport either jointly with Mount Shasta or as Dunsmuir's sole responsibility.

Government Defends Right To Investigate So-Called Cancer Drug

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The government Wednesday defended its right to investigate the so-called cancer drug krebiozen and in the process revealed some of the information it had uncovered in its investigations.

The disclosures were included in a brief filed in the U. S. District Court in Chicago Wednesday in answer to a suit filed by Steven Durovic, developer of krebiozen. Durovic's suit asked for an order to halt inspections which he claimed constituted harassment by the Food and Drug Administration (FDA).

It also asked for access to reports submitted by federal inspectors who have conducted investigations of krebiozen, for an injunction preventing the inspectors from making any statements discrediting Durovic or krebiozen, and for return of a photograph taken by the inspectors during an

investigation of the Promak Laboratories in Chicago where krebiozen is made.

In Chicago, U.S. District Court Judge Julius Hoffman refused to issue a preliminary injunction against the FDA and dismissed the petition without prejudice. He said the Durovic attorneys were unprepared to argue the case Wednesday and that the issue would therefore have to follow regular court procedure and be heard later this month.

U.S. Asst. Atty. Thomas James said, "I want it understood the government is conducting an investigation and the investigation will continue."

The developers of krebiozen claim it is made from a yellowish-white powder extracted from the blood of a horse. This powder is dissolved in mineral oil and the combination is put into a glass ampule which holds one cubic centimeter.

The government brief said investigators learned that Promak Laboratories had purchased 1 1/2 million ampoules of the type used as containers for the drug. But a check on the number of horses killed indicated Promak Laboratories had received enough powder to fill only about \$22,500 of the ampoules, at the most.

Some of the powder substance was obtained from horses killed in Argentina and some of it from horses at Rockford, Ill. The blood of the horses killed at Rockford was used to prepare two batches of the powder in the Ken-L Ration Division of the Quaker Oats Co. in 1959 and 1960, the brief said. The division makes dog food.

"The conditions of pre-treatment inspection of the horses, of injecting the animals, of selection of animals for bleeding, of bleeding, and of handling the blood and plasma met none of the basic requirements of current good manufacturing practice," the government brief said.

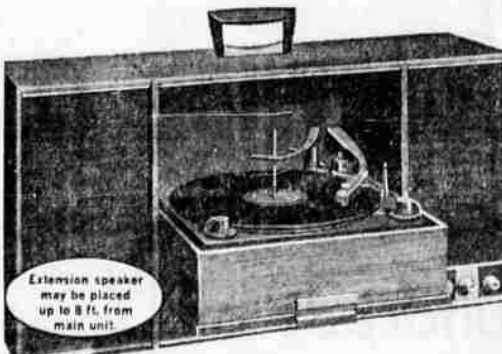
