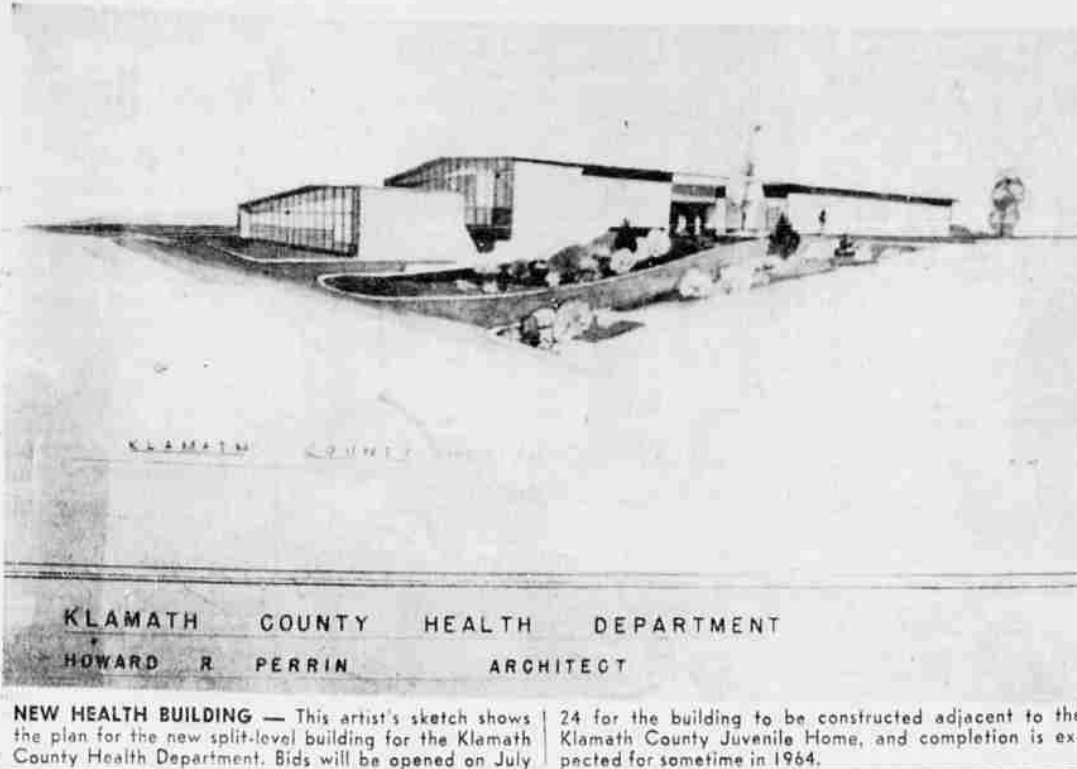

NEW PRODUCTS

NEW YORK (UPI) — Every thing's featuring "spray" these days — from antiseptics and bandages to calking compounds and wood stain.

From Johnson & Johnson, New Brunswick, N. J., comes a new Band-Aid Spray Antiseptic which, it is said, "retains a major germ-fighting activity in the presence of blood, inhibiting the growth of infection-spreading bacteria inside a wound as well as on the surface." Said to be non-toxic, non-staining and non-irritating, the cooling aerosol spray is said to help relieve pain quickly. Although primarily designed for treatment of bleeding injuries it is said to be effective also for cuts, scrapes, burns and non-poisonous insect bites.

Alberto-Culver Co., Melrose Park, Ill., has introduced a new medicated spray bandage. Safe, durable, which forms a durable, flexible plastic coating that can't peel, curl or wrinkle and permits aeration of the wound. The bandage, in an aerosol container, may be removed easily with warm water without pulling away the scab formation of a wound. Said to be stingless, and to provide medication up to 24 hours for cuts, scratches, burns and abrasions, and to relieve itching and pain from insect bites.

A new spray-on wood stain has been introduced by Sears, Roebuck & Co., Chicago, which is said to be ideal for ready-to-finish furniture, especially pieces such as louvered shutters that have surfaces difficult to cover with a wiping stain. It is said even runs in the stain will disappear after 10 to 15 minutes of drying time. Sold under the Master-Mix label, the stain is available in provincial, red maple, cherry, fruitwood, driftwood and walnut finish.

From S. C. Johnson & Son, Inc., Racine, Wis., comes a new Spray-Shine Carma for auto cleaning and polishing. The product, sprayed on a car one section at a time, is spread by cloth with firm circular motions then wiped off with a clean cloth when dry. A car that is only dusty or moderately dirty need not be washed first. The cleaner-polish also is suitable for use on pleasure boats of aluminum, fiber glass or wood.

A different kind of spray, but one that will be welcomed by travelers is General Electric's new portable, spray, steam and dry iron. The new iron features a manual spray attachment for the water bulb and a regular bulb cap for steam ironing. Weighing only 26 ounces, the iron has thermostatically controlled temperature settings, a folding handle and a zipper storage bag.

Economics Show Indicators Of Continued Uphill Climb

State and national economies are showing signs of continuing the uphill climb through 1963, reports M. D. Thomas, Oregon State University extension agricultural economist. Thomas makes his comments in the new Oregon Farm and Market Outlook circular now available from county extension offices.

Consumer, business and government spending are uniting to provide the power to sustain the economy's climb, although the pace may slow some from the rapid rate of the past six months, he writes.

Prospective increases in business activity, along with further gains in population, employment and consumer incomes will lead to increased purchases of food and other farm products this year, Thomas believes.

However, these circumstances do not promise high prices and profits for abundant farm products. Yet they undoubtedly yield larger farm incomes and more off-farm job and investment opportunities than would be the case if the economy were static or declining, he said.

Latest surveys show consumers are still in the mood to buy more new cars than in 1962 and expect to step up purchases of appliances and other household equipment later in the year. Spending for food and accompanying services continues to be high.

Factory orders, especially for durable goods, have been coming in faster than a year earlier with the backlog of unfilled orders holding up despite increased output and unused capacity in some industries. Inventories have

Vowells Buy Early Ranch

MALIN—One of the old landmarks established by an early Malin settler, the 80-acre Jelinek ranch, was recently sold to the Vowells brothers of Langell Valley.

The land was originally purchased in 1909 from the Lake-Side Development Company. At that time it was under drainage and partially covered with tule-lake waters.

Vincent Jelinek Sr., with his family, moved to the ranch in 1910 from Cottonwood, Calif., and farmed with his son, Vincent Jr., until 1935 when he retired and moved into town. Another son, Rudolph, and his wife, Irene, purchased the ranch and farmed it until the sale to the Vowells.

Fund Gets \$22 Million

More than \$22 million dollars has been credited to the General Fund from revenues received from inheritance and gift taxes, interest earnings, and one-half of fines received from district, justice and municipal courts by State Treasurer Howard C. Bolton, during the biennium ending June 30, 1963.

There was \$14,149,390 received from inheritance and gift taxes; \$6,795,940 represented earnings from investments; and \$1,346,902 was remitted to the state treasurer by district, justice and municipal courts representing one-half of various criminal and traffic violations in which the state participates according to Bolton.

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County Asks Split Level Building Bid

Bids for a new split level building to be the headquarters for the Klamath County Health Department are being accepted effective today and will be received by the county court until the opening of bids, 3 p.m., Wednesday, July 24, according to the architect, Howard R. Perrin.

The site for the new building will be adjacent to the County Juvenile Home on Vandenberg Road, near Alameda Avenue. When the structure is completed sometime next year, the Public Health Office will move into the new quarters from its present location at 199 Main Street. The building now occupied by the department will then be offered for sale by the county.

The specifications call for a split level structure consisting of 7,150 square feet of floor area. The upper level will contain office space for the public health officer, nurses, clerical workers and sanitarians, in addition to a treatment room, X-ray room, work and storage rooms, multi-use area, reception and waiting areas, toilet facilities and staff rooms.

The lower level will provide office space for psychiatrists, psychologists and psychiatric social workers. It will also provide for a play room, reception and secretarial spaces, toilets, and a mechanical room. A garage for the staff will be located on the same level.

The bid will also include exterior site work consisting of gravel drives and parking areas, concrete walks, landscape work and fencing.

Bid specifications may be obtained from the Klamath County Court, courthouse, Klamath Falls.

Firm Finds Alder Use

A use for bark of once-spurned alder trees was reported recently by Weyerhaeuser Company.

The company has started production at Longview of a material for making plywood glues go further. The extender, known as Silvabond, was developed from alder bark following intensive research at Weyerhaeuser's Longview laboratories.

Dr. Donald H. Clark of Seattle, secretary-manager of the Northwest Hardwood Association, said the development is the first commercial use of bark from alder, a Pacific Northwest hardwood once considered of little value. Wood of alder is used in production of pulp, fiber, lumber and plywood.

W. H. Meadowcroft, manager of Weyerhaeuser's New Products Division, said the extender passed standard Douglas Fir Plywood Association tests with "excellent results."

Coast Highway Gap Is Bridged

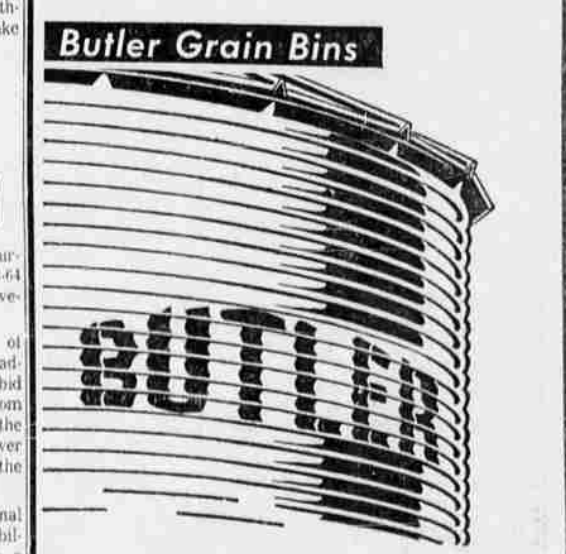
ASTORIA, Ore. (UPI) — The last remaining gap in America's scenic West Coast Highway is being plugged with a bridge now going up over the mouth of the Columbia River.

When it is completed, U. S. Highway 101 will extend from the Mexican border, where it is known as El Camino Real, The King's Highway, to Puget Sound. The two-lane bridge will replace a ferry service between Astoria and Point Ellice, Wash.

The Oregon State Highway Commission awarded a \$10 million contract to the American Bridge Division of the United States Steel Corporation for the structural steelwork of the bridge. The bridge will have a span of nearly 2,500 feet and will be 198 feet above the water.

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
