The Klamath Falls Medo-Bels will be in Scott Valley today to take on the Northern California League's co-leader in a league game, the last one before next weekend's two All-Star games.

Other games find West at Happy Camp, Dunsuirr hosted Mount Shasta Saturday night. The All-Star games are slated next Saturday at 8 p.m. in Dunsuirr and at 2 p.m. Sunday at Weed.

The Medo-Bels will go for their fourth victory in six games today. They presently are tied in second with Dunsuirr, each with 3-2 records. Scott Valley is 4-1 as is Weed.

A victory over Scott Valley would bring the Medo-Bels nearer the league lead with about half the season gone.

Probable starter on the hill today for the Medo-Bels will be Blake Griggs, one of the All-Star choices. Dave Saks will be behind the plate and he is another All-Star choice. Dean Dunson will be at first, Dave Sigard at second, Sherm Allen at short, Don Dexter at third, Don Gredsel, another Star pick, Ray Taylor, the fourth Star pick, and probably Ron Owings as the outfielders.

Scott Valley probably will go with Jiggs Sage on the mound. He beat the Medo-Bels in the first league game of the season under the lights. Other Scott Valley stars include two of the league's top hitters, Al McIntyre and Ed Lapeyre. All three are on the All-Star team along with Ernie Bingham.

German Decisions W. Bethea

BERLIN (UPI) — Leading German heavyweight boxer Karl Mildenberger Saturday outpointed Wayne Bethea of New York in their 10-round bout at West Berlin's Deutschland Halle.

It was Mildenberger's second victory over the New Yorker, whom he outclassed in another 10-round bout two years ago. There were no knockdowns in the fast-moving match but Bethea looked worn out in the last round.

Betha, who knocked out Olympic heavyweight champion Franco de Piccoli in Italy and held European 110-pound-heavyweight champ Giulio Rainaldi and Italian heavyweight champion Santo Amonti to a draw, is ranked 10th in the Ring Magazine ratings. It was Mildenberger's 17th victory in 40 bouts, and he was reported to have hopes of getting a shot at the European heavyweight title.

Al Dark Wants To Win, Houk To Play Everyone

CLEVELAND (UPI) — Alvin Dark can go for broke if he likes, but Ralph Houk said Saturday he's more concerned with "giving everyone a chance to play" in Tuesday's 34th All-Star game.

Dark, who will handle the National League, has made it clear that winning the game is paramount with him.

"The starting line-up will play most of the game," said the San Francisco manager, "and the chances are Willie Mays and Hank Aaron will play all the way in the outfield."

Houk, managing the American League, has the second straight year and on the scene here already because his Yankees wind up a four-game series with the Indians Sunday, is as anxious to win as Dark but claims there are other factors to be considered.

"When you get right down to it, there isn't too much difference between one All-Star player and

another," Houk added. "Ordinarily, a manager doesn't hurt himself too much by taking one player out and putting another one in. I like to give everyone a chance if it's at all possible."

AL Holds Edge

The American League holds a 17-15 edge in the All-Star series with one game having ended in a tie, and Houk laughingly points out, "I'm 500 so far."

He means he has won one and lost one as an All-Star manager. Under his direction, the AL All-Stars lost last year's first game at Washington 3-1, but won the second contest at Chicago 9-4.

This year there will be only one All-Star game, instead of two as has been the practice since 1939, and the majority of players are happy to go back to the old arrangement.

Houk and Dark both have a common problem — which pitcher to name as starter for Tuesday's game?

"It all depends on who pitches over the weekend," Houk said. "You can't very well ask pitcher to start with only a day or two of rest."

Leans Toward Bunning

Nevertheless, Houk seemed to be leaning toward right-hander Jim Bunning of Detroit as his starter while Dark was expected to name Dodger southpaw Sandy Koufax.

Bunning has pitched brilliantly in the five All-Star games he has been in, having allowed only four hits in a total of 12 innings while hurling scoreless ball in four of his five appearances. Houk also wants a right-hander in there for the first three innings anyway, because six of the NL's eight starters are right-handed batters.

In his anxiety to win, Dark most likely will call on the 27-year-old Koufax, probably the finest pitcher in the National League with seven shutouts among his 13 victories.

Doug Ford Captures First In Canadian Open Tourney

TORONTO, Ont. (UPI) — Veteran Doug Ford of New York birdied the 17th hole with a 16-foot putt Saturday for a one-under-par 70 and a one-stroke victory in the \$50,000 Canadian Open Golf championship.

Ford, the 1959 champion, came home with a four-under-par 280 for 72 holes as fellow American pro Al Geiger sat in the clubhouse and waited with a 281 after shooting a final round six-under-65, the best score of the tournament.

Ford led by two strokes going into Saturday's round but bogeyed three holes and birdied three holes and birdied three after 13. He then bogeyed the 14th to fall into a tie with Geiger.

But Geiger's chances disappeared when Ford sank a 16-footer on the 17th hole and just missed a bird on the 18th when his four footer rimmed the cup. The 40-year-old Ford captured \$9,000 first place money with his first tournament victory of the year.

Geiger earned \$4,000 for his second-place finish. Three play-

ers, George Bayer, Fred Hawkins and Bruce Crampton, tied for third at 282. Bob Rosburg was alone in fourth at 283 and three were grouped at even par 284: Canadian George Knudson, Herman Keiser and Dan Keefe.

Ford had held a two-stroke lead over Keiser and Jack Fleck going into the final round but Keiser went one over with a 72 and Fleck fell back with a 75 over the rugged par 71, 6,730-yard Scarboro course.

It was the highest winning total since Pat Fletcher's 280 in 1934 and gave proof that the layout was one of the most difficult in Canadian Open history.

KBAA Announces Summer Slate For Track Program In Area

The Klamath Basin Athletic Association, idle for a few weeks because the last big track meet and the recent holiday, will swing back into action this week according to KBAA president George Demetras.

The KBAA tentatively has scheduled an All-Corners meet at Modoc Field for July 27. Also, tentatively, the best competitors will go to the Emerald Empire Athletic Association (EEAA) meet on Aug. 10-11 in Eugene.

Those wishing to start getting into form for the big meets may begin preparation Tuesday at Modoc Field. The KBAA will have meets on Tuesdays and Thursdays now with only a certain number and predetermined events each of these days.

The meets begin Tuesday, for example, with the 60-yard dash, 100-yard dash and 220-yard

dash. The 60-yard dash will be for both boys and girls in the following brackets: Boys, 6 and under, 7-8, 9-10, and 11-12. The girls brackets will be 5-8, 9-10.

The 100-yard dash will be open to girls only 11 years old and older. The boys' divisions will be 13-14, 15-16, and 17 and over. The 220-yard dash will be for all the above age groups.

Thursday's events will be run off will include the high jump and broad jump of all the above mentioned age groups, providing the pits can be refilled soon enough and they are expected to be ready.

These meets will be meets in which only one or two events will be run, but for boys and girls in all age brackets to give all a chance to work on them. It also may serve to stimulate interest in some event which participants thought they cared nothing about.

The meets will begin Tuesdays and Thursdays, beginning at 5:30 each day for the duration of the summer. The events will be planned week by week by the KBAA.

All winners will set records for their age groups and there will be ribbons awarded to the first five place winners at the end of the summer program. The first round's winner may not necessarily have the top time or mark at the end of the summer program.

It presently is planned for these top participants to journey to Eugene Aug. 9-10 to enter the EEAA's big meet if it can be arranged. The KBAA presently is working on it and the information will be in this paper's sport section as soon as it is confirmed.

Those entering do not necessarily have to be champion track stars to enter these meets.

Hawks, Falcons, Gems Play Today

The Klamath Falls Falcons, picking up steam in the Southern Division American Legion race, took over undisputed lead of the league Saturday night with a 6-1 win over Grants Pass behind the wild but effective burling of Gary Benson.

McGuire Leads Fem Meet

DAYTON (UPI) — Two double winners marked the competition Saturday night in the 1963 National Women's AAU track and field championships in which the contestants battled for a trip to Russia.

Sharon Sheppard of Cleveland and Edith McGuire of Tennessee State swept to double victories with eight of the 15 events completed. The competition also saw two sisters score victories in what was believed to be an unprecedented feat in women's AAU meets.

The first and second place finishers in most of the events qualified for the trip to Russia to compete later this year. In two events, the 220-yard hurdles and the 440-yard run, the winners and runnersup will compete in different events.

Miss McGuire of Tennessee State won the 100-yard dash in 11 seconds flat, nipping her teammate Wyoma Tyus at the line. Miss McGuire also took first place in the broad jump with a leap of 19 feet, 4 1/2 inches.

Miss Sheppard, a 22-year-old school teacher and a Pan-American Games veteran, won the four kilometer shotput with a heave of 48 feet, 8 inches and also took the discus with a distance of 150 feet, 6 inches.

The sisters qualifying for the European trip were Sandra and Suzanne Knott of Columbus, who competed for different teams. Sandra, 25, won the 800-yard run and Sue, 19, took first in the 440-yard dash in 57 seconds, which tied the American record for the event.

Sue Knott's feat of tying the American record was the only standard to be in danger. However, Rosie Bonds of Los Angeles tied the 80-meter hurdles mark in the time trials but was two seconds off the record in the finals.

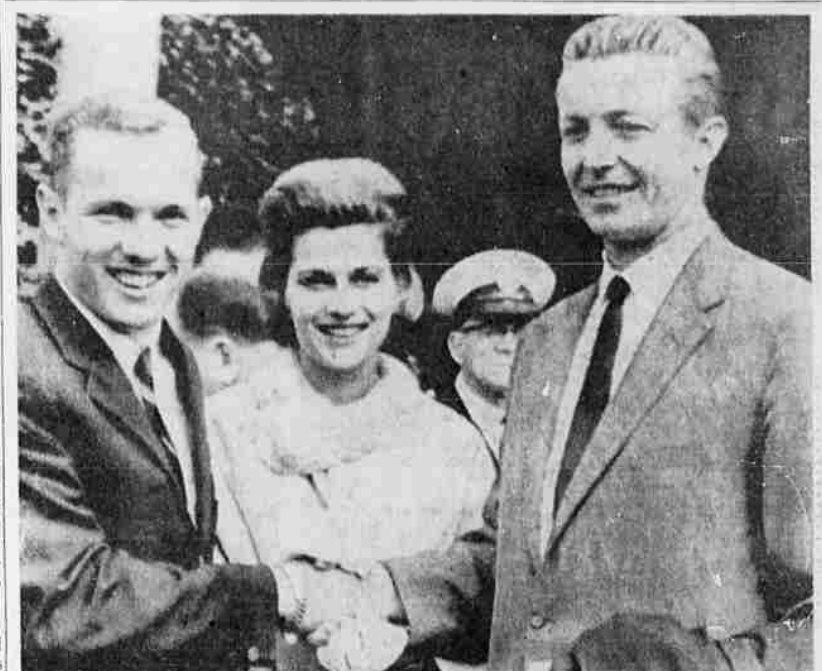

Rains Postpone Wimbledon Tournament Women's Finals

WIMBLEDON, England (UPI) — Heavy rains Saturday postponed until Monday the Wimbledon women's tennis final between American "unset queen" Billie Jean Moffitt and heavily-favored Australian Margaret Smith, but Miss Moffitt refused to let the delay get on her nerves.

It was the first time in 27 years and only the third time in the 77-year history of the famed tournament that play has not been completed within the scheduled two weeks.

The officials tried their best to get in at least the Moffitt-Smith match as a crowd of 17,000 waited despite the downpour at the

courts of the All-England Club. As hour after hour passed with no let-up in the rain, many in the crowd became convinced there would be no action and went home.

Miss Moffitt, 19-year-old bespectacled student at Los Angeles State College, refused to become upset either by the delay or by the fact that English bookies consider the top-seeded Miss Smith such an overwhelming favorite that they won't even quote a price on her. Miss Moffitt is rated at 3 to 2.

But Billie Jean, who has become the darling of the galleries as a result of three straight wins

over star players, was calm and cool as she posed for photographs. She said the weather didn't bother her "in the least."

Asked if she were nervous, she said, "No—should I be?"

Will she win? "I'll have a good try."

The final round of men's doubles will send Mexico's Rafael Osuna and Antonio Palafox against France's Claude Barclay and Pierre Darmon.

The men's singles title was won Friday by Chuck McKinley of San Antonio, Tex., who beat unseeded Fred Stolle of Australia, 6-7, 6-1, 6-4, to become the first native American to win the men's crown here in eight years.

Whatever the result of Monday's match, it will be a "first" for this historic tournament. If Miss Moffitt can confound Miss Smith, the seedings committee, and the bookies all in one swoop by scoring what would be a stunning upset, she will be the first unseeded women's champion. If Miss Smith wins, she will be the first Australian woman to win a Wimbledon singles crown—although Aussie men have been dominating their division in recent years.

Miss Smith has a score to settle with Miss Moffitt in this tournament. Last year, Billie Jean made Margaret a victim of one of her patented surprises, beating the Aussie star in an early round.

Miss Smith also has her eye on a "hat trick" of championships. She also is in the final round of two doubles competitions — with Robyn Ebbern of Australia against Darlene Hard of Los Angeles and Maria Bueno of Brazil in women's doubles, and with Ken Fletcher of Australia against Miss Hard and Bob Hewitt of Australia in mixed doubles.

The Moffitt-Smith match had been scheduled as the first Saturday with the three doubles finals to follow. Among those disappointed by the postponement were a large group of French fans who came to root for the unseeded Barclay-Darmon team, first French pair to reach a Wimbledon final since 1934.
