The locals tallied 87 points in the meet to Bend's winning 223 and Lakeview's second place 211 points.

There were five first place winners among the Klamath swimmers. Jerry Kramer, the captain of the team, was the winner in the 105-yard backstroke in 1:14.3. He also was second in the 105-yard freestyle in 1:02 and second in the 140-yard individual medley in 47 flat. He swam in the senior boys' division.

Mike Hadlock was first in the boys' 8 and under class in the 35-yard freestyle in 31.6. He was second in the backstroke, also.

The third first place went to Holly Winterhalter in the girls' 9-10-year-old class. She won the 35-yard breaststroke. She was also second in the 35-yard freestyle in a fine 26 seconds flat. The 35-yard backstroke found her second in 33 flat.

Mike Linville was third in the 105-yard breaststroke in 1:31 flat in the senior boys' division. Chester Aubrey was third in the senior boys' butterfly. The mixed relay team was second in the 140-yard mixed relay with Jerry Kramer,

In 1962, she won both the Englewood, N.J. Golf Club Championship and the North-South Winter Tournament in Miami.

She was recently the low amateur in the LPGA Garval Ladies Open at Long Island and tied for sixth place in the Eastern Ladies Amateur.

Tittle Signs Two-Year Pact

NEW YORK (UPI) — Y. A. Tittle, the 35-year-old veteran quarterback of the New York Giants, has signed a two-year contract with the National Football League's Eastern Division champions, thereby squelching rumors he planned to retire after the 1963 season.

Tittle, whose career spans 16 pro campaigns, led the Giants to divisional titles in 1961 and 1962. He established a new NFL record by throwing 33 touchdown passes in a single season, and tied another by completing seven scoring tosses in a single game last year.

A resident of Atherton, Calif., Tittle was traded to the Giants by the San Francisco 49ers prior to the 1961 season.

McCovey's Home Run Leads Giants By Faltering Cards

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI)—Willie McCovey smashed a tie-breaking two-run shot over the right-field fence to give the San Francisco Giants a 5-3 victory over the St. Louis Cardinals Saturday and hand them their seventh straight loss.

It was the fourth consecutive game in which McCovey has hit a home run.

The blow, McCovey's 22nd of the season and eighth of the campaign against left-handed pitching, came in the seventh inning with two out at the expense of Ray Sadecki.

As a result, the Giants regained second place in the National League race.

Southpaw Billy Pierce, now 3-5 for the season, limited the Cardinals to four hits and singled to open the seventh. Then after Sadecki retired the next two batters, McCovey unloaded.

Two of the hits off Pierce were bases-empty home runs by Charlie James who pulled the Cardinals back into a tie on each occasion.

Pierce struck out three and did not allow a walk in besting the Cardinals for the first time this year after losing to them twice.

Kamalii Setting Yacht Race Pace

LOS ANGELES (UPI)—The 73-foot ketch Kamalii set the pace Saturday in the 2,225-mile biennial Transpacific yacht race to Honolulu, but the Ticonderoga, Audacious and Ichiban were giving close competition.

The Kamalii, owned by oil magnate Edward L. Doheny III of Los Angeles, gave its position as 169 miles at sea Saturday while Bob Johnson's 74-foot ketch, Ticonderoga, was 162 miles out. Baldwin M. Baldwin's Audacious was 160 miles and the 50-foot sloop Ichiban owned by George Sturgis was 157.

On a handicap basis, the class D 40-foot sloop Islander, owned by Thomas C. Cockett of Balboa, was the leader, followed by Marie, another class D sloop, owned by Milton Smith of Los Angeles.

Saturday's sailing was marked by light winds and a heavy overcast with occasional drizzle after early morning choppy seas with fairly strong winds.

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI) — Angry phone callers who demanded to know why Willie McCovey, the San Francisco Giants' top home run hitter, was taken out of a punch-hitter in Friday night's game against St. Louis had their answer Saturday from manager Alvin Dark.

"Willie is hitting great against left-handers this season, but Bob Shantz of the Cardinals isn't one of them," Dark said. "So I put in Orlando Cepeda, who hits right-handed, to face Shantz."

The switch was made in the ninth inning after manager Johnny Keane of the Cards brought in the veteran southpaw to face McCovey with the bases full, the score tied and one out.

Dark then called McCovey back to the bench and the Giants' scoreboard was swamped with phone calls, according to a park employee, after Cepeda fanned.

"Shantz is tough on left-handed hitters," Dark said. "He also struck out Ed Bailey to end that inning. The Giants won in the 11th."

McCovey, back in the lineup Saturday, hit a two-run homer off left-handed pitcher Ray Sadecki for a 5-3 win over the Cardinals. He now has 22 home runs this year, eight against southpaws.

Paul Richards' Pact Extended

HOUSTON (UPI) — Paul Richards' contract as general manager of the Houston Colts has been extended six years through 1970.

Ray Hotheim, president of the National League team, announced Saturday.

No figures were announced, but Richards' contract was understood to be in the \$50,000-plus category.

Richards joined the new Houston club in Sept. 4, 1961, after serving as field manager at Baltimore.

The new contract represented a vote of confidence in Richards' efforts to build the Houston club with young talent. The announcement dispelled rumors that Richards was considering leaving the club in view of a long losing streak.

Pop Fly Lost In Sun Costs Dodgers Contest

LOS ANGELES (UPI) — A pop fly lost in the sun by second baseman Jim Gilliam enabled Cincinnati runners to scamper home and give the Reds a 3-1 victory Saturday over the National League-leading Los Angeles Dodgers.

Righthander Jim Maloney, mixing changeup curves liberally with his fast ball, won his 13th game of the year against only three defeats. He allowed seven hits and struck out five batters.

Gilliam lost Gordy Coleman's high pop in the bright hazy sky with two outs in the fourth inning. Bob Skinner and Vada Pinson, who had successive singles and advanced to third and second on an infield out, both scored on the lost pop fly. Coleman went sliding into second base as the ball dropped five feet behind Gilliam.

Nor-Cal League Picks Stars

The Northern California All-Star teams have been chosen for the two All-Star games next week according to Bill Hatfield, league president.

The teams were announced Saturday with each of the six teams getting four players named to the teams. The halves of the league were divided to put co-leading Scott Valley, the Klamath Medo-Bels and Happy Camp in the North Division with Weed, Dunsmuir and Mount Shasta to make up the South Star team.

Losing pitcher Don Drysdale's record was evened at 10-10. He gave up six hits in eight innings. The third Cincinnati run came in the eighth when Skinner drove in Pete Rose from second base after Rose advanced on a passed ball.

Maury Wills was safe on a hunt to lead off a wild Dodger sixth inning. Wills was in a tumbling, three-way collision at first base with Maloney and umpire Chris Pelekoudas.

Ivan Young of Dunsmuir will manage the South Stars and Dale Evans of Scott Valley will handle the Yankees of the North.

Klamath's Medo-Bels placed Blake Griggs in a pitching spot, Dave Saks in a catcher's position, Don Gressel and Ray Taylor in the outfield. Griggs also plays the outfield and Gressel switches off at first.

Scott Valley's co-leading team put two of the leading hitters in the league on the team in Al McIntyre, the leader with a .561 mean, and Ed Lapeyre, third, with a .435 mark. The other two are pitcher Jiggs Sage, one of the best in the league, and Ernie Bingham, an infielder-outfielder.

Weed placed a pitcher in Dave Lemos, outfielder in Dick Battistessa, a catcher in Roger Pauletto and an infielder in Elvy Mazzoni. Battistessa is the second leading hitter in the league at .555. Mazzoni carries a .380 mark.

Dunsmuir put two infielders in Beane Hisey and Ken Moore on the South team along with pitcher Bill Marske and outfielder Dave Fischer. Hisey has a .375 mark and Fischer a .368 mean. Marske is another tie hurler.

The first All-Star game will be Saturday night at Dunsmuir and the second at Weed in the afternoon.

Tigers Get Fifth Win Straight

DETROIT (UPI) — The ninth place Detroit Tigers reeled off their fifth straight victory Saturday, hanging out 12 hits including Norm Cash's three-run homer and a solo homer by Rocky Colavito to down the Kansas City Athletics 8-4.

Detroit, playing without All Star rightfielder Al Kaline, who was sidelined with a pulled leg muscle but is expected to play Sunday, fell behind 2-0 in the top of the third.

But Cash slammed his 12th homer into the left-centerfield seats after Gates Brown singled and Rocky Colavito doubled to put Detroit ahead 3-2.

Foss Tells Exhibition Slate For American Loop

NEW YORK (UPI)—Joe Foss, commissioner of the American Football League, Saturday announced the dates of 19 pre-season games involving the AFL's eight clubs.

Such widely separated cities as Shreveport, La., Lowell, Mass., Mobile, Ala., New Brunswick, N.J., Seattle, Wash., Winston-Salem, N.C., and Wichita, Kan., will be game sites in addition to

all league cities with the exception of New York and Boston.

The exhibition schedule, which will provide the big test for the league's rookies, will be highlighted by the Kansas City-Houston game in Wichita on Saturday evening, Aug. 31. This contest will mark the first renewal of this rivalry since the Chiefs, formerly the Dallas Texans, captured the AFL title in the longest football game in history (77 minutes, 34 seconds).
