

'Stop Goldwater' Movement Gets Underway

The draft-Goldwater movement has taken off, and the stop-Goldwater movement is revving up to fly.

Thursday night at the National Guard Armory in Washington, D. C., took place the National Draft Goldwater Independence Day Rally (NDGIDR). This was a flamboyant notice to Sen. Barry Goldwater, R-Ariz., that the nucleus of a political organization is developing to obtain his nomination for president.

The stop-Goldwater movement is less evident. It is in the works, however. It is a rule of politics that when one individual becomes a front runner, all others gang up on him. Another well known rule of politics is that you cannot beat somebody with nobody. That is to say, if you want to withhold the convention delegation of Pennsylvania, for example, from Senator (A), then you should offer some other individual to whom the delegation may be committed, if only for a short time.

Thus it was that Pennsylvania's Gov. William W. Scranton said last month that he may be his state's favorite son candidate for the 1964 Republican presidential nomination. A favorite son gives convention delegates a temporary place to roost and a strong point from which to bargain before committing themselves to a major candidate for the presidential nomination.

Four Possibilities
Scranton cannot be brushed off, however, as a minor candidate. Republican National Chairman William E. Miller recently listed Scranton, Goldwater, Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller of New York and Michigan's Gov. George Romney as the four men among whom his party will find its 1964 presidential nominee.

It follows that Romney and Rockefeller will be pressured openly to join the stop-Goldwater movement. Rockefeller already is in and coming on his own account, although not publicly committed. Romney is coy but is likely, at the least, to be Michigan's favorite son candidate next year. The stoppers will need others. They will look among states with Republican governors or U.S. senators, but not among all of those states.

Recently from Denver it was reported that Colorado Republicans were organizing a western bloc of convention delegates around the favorite son candidacy of Sen. Gordon L. Allott, R-Colo. This was interpreted as a maneuver to consolidate Goldwater's Mountain States strength. The stoppers, in turn, undoubtedly will seek to enlist California. The governor there is a Democrat, but one senator, Thomas H. Kuchel, is a Republican. Kuchel probably would feel at home in a stop-Goldwater operation.

Gains In Polls
Polls indicate that Rockefeller's renomination to a divorced woman flipped Goldwater ahead. There have been various polls in recent weeks, all of them reflecting an upsurge of Goldwater strength. Sentiment at recent Republican gatherings seemed to concede Goldwater's steadily increasing prestige.

The Republican National Committee met recently in Denver. Some headlines over the Denver story:

Washington, D.C. Post: G.O.P. strategists see Goldwater far ahead.

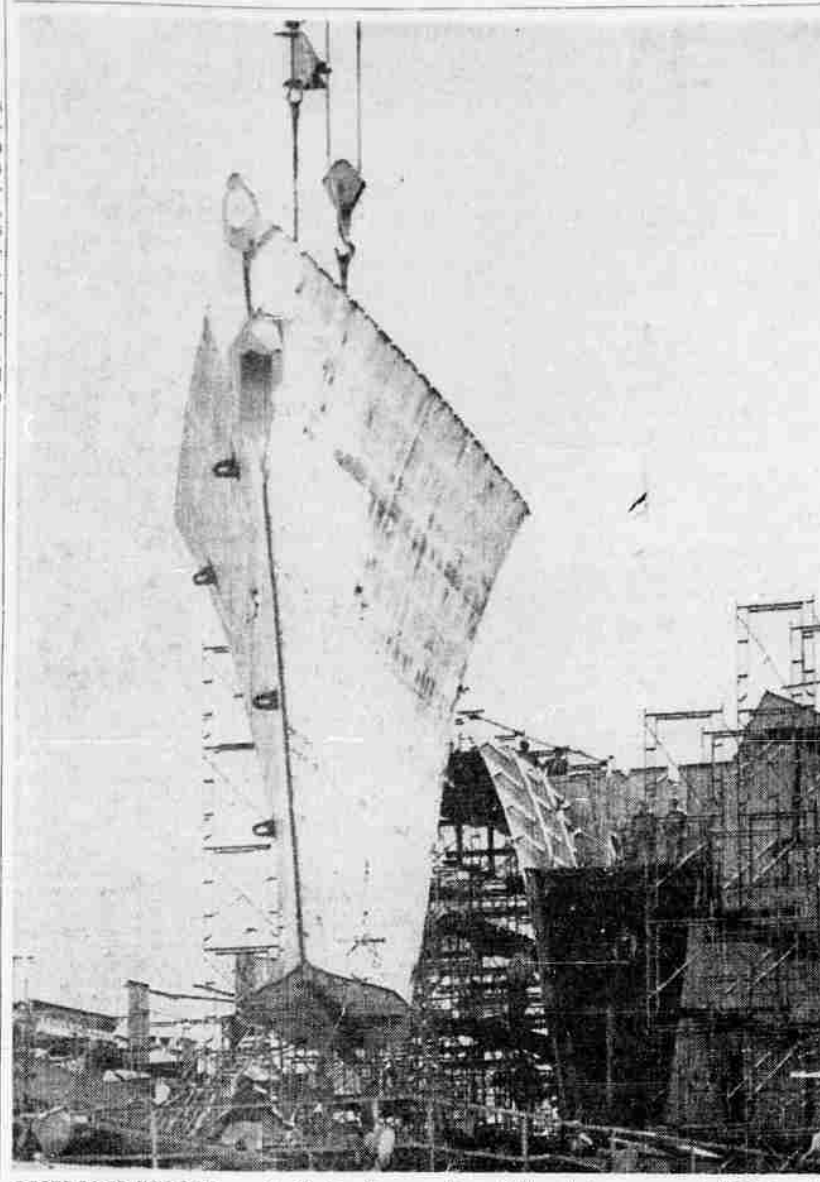
New York Times: Goldwater stock rising among GOP leaders. Scripps-Howard Washington, D.C. News: Goldwater holds lead over Rocky.

The equally well-edited National Observer thereafter canvassed the Goldwater situation and reported: Goldwater boom rocks the ranks but pros are cautious. Goldwater himself wants to know more about the boom and draft in his behalf before committing himself to run.

Teen-Agers Increase Jobless

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The government reported Friday that unemployment increased 800,000 to 4,600,000 million in June, with teen-agers accounting for all of the increase.

At the same time, the Labor Department's Bureau of Labor Statistics announced that total employment in the country climbed to over 70 million for the first time in the nation's history.

Labor Secretary W. Willard Wirtz said the new employment mark, "on the face of it, seems like a good record." But he said the nation should take note of the fact that unemployment was 1.3 million higher than June, 1948.

The seasonally adjusted unemployment rate for June was 5.7 per cent, same as in April, before the teen-age influx began. The rate had been 5.9 per cent in May and 5.5 per cent in June, 1962.

70-Year-Old Off To Sea

LIMA, Peru (UPI)—William Willis, 70, of New York, headed his wood-and-steel raft out into the Humboldt Current Friday on a 13,000-mile voyage to Australia.

Willis, with only two cats for company, hoped to make the voyage in three or four months. He sailed a similar raft to Samoa by himself in 1954 in 115 days.

A naval tug towed Willis' "Age Unlimited" out of Puerto Callao Naval Base Thursday as a crowd of Americans and Peruvians watched under cold and cloudy skies.

Willis said goodbye to his wife, Teddy, 61, and stepped aboard the 32-by-23 foot raft made of steel pontoons joined by a steel frame and topped by a wooden deck, a small wooden cabin and their eyes, mincing along as they go.

Control Over Urban Sprawl Asked

During a recent Senate debate on Housing legislation, Sen. Clifford P. Case, R-N.J., pleaded for new controls over "urban sprawl" which leaves no open space between developments.

To bolster his argument, he read from the Bible a warning voiced 2,700 years ago by the prophet Isaiah:

"Woe to those who join house to house,
"Who add field to field,
"Until there is no more room..."

That Isaiah is still being quoted in legislative assemblies, after 27 centuries, will come as no surprise to anyone who is familiar with the Old Testament book which bears his name.

Isaiah was one of the greatest of the Hebrew prophets. He spoke passionately about the problems of his own time and place. But his generation had much in common with our own, and many of his sermons might have been preached to the American congregation of the year 1963.

Isaiah poured out his message to the children of Israel for a period of about 40 years, beginning around 740 B.C. This was a time when the kingdom of Judah was under constant threat of attack by a ruthless aggressor, the Assyrian empire.

People Were Faithful
It was a time when people were very punctilious about keeping up the external appearances of religious devotion. They kept all of the feasts and were faithful in their attendance at solemn assemblies.

Beneath this superficial piety, however, Isaiah saw a spreading moral rot.

There were grave social injustices in the land. But the people who controlled the power structures of society were not doing very much to correct them. In fact, some were trying to perpetuate oppressions.

Although the nation was enjoying economic prosperity, there were vast numbers of poor people who did not share in it. The well-fed weren't concerned about them; they were solely interested in piling up more luxuries for themselves.

To escape from anxiety about the international situation, or out of boredom, many of the "best" people had begun to drink heavily, and to engage in promiscuous sexual adventures.

It was to this people that Isaiah spoke. And he made clear that the warnings were not his own, but the words of the Lord.

Contempt For Lip Service
Isaiah said God had only contempt for a people who "honor me with their lips, while their hearts are far from me."

"Hear the word of the Lord," he cried.

"Bring me no more vain offerings; your incense is an abomination to me.
"Your solemn assemblies and your appointed feasts, my soul hates; they have become a burden to me.
"Even though you make many prayers, I will not listen while your hands are full of blood.
"But wash yourselves; make yourselves clean; remove the evil of your doings from before my eyes;
"Cease to do evil, learn to do good,
"Seek justice, correct oppression, defend the fatherless, support the widow."

"Hear the word of the Lord," Isaiah cried to the rulers and people of his day.

"The Lord of Hosts says... I will turn my hand against you, and will smelt away your dross as with lyte.

"And remove all of your alloy...
"Zion shall be redeemed by justice
"And those in her who repent, by righteousness.
"But rebels and sinners shall be destroyed together,
"And those who forsake the Lord shall be consumed."

Representing the cherry growers of Washington and Oregon, Miss Hattenhauer will be touring the two states for the next two weeks to familiarize the public with the new strain.

She plans to enroll at Oregon State University next fall.

The cherries the governor received Wednesday were the first of the new strain to be distributed outside the experimental laboratories.

"This is a cross between a Bing and a Lambert, ripens earlier and is said to be larger and more favorable than the regular varieties."

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
