Kennedy Italy Visit May Be Political Aid

ROME (UPI) — President Kennedy's visit to Italy may be a factor in stabilizing this country's domestic politics for the present. The President certainly would reject any suggestion he came here to meddle in Italian internal affairs. However, it is an inescapable conclusion that Kennedy's West European swing lessened Italian Socialist opposition to cooperation with the pro-Western Christian Democrats in maintaining a stable government.

The Socialists so far have refused to join Prime Minister Giovanni Leone's Christian Democrats in the government but are expected to permit it to survive.

The Senate Friday night voted 139-110 to support Leone's government. The chamber of deputies is expected to follow through this week with a similar vote of confidence for Leone who has promised to step down in the fall after leading the government through the summer months.

During the President's trip to Italy the Socialists were impressed by two things.

— Kennedy's "strategy for peace," holding out the olive branch to the Kremlin.

— The President's special effort to talk with Socialist leader Pietro Nenni at the quinquennial reception Monday night.

The Socialist newspaper Avanti gave prominent display to this, declaring the Kennedy-Nenni talk was "cordial." The item was bannered in Avanti, although it gave no details of the conversation.

But Avanti noted with pleasure the 15-minute talk was the longest Kennedy held with anyone that evening and appeared to on-lookers to be giving rapid attention to Nenni's remarks.

If the United States follows through strongly in the direction of a "strategy for peace," Nenni probably will be able to pull his followers back into the government—or at least into support of the government.

This would be a big plus for the West and vindicate Kennedy's judgment that the European trip was vital, despite criticism from some quarters at home and abroad.

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TV Producer Among Five Killed In Crash Of Plane

SAN DIEGO, Calif. (UPI) — Four men, including a prize-winning television producer and two Douglas aircraft engineers, have been killed in a small plane crash in Mexico, U.S. customs officials reported Saturday.

It was reported that the fourth victim was a World War II pilot with the Royal Air Force who twice survived being shot down in combat, but this was not confirmed.

The four met death Thursday when their single engine light plane, a Beechcraft Bonanza, crashed shortly after takeoff from the airport at the Baja California fishing resort of Mulege, 500 miles south of the U.S.-Mexico border.

Customs officers listed the dead as:

- George (Ty) Thyssen, 42, Woodland Hills, Calif., pilot of the plane and winner of the 1963 Grand Prix of the Cannes Film Festival for the best television commercial.
- Charles Harold Vallance, 42, Canoga Park, a design engineer for Douglas.
- Allen Charles Darrow, 32, Canoga Park, a computing engineer for Douglas.
- And Harold S. Wilhelm, other.

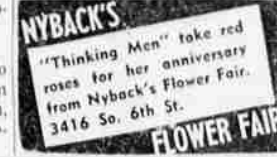
The four bodies were flown here by Francisco Munoz, of nearby Tijuana, Calif.

Jerry T. Hawk, 37, Inglewood, Calif., who said he declined an invitation to go on the ill-fated flight, said he understood the fourth victim's name was either Harold S. Wilhelm or Harold Blom, Monterey.

"It could be either...I was told both were at Mulege," Hawk said.

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
