

Disgruntled Tourists Take Off

NEW YORK (UPI) — Twenty-nine disgruntled California tourists flew off to Europe Thursday at their own expense, having been stranded here for most of the week in a dispute with a travel agency.

The group was the last of the original 101 persons involved in the mixup of charter flight arrangements. They flew to London and Paris.

The Civil Aeronautics Board (CAB) gave Air France approval to fly the tourists under a special group rate. Fourteen of the original group cancelled their reservations at the height of the imbroglio and 58 others managed to obtain flights earlier last week.

California Atty. Gen. Stanley Mosk is investigating the World Travel Center of Palo Alto, which booked the charter flight to Europe through Intercontinental U.S. Airlines.

The airline cancelled the charter trip after the Californians arrived at Idlewild Airport here, claiming the tourist group did not qualify for the reduced rate of \$300 round-trip from Oakland to Europe.

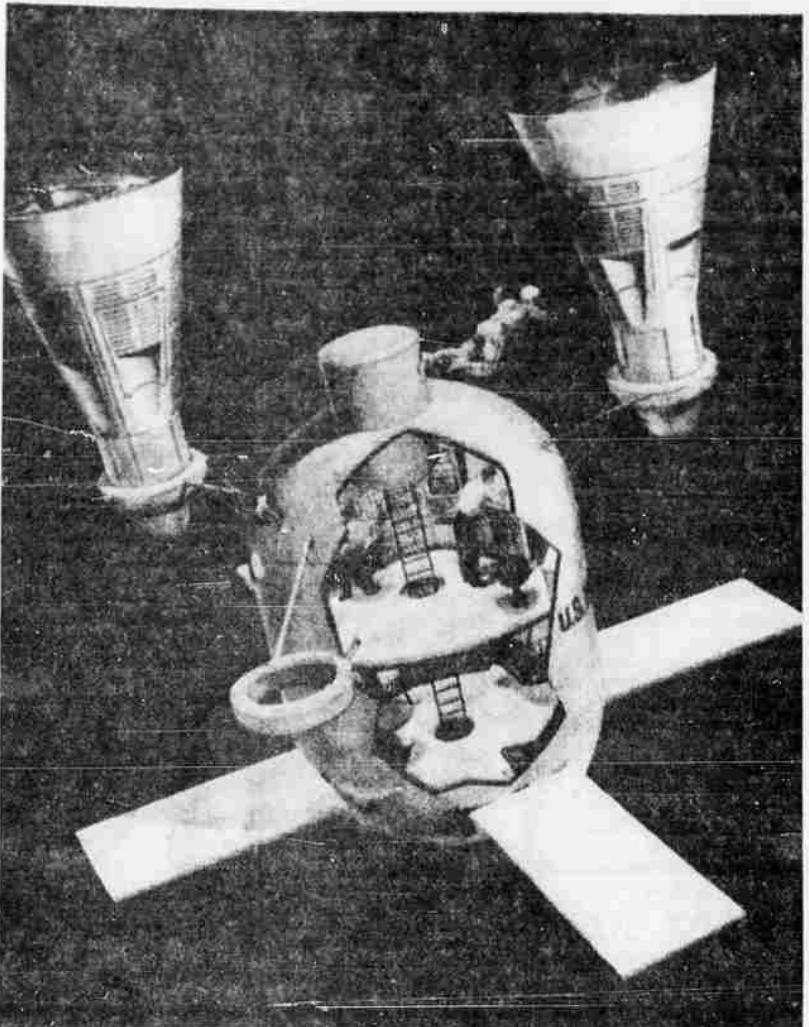

Marilyn's Mother Found

GLENDAL, Calif. (UPI) — Marilyn Monroe's mother, Mrs. Gladys Baker Eley, was found by police Friday after disappearing from a sanitarium to which she had been confined.

Officers said the mother of the late screen glamour girl fled Rockhaven Sanitarium early Thursday and was found hiding in the boiler room of the Lakeview Terrace Baptist Church 10 miles from the sanitarium.

Sgt. Sidney George said, "She must have spent the night in the boiler room to keep warm. I heard her say, 'I don't want my picture taken.'"

"She didn't mention Marilyn's name, but she did say, 'I don't want the money. I want to give it away.'"

Mrs. Eley, long an inmate of sanitariums, was provided for in a \$300,000 trust fund which yields \$5,000 yearly for her support in a nursing home. The provisions were made public following the death of Miss Monroe last Aug. 24 from an overdose of pills.

Mrs. Eley collapsed and was taken to a state hospital when her famed daughter was 8 years old. She remained in public institutions until Miss Monroe was able to provide care for her in private rest homes and sanitariums.

Glendale police said Mrs. Eley had been returned to the institution.

It was the first time that a woman had presided over the parliament at the ceremony which goes back more than 1,000 years.

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Rep. Vinson Nears Record In House

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Rep. Carl Vinson, a 79-year-old, spectacle-wearing, Georgia country boy, sees no cause for reminiscing just because he will soon set a record for serving more years in the House than any other representative.

"You've got to stay busy and stay abreast of the times," the dean of the House said as he neared completion of 46 years, 8 months and 13 days of continuous service in Congress. "Times move ahead. There's nothing to be gained sittin' back reminiscin'."

On July 16, Uncle Carl Vinson, leader of the so-called moderate bloc from the South and powerful chairman of the House Armed Services Committee, will break the record set by that other House giant, the late Speaker Sam Rayburn.

The shrewd and capable Vinson has withstood many a House battle since he first entered Congress in 1914 as its youngest member at age 30. On Nov. 10, he will be 80, and next year will have completed 50 years in the House.

In Fine Shape
Although the Milledgeville, Ga., native is very familiar with recent criticisms that there are too many old men in Congress, he refuses to accept that description of himself. His hearing, vision and energy are excellent. His mind, as many admirers and generals who have appeared before his

committee will attest, is as sharp as ever.

His last drink of whiskey was taken 30 years ago. But, Vinson still manages to smoke seven or eight 10-cent cigars every day. As one possible concession to his age, he claims to have stopped chewing tobacco.

Vinson still retains his Southern drawl and a habit of being in his office by 7:30 a.m. His staff does not have to report until 8 a.m.

As chairman of the House Armed Services Committee, he closely supervises the work of the subcommittee chairmen, often assigning them a problem which he already has solved. "Now heathen let's do, and I'm gonna heathen you," is a frequent saying of Vinson's.

He has headed the group for more than 12 years and was chairman of its predecessor, the Naval Affairs Committee, for 16 years before that. If there has been another person who served that long as a committee chairman, no one can recall.

Says Kennedy Great
During his tenure, Vinson has worked with and known well eight Presidents starting with Woodrow Wilson. He has called President

Kennedy one of the greatest Presidents despite their disagreement over civil rights.

He believes Kennedy is wrong, and will join fellow Southern representatives in voting against the administration's civil rights bill. But, on other critical issues, he has helped gather Southern votes for the President and predicts "I'll be heppin' him again in the future."

Vinson, with his countenanced looks, large nose and glasses, which he peers over in the manner of the country judge he once was, has become one of the few real characters in Congress and it is hard for many to imagine him gone.

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Auto Loans On Increase

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Federal Reserve Board said Wednesday consumer installment credit rose \$434 million in May, largely due to a \$244 million increase over April in automobile loans.

Non-installment credit, seasonally adjusted, rose \$39 million during May to \$14.7 billion according to the report. Most of the rise, the board said, was due to an expansion in charge account credit.

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Higher Loans Accepted

The state Department of Veterans Affairs has started accepting applications for farm and home loans under the new, higher loan amounts authorized by the 1963 legislature. Director H. C. Saffeld has announced.

The legislature increased the maximums from \$13,500 to \$15,000 for homes and from \$30,000 to \$40,000 for farms.

While the increases don't become effective until Sept. 2, Saffeld said veterans' applications will be accepted now, and will be processed through the commitment stage, so that the loan closings may be accomplished as soon as possible after Sept. 2.

The veterans' department is expecting a 20 per cent increase in applications and loan grants and a one-third increase in dollar volume of loans as the result of the new maximums.

In the biennium just ended, 8100 veterans borrowed more than \$84 million to acquire their own homes and farms. The department expects this to go to 9,950 loans for \$114 million in the 1963-65 biennium. The average loan last fiscal year was \$10,340, and this figure is expected to go to \$11,460 for the next biennial period.

The only other change in the veterans' loan act was a provision which will allow some veterans who lose their state-mortgaged properties for valid reasons beyond their control, to obtain a second loan even though their original loan was not repaid in full.

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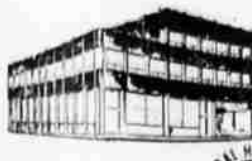
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
