11 Persons Lose Lives In Weekend Accidents

Eleven persons lost their lives in accidents in Oregon during the long Fourth of July holiday weekend. Six persons died in traffic accidents, two drowned and three died in other accidents.

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Senators Hear Arguments On Establishing Dunes Park Boundary

NORTH BEND (UPI)—Six U.S. senators heard arguments Saturday on why the boundaries of the proposed Oregon Dunes National Seashore should be different from those set in the Dunes bill introduced by Sen. Maurine Neuberger, D-Ore.

The six members of the Senate Public Lands Subcommittee, toured the proposed park area from Coos Bay to Florence. George Beard, Portland, manager of engineering for Pacific Power and Light Co., told the group that the southernmost nine miles should be excluded from the proposed park because steps have already been taken to develop a rich supply of fresh water for industrial purposes.

"The Dunes water resource," said Beard, "must be operated as a unit to protect it from sea encroachment. Under proper operation this source will be good for 30 million gallons of water a day."

Prices Rise For Plywood

PORTLAND (UPI)—Plywood prices have climbed to their highest point in recent years under the pressure of increased demand and decreased production. They may go even higher this week.

A Crow's Lumber Digest market report said that sanded plywood was selling for \$76 per thousand Friday. It predicted an \$80 market early this week.

Sheathing and unsanded items on the 5-8 basis have reached a peak of \$102 to \$104.

A Douglas Fir Plywood Association production report showed production of sanded items down to 80.6 million feet for the week because of the industry strike-lockout and plant shutdowns for vacations. Demand rose an additional 12.1 million feet during the last week.

The \$102 price of sheathing is well above the \$86 price of six weeks ago, before the strike lockout and plant shutdowns for vacations. Demand rose an additional 12.1 million feet during the last week.

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64 Wells Needed
He said that type of develop-
ment would require a string of
64 wells, each a distance of 2,000
feet from the sea. He said drill-
ing the wells would not damage
the recreation potential of the
area, but pointed out that the first
objective of a National Park is
recreation.

"That," he said, "is the op-
posite of industrial development."
Rep. Robert Duncan, D-Ore.,

was along on the trip. He has
introduced a bill which would set
the park's southern boundary at
Ten Mile Creek, eliminating the
area PP&L wants excluded. It
also would take much less private
property, particularly east of U.S.
Highway 101.

J. J. Geaney, chairman of the
Coos County Board of Commis-
sioners, told the senators he favors
continuation of the supply of
water for the Menasha Corp., but

he is afraid further development
by PP&L would damage recre-
ation values.
Crown Zellerbach Protests
John M. Fulton, Portland, cor-
porate representative for Crown
Zellerbach Corp., urged senators
to prevent the park from spread-
ing east of the highway. He said
the Neuberger proposal takes al-
most 25 per cent of the corpora-
tion's Tahkenitch Lake Tree
Farm.

The group also heard from
Wilbur Tenyik, who operates the
Wave Beach Grass Nursery at
Florence. He told the senators
how grass is used to stabilize the
dunes.

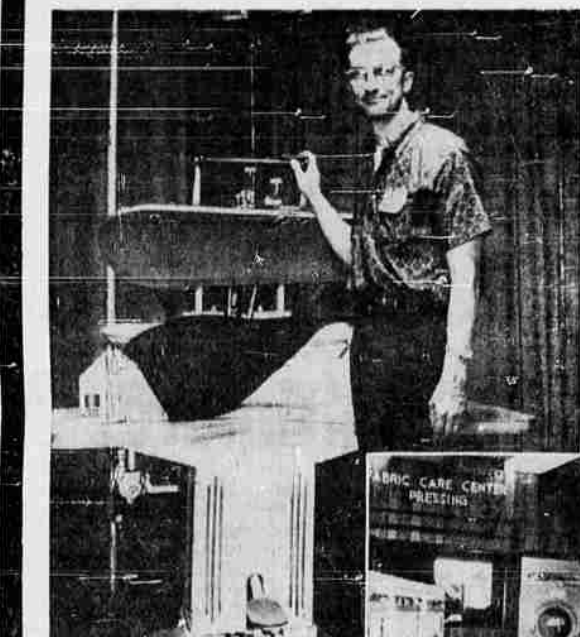
The senators gave little indi-

day morning to inspect other pub-
lic land in the West.

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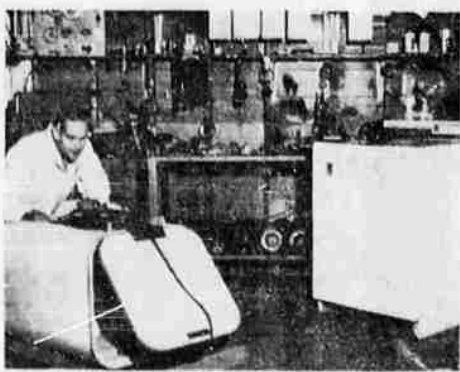
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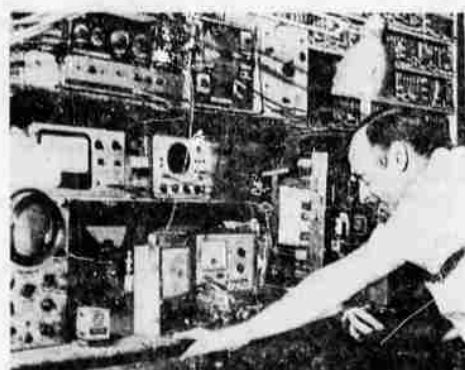
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
