There has been increasing dissatisfaction over the present system, not only among the fans, but also among some of the players.

The game back now is to "give" the game to the people who actually pay the freight — the fans.

PCL Swell To 12 Teams Discussed

SPOKANE (UPI)—The possibility of the Pacific Coast League expanding to 12 teams was discussed Monday at a meeting of league directors.

But expansion could come only with full working agreements with major league clubs, according to President Dewey Soriano.

Soriano said the possibility of expansion arose when it was learned that the International League, which is presently operating under a 10-team setup similar to the Pacific Coast League, was interested in returning to an eight-team operation.

Vancouver and Sacramento, former members of the PCL, were discussed as possible candidates for a franchise along with several other cities which Soriano refused to name.

Officials of the Dallas-Fort Worth, Denver and Oklahoma City franchises in the loop said they would not be interested in returning to the presently inactive American Association.

There had been some talk that the triple-A league might become active again.

Soriano said there still is a remote possibility of a playoff between the PCL champ and the pennant winner of the International League.

The PCL directors met here prior to the All-Star game between the Spokane Indians and top players from the league's other nine teams.

LYTHAM-ST. ANNES, England (UPI)—The odds on Jack Nicklaus winning the British Open shortened from 7-1 to 5-1 today for two reasons.

First, Nicklaus has been hitting the ball "out of sight" in practice rounds for the start of the 72-hole event Wednesday and, second, favored Arnold Palmer is battling a heavy cold.

Until Monday, Palmer, the popular muscle-man from Latrobe, Pa., looked like a shoo-in to win this classic for the third straight year. He still managed to shoot a one-under-par 71 in spite of the sniffles and remained the man to beat at 2-1 odds.

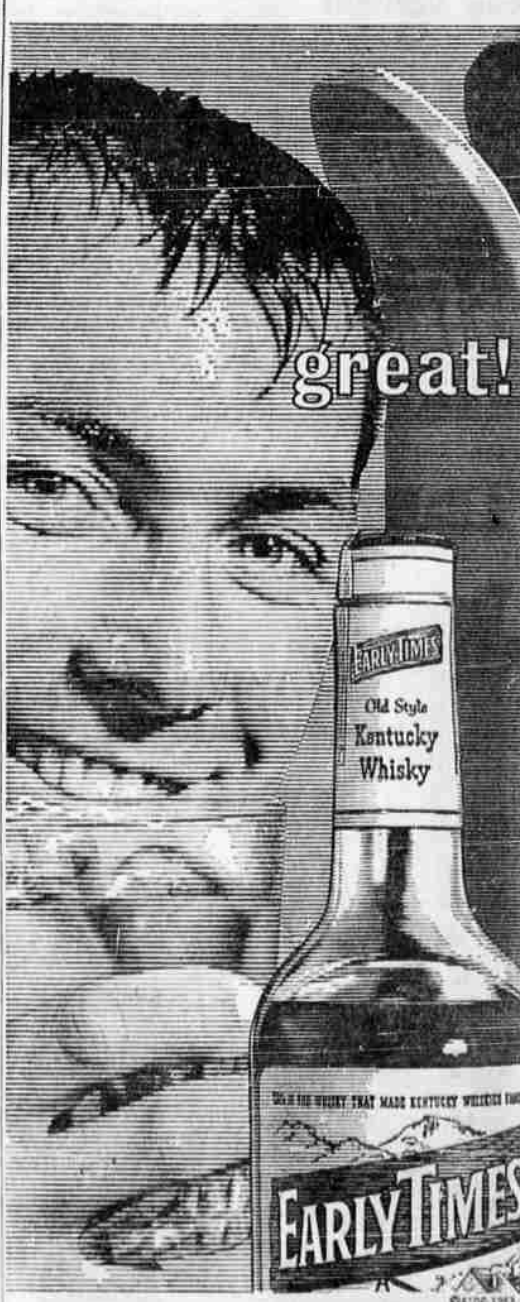
Seattle Team Garners Lead
