

Falcons Edge Bend Legionnaires In Non-League Contest, 6-5

The Klamath Falls Falcons rallied in the bottom of the ninth for an unearned run to edge a scrappy Bend Legion team in a non-league game at Gem Stadium, 6-5, after a 5-1 lead.

It was a sloppily played game, but one with its thrilling moments. There were 13 errors committed in the game with the Falcons miscuing eight of those 13 times. Neither team deserved the victory.

The Falcons will be in North Salem Saturday for a twin-bill

and will journey to Ashland Sunday for a crucial Southern Division contest. The Falcons have two league games remaining and have a game and a half lead over the Medford team which they play Tuesday in the game for all the marbles at Medford.

Gary Benson went the route for the Falcons although he was wild as a March wind at times. But he also had little backing as the Falcons gave Bend only two earned runs. And it was Benson himself who won the game.

He did it by himself, virtual-

ly, when he tripped to deepest centerfield with one out. The infield moved in extremely tight on LeVoy Young, the switch-hitting shortstop batting left-handed. The first baseman was within killing distance and Young almost doubled him up with a line shot off his bat but the first sacker made the catch.

He tossed back to third trying to get Benson doubled off but threw wild and Benson raced home with the winning run.

It was a very sloppy game with a few highlights such as the tremendous home run belted by rightfielder Dave Johnson of

the Falcons. He blasted the homer over deepest left center field with Mike Kitching aboard in the five-run second frame.

Bend jumped off to a 1-0 lead in the first inning. Mike Clark led off the game with a Texas League single to center. Ben Hamilton's line drive through the box was knocked down by second sacker Lanny Guyer and he pitched to Young covering second for the out. Jerry Wet-

John Gray at first who relayed to catcher Jay Paxton for the force out at home. Cris Kirby's hit ball was errored on and Wetle scored.

Then the Falcons came back with five runs in the second inning. Mike Kitching led off with a single to right center and Paxton whiffed. Kitching had taken second on an error and stolen third before Johnson laid into the home run.

Guyer struck out for the second out but John Gray singled. Benson executed a perfect hit-

and-run play with a single right past the first sacker and Gray went to third. Young was safe on the first sacker's error which scored Gray. Larry Binney lined a single to left to chase Benson home. Binney took second on the throw into home plate and a play was made back on him. The second sacker let the ball get away and Young scored. Binney tried for third on the miscue but was tossed out.

There was no more scoring for the Falcons until the ninth

when they won the game although they had many opportunities to tally but didn't. Bend finally took advantage of the Falcons' errors and Benson's wildness to put into a tie.

They tallied twice in the sixth. Watrous tripped over Kitching's head into center and scored when Benson threw the ball away trying to pick him off. George Woodworth walked, took second on an infield out, third on a wild pitch and scored when Binney lost a fly ball in the lights and dropped the ball.

The tying runs came in the seventh of the regularly scheduled nine-inning game. Wetle led off with a single and Lewis walked. Watrous lined a single to left field which scored Wetle. Binney's throw was to third base to cut off the runner Lewis advancing. But there was no one on the bag to receive the ball and it went to the Bend dugout, allowing Lewis to score the tying run. Watrous took third on the play and almost scored when a ball got away from Paxton. He retrieved the

ball in time to toss to Benson covering the plate for the out. Another similar play stopped another Bend threat in the fifth. With no one away Clark had walked. Benson then struck out the next two batters. Lewis hit a ball to first which Gray errored on. But Guyer was backing the play up and made the catch but threw past Gray who had managed to get back to the bag. Paxton, playing heads up, grabbed the ball off the wall on the rebound and raced Clark to the plate, making a diving tag just in time.

Stuart Leads Boston To Third; Giants Lose

New York Yankee manager Ralph Houk may have done the Boston Red Sox a favor when he snubbed Dick Stuart for the American League All-Star team.

Houk apparently not only stirred up the hottest controversy of the 1963 All-Star game but also lit a fire under the big first baseman.

In any event, Stuart returned from the two-day vacation resulting from the snub with a pair of homers and five runs batted in that paced the Red Sox to a 7-4, 10-inning victory over the Minnesota Twins Wednesday night. Stuart's second homer was a three-run, 10th-inning wallop that ended Minnesota relief ace Bill Dailley's string of 24 consecutive scoreless innings.

Stuart's first homer in the fourth inning was his first round-tripper since June 20, and the two runs he knocked in were the first for him since June 28. The two homers and five runs batted in for the night increased his season totals in those departments to 19 and 55.

Dick Radatz, who was removed for a pinch-hitter in the 10th in-

ning after shutting out the Twins on one hit for three innings, received credit for his ninth win against one loss. The victory moved the Red Sox into third place and dropped the Twins into fifth.

The Los Angeles Dodgers tipped the New York Mets, 1-0, the Philadelphia Phillies drubbed the San Francisco Giants, 10-2, the Cincinnati Reds defeated the Chicago Cubs, 3-1, and the Houston Colts beat the Pittsburgh Pirates, 2-0, in the National League.

Stuart and Lou Clinton hit home runs and Frank Malone contributed and RBI-double to the Red Sox' fourth inning outburst. Bob Allison hit his 22nd homer of the year for Minnesota in the fourth and the Twins tied the score with two more runs in the sixth. The other eight AL teams were idle.

Johnny Podres pitched a three-

hitter for his fourth shutout and seventh win and batterymate John Roseboro homered in the eighth inning as the Dodgers increased their NL lead to four games with their eighth victory in nine games. Left-fielder Tommy Davis saved the win by starting a game-ending double play with an electrifying catch of Frank Thomas' ninth-inning bid for a two-run homer. Carlton Willey was the unlucky loser for the Mets, who have lost 11 consecutive games.

Pace Phil's Attack
Roy Sievers had three hits and

Don Demeter, Johnny Callison and Tony Gonzalez two each to lead the Phillies' 14-hit attack. Errors by Jose Pagan and Willie McCovey paved the way for two three-run Philadelphia rallies that brought Cal McLish his ninth win and Billy O'Dell his fifth defeat.

McCovey and Orlando Cepeda hit homers for the Giants.

Joey Jay, already a 12-game loser, flashed his 21-victory form of 1961 and 1962 by striking out 10 and yielding seven hits in 8 1-3 innings against the Cubs. Mar-

ty Keough's two-run triple in the first inning was the big blow for the Reds against Glen Hobbie. The victory was only Jay's fourth.

Relief star Hal Woodeshick struck out Smokey Burgess with the bases filled in the eighth inning to preserve the Colt victory for Ken Johnson. The Colts got both their runs in the first inning on Ernie Fazio's double, a bunt single by Al Spangler, extending his hitting streak to 14 games. Pete Runnels' single and Carl Warwick's forecourt.
