

Russia New Challenge In World Lumber Trade

PALO ALTO, Calif. (UPI) — Russia is a major challenge to the United States in world lumber markets, an Oregon lumberman has warned.

Robert F. Dwyer, vice president of the Dwyer Lumber and Plywood Co. of Portland who recently returned from the Soviet Union, said Russia now matches the U.S. in total lumber production and plans an annual 20 per cent increase in the coming years.

Dwyer made the comments at a Transportation Management Program of the Stanford Graduate School of Business.

Dwyer returned from an unofficial tour of Russia June 21. He warned the business executives attending the graduate school that since Russia entered the world lumber market in 1958, the competitive effects on this country have been substantial.

He said American lumber producers have lost more than \$300 million of the annual domestic market, mostly to Canada, after

Traffic Arteries Hardening

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Most of the great cities of America suffer from a chronic metropolitan malady known as hardening of the traffic arteries.

It is generally agreed that unless something is done the nation's urban areas will eventually succumb to an attack of thoroughfare thrombosis.

It also is generally agreed that the only solution to the problem lies in the improvement of mass transportation.

I am not aware of what measures other cities are taking, but I am pleased to report that the nation's capital is acting with alacrity, or, putting it another way, is forging ahead to a standstill.

Seldom a month goes by that some government or private agency doesn't bring out an illustrated brochure that provides an artist's concept of a mass transportation system for Washington.

Copies are sent to Congress, the White House, where officials look at the pictures and exclaim "Isn't that interesting brush work!"

Then the traffic department changes the direction of one-way streets, again, and that takes care of mass transportation until the next brochure is issued.

The feverish pace that has made Washington the top U.S. city in the development of mass transportation brochures already is producing beneficial results.

For one thing, it provides employment for a large number of artists. For another, it gives motorists something to read while they are waiting for traffic to become unjammed.

The latest brochure to come to my attention takes the form of a report to President Kennedy from O. Roy Chalk, head of the local transit company and leading builder of air castles.

When Chalk comes to grips

with mass transportation, he doesn't fool around with any ordinary subway system, which the bulk of us commuters would be willing to settle for.

Chalk's brochure provides an artist's concept of mass transportation by means of "pneumatic tube systems," "ground effect machines," "superails," "monobeams," "hydrofoils" and "carveyors."

I'll tell you it makes mighty fine reading, especially when you are waiting for one of Chalk's buses to show up.

"I don't know what President Kennedy's reaction to the brochure was, but I'll bet he liked it, too. I imagine he particularly admired the drawing of the hydrofoil, which looks something like a PT boat."

As for me, my favorite is the "monobeam," although I think that is a typographical error. I think Chalk intended it to be "moonbeam."

I can see us all now, whisking around the capital, and from the suburbs, on moonbeams.

The use of moonbeams for transportation implies, of course, that we could only ride at night, which would be a serious drawback. But I expect someone will solve that problem in the next brochure.

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Liz Taylor Makes First Television Appearance

LONDON (UPI) — A few yards down the road from where stood William Shakespeare's own theater, such a Hamlet as the bard himself never envisaged quoted his famous advice to actors:

"Speak the speech, I pray you, as I pronounced it to you trippingly on the tongue; but if you mouth it, as many of your players do, I had as lief the town-crier spoke my lines."

Elizabeth Taylor let the words die away on the historic air of the Bankside district of London and smiled into the camera re-

cording the last scene of her first venture into television — an hour-long "mosaic" of the city of her birth 31 years ago.

Whatever Shakespeare may have thought of a beautiful brunette with violet eyes and a fetching costume by Yves St. Laurent quoting Hamlet in the street, the performance won the applause of at least one eminent authority on the subject — Richard Burton.

Burton, whose own Hamlet at the Old Vic theatre was praised by critics as one of the best of the century, spent a day off from making a new movie to observe his good neighbor — they both live at the Dorchester Hotel — at work.

And this is only fair because Miss Taylor spends all her spare time at the studio watching him become a saint — the martyred Thomas-A-Becket.

Beer For The Crew
"Marvelous," said Burton ushering Miss Taylor toward an ancient tavern, the Anchor, and flacons of beer all around for the crew of the television spectacular which will be seen in the United States sometime in the autumn.

The beers were followed by champagne and the champagne by food and everyone in the old pub found themselves involved in a party with Miss Taylor, a hos-

less so relaxed and happy that quite a few present speculated she and Burton have reached some final understanding on their future.

Both are still married — but they plan to be together in Mexico later this year. No one wanted to interrupt the fun by mentioning that Mexico is the land of easy divorce.

Besides Miss Taylor might have been happy simply because she had completed "Elizabeth Taylor in London" at what is said to be a record fee for a single television show — \$250,000 — and she and her producers are delighted with what they have screened of it so far.

Started At Top
Miss Taylor was one of the last of the big stars to hop out against television until she met Norman Baer, 37, and Phil D'Antoni, 34, two American network executives who decided to go into production themselves and start at the top. They flew over without the usual battery of lawyers but with enthusiasm and an idea. Miss Taylor found the approach refreshing — and the price was right. Once she had committed herself she astonished Baer and D'Antoni with her willingness to
