City Police Arrest Two Men

Two Klamath Falls men were arrested by city police Thursday night, one on a charge of disorderly conduct for the alleged beating of a woman clerk at the Unique Market, 129 South Ninth Street, and the other on a charge of carrying a concealed weapon.

Jack Milton Wright, 44, 1110 Main Street, was arrested at 6:10 p.m. outside the market after a customer called police and said that store clerk Mabel Bryson had been beaten.

Wright was lodged in the city jail in lieu of \$100 bail.

The victim said Wright came into the store, broke a pop bottle on the floor and announced, "I'm mad at the world." He then jumped over the counter and proceeded to strike the clerk with his fists. Miss Bryson received cuts and bruises in the attack.

Carlos Lugo Jr., 3024 Angle Street, was arrested at 10:24 p.m. on Main Street after an anonymous person called police and said Lugo had a loaded pistol in his possession.

When police approached Lugo he turned over his weapon and explained he was carrying it "for self protection."

Jury Finds Man Guilty

A jury composed of six men and six women Thursday in a unanimous verdict found Ellis Ray Roach, 27, 2107 Modoc Street, guilty of contributing to the delinquency of a minor.

Circuit Court Judge David R. Vandenberg set July 19 at 10 a.m. as the date for sentencing.

During the trial the 5-year-old victim was allowed to testify. The young girl was the daughter of a woman with whom Roach had allegedly been living.

Roach was arrested by Salem police April 3 and returned to Klamath Falls by sheriff's deputies after authorities were investigating his activities for several months involving a possible misdemeanor charge.

Incidents were revealed which led to Roach being charged with contributing to the delinquency of a minor as a result of that investigation.

Well Known Resident Dies

Mrs. Rose M. Poole, a long-time prominent Klamath Falls business woman and state legislator, died July 10 at St. Anthony's Hospital in Denver following a long illness. She had broken a hip a short time before her death. Mrs. Poole was 83.

Funeral services will be held in this city at 10:30 a.m. Monday, July 15, in St. Paul's Episcopal Church with Rev. Robert L. Green officiating. Final rites and interment will be in Klamath Memorial Park.

She was married in 1918 to Harry Poole, a school friend she knew in Michigan and they bought the Liberty Theater. They built the Pelican Theater in 1939 and operated it until Mr. Poole's death.

Mrs. Poole served two terms in the Oregon State Legislature from 1945 to 1947 and during that time helped to establish Klamath Falls as the location for Oregon Technical Institute.

She was deeply concerned during her lifetime with education and the welfare of the less privileged.

She was also active during her lifetime in Republican politics, was a charter member of the Klamath Falls Soroptimist Club, a member of the League of Women Voters and of the Klamath Falls Library Club.

Following the sale of the Pelican Theater in 1948, Mrs. Poole moved to Brookings and later moved to Denver to be near her daughter.

Art Entries From Basin Requested

Klamath Basin artists are invited to submit entries to a juried art exhibition, "Dimensions of '63," sponsored by the Klamath Falls Art Association. The exhibit will be held Sept. 8-29 at the Klamath Art Gallery, with showings each Sunday afternoon during the month.

In the juried show, judges will select all works to be exhibited and also judge for awards. First, second, and third place entries, named by the jury, will receive cash prizes of \$30, \$20 and \$10.

Entries will be limited to original two dimensional works of artists residing in the Klamath Basin and must have been completed in 1963. An artist may enter a maximum of three works. The Art Association reserves the right to reject entries for any reason such as size or fragility.

All entries must be received by Sept. 4, accompanied by a \$2 entry fee. The standard 20 per cent commission will be collected on all sales effected during the exhibition.

Framed oils and matted water colors, prints, tempera, and drawings will be eligible for the exhibit. Wet oils and unframed pastels or charcoal drawings will not be accepted.

A motor scooter driver was shaken up, but not injured in one of two accidents reported by city and state police Friday.

Goldwater Charges JFK With Pacifying Reds

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Sen. Barry Goldwater, R-Ariz., said today that President Kennedy appears "determined to co-exist with international communism wherever it thrives—even in the Western Hemisphere."

The 1964 GOP presidential possibility coupled his attack on Kennedy with a charge that the nation's liberals suffer a "craven fear" of the future and have taken the country "too far to the left."

Goldwater said that U.S. Communist party leader Gus Hall was based on the President's recent speech at American University in which he referred to a Soviet interest in a "just and genuine peace" and urged an effort to "make the world safe for diversity."

However, Goldwater added that he was not suggesting that Democrats or New Frontiersmen were Communists or that the Communists had captured control of the Democratic party.

Addresses Conference
In a speech prepared for delivery before the Human Events Conference, Goldwater said today's conservative was "standing where history once placed the true liberal." He said the conservative stands for freedom, individual rights, justice, order and honor.

"I believe today's liberal is so frightened of the future that he is incapable of acting in the present," Goldwater said. "Why else are we confronted today with a virtual paralysis of policy? Why else does Cuba remain a festering, Soviet power base on our very doorstep? Why else are we trying to pretend that international communism is mellowing and not out to enslave the entire world?"

Goldwater said that the "cause for our indecision and inaction is a deep-rooted fear on the part of the liberal establishment which forecloses the possibility of any action at all that may contain a slight element of risk."

"Such craven fear is completely out of character with the American spirit," he declared.

Goldwater said "liberals have taken us too far to the left for the good of the nation, particularly when we find ourselves in a worldwide struggle with the forces of the extreme left."

Hits Kennedy Speech
His criticism of Kennedy was based on the President's recent speech at American University in which he referred to a Soviet interest in a "just and genuine peace" and urged an effort to "make the world safe for diversity."

Goldwater said Soviet diversity means "slavery and oppression and tyranny and bigotry" as well as "Godlessness," mass murder and aggression.

"I suggest that the President's plea is just another way of saying that the New Frontier is determined to co-exist with international communism wherever it thrives—even in the Western Hemisphere," he said.

"This is merely an extension of the liberal fallacy which can never seem to realize that there can be a serious threat to the security of the United States and the freedom of the world coming from the left of the political spectrum."
