

Eggs Thrown In Germany At Editor

BONN (UPI) — The reporting of news has itself become news in West Germany.
 In recent incidents:
 —A West German television producer came under a barrage of eggs thrown by two angry subjects of a recent program.
 —An East German Communist radio news editor was arrested in West Germany for allegedly endangering the state.
 —Another West German television reporter was almost lynched by refugees from Breslau who thought he reported too favorably on the Communist Polish administration of the city.
 The victim of the egg-throwing already had lost a producer's contract because of pressure from Chancellor Konrad Adenauer's Christian Democratic Union.
 Despite all that, there is no form of censorship in West Germany. Foreign correspondents find officials easier to reach here than in most capitals and the German daily press is competitive and controversial.

Delves Deeper
 The weekly press in addition delves deeper than that in most other western countries.
 The eggs were aimed at Gerd von Paczensky. Two Croatian refugees drove halfway across Germany, from Bonn to Hamburg, to make this form of protest against a Paczensky report on the fist, knife and bomb fights among Yugoslav refugees and temporary workers in this country.
 The Communist under arrest was Georg Grasnack, chief editor of the Deutschlandsender (Radio Germany) in East Berlin.
 Grasnack was arrested while in West Germany covering the trial of a fellow traveler convicted of slandering leading officers of the armed forces.
 Spokesmen for the office of the federal prosecutor general say the arrest had no connection with the trial.
 Grasnack, they said, is suspected of endangering state security because the radio station of which he is chief editor aims its broadcasts at West Germany, inciting the people here to "class war."
 Liable For Arrest
 He is thus doing the things for which the Communist Party was banned in West Germany nine years ago, said the spokesman. He is liable to arrest and trial here, they added, because the result of his criminal acts would be dangerous to West Germany.
 West Germany lets any German enter or leave it at will. Any Communist official, saboteur or whatever from East Germany may come here freely. The West German theory is that there is but one Germany.
 But the Communists say there are two German states. They have an iron curtain around their area. Only approved representatives of the regime can cross it. No West German newsmen are permitted to live in East Germany, and only a few are allowed to make short visits.
 The West Berlin Association of Journalists protested the Grasnack arrest, saying this would make it even more difficult for the few Western newsmen allowed to enter East Germany.

Two Tie For Championship

ALTURAS — The 1962 world's champion, Cutter Bill, and Alice Star tied for first place honors at the finals of the World Series of Cutting Horse contest during the Alturas Fandango Days. The two champions tied with total points of 299 for the two-day show.
 Cutter Bill was shown by Sonny Perry for the Cattle Company of Crockett, Tex. Stanley Bush showed Alice Star for the Houston Clint Company of Mason, Tex.
 The two horses defeated 12 finalist horses for the championship after showing Friday against 38 of the world's best cutting horses.
 Placing along with Cutter Bill and Alice Star in the top six horses were War Leo, third, ridden by Glenn McWhorter for the Aurora Farms of Throckmorton, Tex.; fourth place honors went to Hardy's Jesse, owned by the Moon Ranch of Carlsbad, N.M., and ridden by James Kenney; Marvin Jackson, riding Blue Dot for Don Jackson of Clovis, Calif., was in fifth place, and Hollywood Lin, owned and ridden by Gale Borland of Hereford, Tex., was in sixth place.
 Judging the two-day championships were Bill Williams of Bonville, Mo., and John Lilly, Newhall, Calif. The 38 horses vied for a total purse of \$6,800.
 Cutter Bill, by winning first place on Friday and tying for first in the finals, took home total winnings of \$1,455. With a second place the first day and first in the finals, Alice Star won a total purse of \$1,092.
 Cutter Bill and Alice Star now stand first and second, respectively, for the 1963 world championship in total points. The world championship finals will be held in Las Vegas, Nev., in November.

Well Depth Measured

FORT ROCK—Bob DeBow, geologist from the office of the state engineer, measured well depths in the Fort Rock-Christmas Lake basin early this week. With wells pumping, it is to be expected that water levels will be down. DeBow reports, however, that the decrease since the April readings is only two to three-tenths of a foot.
 An effort is made to measure wells on the same date each year for an accurate check. This year he found, on a very widespread basis, that wells are up two to five-tenths of a foot from last year.
 These wells are part of the 700 wells measured throughout Oregon to tell the underground water story.

Explosion Injures 31

HASTINGS, England (UPI)—At least 31 persons were hospitalized today with injuries incurred during three huge gas explosions along this channel resort town's waterfront Thursday.
 Authorities estimated that the series of blasts injured a total of 30 persons and destroyed the homes of 30 families. The explosions were believed caused by a broken gas main.
 "The scene looked like a wartime bombing raid," one eyewitness said. Most of the victims were vacationers cut by flying glass.
 Police said the first explosion rocked the Winchester restaurant and set it afire. Ten minutes later another blast ripped through two houses on the waterfront, followed by a third explosion in another restaurant down the street.
 A hotel, shops and still another restaurant were heavily damaged by the explosions and fire, police said.

While it is not anticipated that it will interfere with the use of Rainbow Camp or the Eastside summer homes, road construction is also under way in this area, and cooperation of the public is asked. Further information may be obtained at the district ranger station at the lake. Fishing remains fair at both Lake of the Woods and Fourmile Lake.

On the Chemult District all main system forest roads are open. Exceptions are some of the unimproved roads, which are in the process of being opened. The trail to Maidu Lake is open. Miller Lake Campground is open and receiving use.
 Unimproved campgrounds along Miller Creek are also being used. Insect repellent should be included in all camping gear. Forest
