Small Town Mayor Hits Rights Move

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The mayor of a small Maryland city told Congress today that his community would not be on the road to total desegregation and racial harmony if a public accommodations law existed.

Frank H. Morris, mayor of Salisbury, a city of 25,000 in Maryland's racially troubled eastern shore, said he did not question the need for such a law in some communities. But he said it would have slowed rather than accelerated integration at Salisbury.

Morris testified before the Senate Commerce Committee as it continued hearings on President Kennedy's proposal to bar discrimination in public places such as restaurants and hotels.

Morris said the bill lacked any inducement for a community to solve its own problems.

"There is no inducement for blacks and whites of a community to start the talks that are the real hope of future solution," he said. "Instead, social barriers are removed with no medium for easing the shock."

The mayor said such places as Salisbury that are trying to solve racial problems on their own should be allowed to continue.

"Even to a community such as our own," Morris said, "this bill could be dangerous in the hands of an agitator." He said racial progress of years' work could be destroyed by "one real demonstration."

Morris suggested "safeguards" in the bill to promote the work of biracial committees such as the one operating in Salisbury.

The public accommodations proposal is considered by most to be the key feature of President Kennedy's civil rights package.

Three southern governors will testify on the proposal — over the next few days—Gov. Ross Barnett of Mississippi Friday, Gov. George C. Wallace of Ala-

Diamonds Can Worry

When the American Bridge Teachers' Association meets in Los Angeles on the 23rd and 24th of this month, vice president Dorothy Jane Cook of Chicago will be one of the speakers.

Mrs. Cook, like all good teachers, stresses the code word "Arch," both in dummy play and defense. "A" stands for "Analyze the Lead," "R" for "Review the bidding," "C" for "Count your winners and losers," and "H" for "How can I make or beat the contract?"

Mrs. Cook points out that against any lead, but a diamond, South will knock out the ace of trumps and eventually lead diamonds from dummy to wind up losing one trump, one diamond and one club.

She points out further that the beginner will have no trouble with a diamond lead. He will simply win the first trick and go after trumps. West will get in the lead with the ace, but won't be able to get a diamond ruff because his partner has no entry.

A good player will also make the hand, but he will worry a little about that diamond opening. He will be certain that it is either a singleton in which case he must win that first diamond or a doubleton in which case he must duck.

Then the good player will review the bidding and come to the conclusion that the lead must be a singleton. With a doubleton diamond West would almost surely have opened the suit that his partner has raised.

Major Tired Of Pressure

BERLIN (UPI) — A Polish air force major who flew to asylum in West Berlin with his family in a two-seater training plane looked forward today to building a new life "where people are not pushed around."

"I was tired of pressures," he said.

Maj. Ryszard Obacz, a decorated 34-year-old jet pilot, packed his 27-year-old wife, Maria, and their two sons, Lestow, 9, and Krzysztof, 5, into the cramped Polish air force plane Wednesday in Nadarzycze, Poland, 80 miles north of Poznan.

Then he coolly flew the slow-moving single-engine aircraft near tree-top level 150 miles across Poland and East Germany to the U.S. Air Force's Tempelhof Airfield in West Berlin, where he landed and requested asylum.

First Such Flight

It was the first time anyone had fled to West Berlin from behind the Iron Curtain in an airplane, although other defectors have flown to West Germany itself. West Berlin is separated from West Germany by 110 miles of Communist territory.

An American official, asked the request would be granted, said, "He's here, isn't he?"

The plane probably will be returned to Poland.

To keep them from worrying, Obacz had told his wife and children they were heading for Stettin, just east of the Polish-East German border, to visit friends.

"It was the first time I ever lied to my wife in our marriage," he said.

Mrs. Obacz appeared happy with his decision.

Seeks Free Life

Speaking through an interpreter, Obacz said he made the flight because he "wanted to come to a place of open friendships."

"I wanted to work toward truth," he said. "I wanted to go around."

Obacz said morale is low in the Polish air force. "The mood is very bad," he said. "Most officers are fed up just as I was. We want the right to travel where we want to, the right of free speech, the right to work for a good cause."

He said the toughest part of the trip was getting the whole family into the small two-seater plane.

Obacz sat in the pilot's seat. His wife was in the rear seat and the two boys crunched between their mother's legs under the rear cockpit control panel.

Receives Permission

He had received permission to take his wife and children along on a practice flight "to get in flying time" and had filed a flight plan to Stettin.

Obacz, an air force officer since 1948, planned the escape carefully. Russian and East German radar stations guard the border and track all aircraft.

"I knew the exact location of all radar stations and kept as far away from them as I possibly could," he said. "I also flew as low as I could to evade radar."
