

Southpaw Charles Tops Rodgers In Tournament

LYTHAM-ST. ANNES, England (UPI) — Lanky left-handed Bob Charles of New Zealand quashed an American bid for a third straight British Open golf championship today when he defeated Phil Rodgers of La Jolla, Calif., by eight strokes in their 36-hole title playoff.

The 27-year-old Charles shot a morning-round 69 and a 71 in the afternoon for a 140-stroke total that easily won him the \$4,200 first prize. Rodgers shot rounds of 72 and 76 for 148 in his futile bid for the title won by Arnold Palmer in 1961 and 1962.

Wildlife Group In Budget Brawl

SALEM (UPI) — The Interim Committee on Wildlife held its organizational meeting here Friday, elected Rep. W. O. Kelsay, D-Roseburg, as chairman, and immediately became embroiled in a budget battle.

It was the first of the 1963 interim committees to organize.

Kelsay's election could indicate a threat made by House Speaker Clarence Barton, D - Coquille, in the closing hours of the 1963 session was being carried out.

Senators Humble Orioles, 4-3

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Chuck Hinton cracked out two doubles and a home run Saturday to lead the Washington Senators to a 4-3 victory over the Baltimore Orioles.

Hinton's home run in the sixth inning proved to be the winning margin. The victory went to Steve Riddick who gave up only one hit in 3 1/2 innings of relief.

The Orioles took a 2-0 lead in the top of the first on a walk, singles by Russ Snyder and John Powell, and a sacrifice fly by Jim Gentile.

The Senators went ahead in the fourth inning on a home run by Jim King, Hinton's second double and singles by Don Lock and Don Zimmer off Baltimore's Ike Delock.

The Orioles tied the score in the sixth on singles by Powell and John Orsino and a double by pinch-hitter Bob Johnson.

It was the first victory for Riddick, who was making his second appearance in relief since he was purchased from Toronto of the International League. Dick Hall, third of four Baltimore pitchers, was tagged with his third loss.

Cub-Red Game Postponed

CINCINNATI, Ohio (UPI) — A continuous downpour after two days of play forced the postponement of Saturday's Chicago Cubs-Cincinnati Reds game. No date was announced for the replay of the contest.

The umpires waited one hour and 13 minutes before calling the game. Neither team had scored.

The victory made Charles the first New Zealander ever to win the British crown. And he also became the first left-handed golfer ever to win a major international tournament.

In addition to the comparatively meager first-prize purse, Charles now faces an opportunity to pick up \$50,000 in the "world series of golf" to be played at Akron, Ohio, Sept. 7 and 8. The British Open champion qualifies for the four-man field in the Akron tournament.

The 25-year-old Rodgers, who trailed by five strokes after the first two of the afternoon round, narrowed that deficit to one by the 25th hole. But after Charles had matched Rodgers' long birdie putt on the 26th, the Yank lapsed into bogey golf and rapidly dropped out of contention.

Charles had shot a 33-69 on the morning round and Rodgers a 33-72.

Rodgers narrowed his deficit to one stroke at the 24th hole, but Charles regained his three-shot advantage by the afternoon turn. The New Zealander shot two birdies, a bogey and a double-bogey on the first nine of the afternoon round; Rodgers carded three birdies and four bogeys.

At one stage of the afternoon 18, Charles led by five strokes. But Rodgers whittled two shots off that margin when the New Zealander drove out of bounds at the 21st hole; gained another stroke when Charles three-putted the 23rd, and reduced his deficit to one by sinking a 25-foot birdie putt.

However, Charles picked up four strokes on the next five holes to regain his five-shot lead after the 29th.

The New Zealander putted magnificently in pulling away to a three-stroke advantage during the morning round.

Charles birdied five holes but also shot two bogeys and took a double-bogey six on the 17th hole. Rodgers carded only one birdie and shot three bogeys as he fell behind in the quest for the \$4,200 first prize.

Charles' approach shots and putting were superb as he required only 26 putts on the first 18 holes and one-putted 11 greens. His longest putt was a 45-footer on the third hole.

Warm sunshine bathed the 6,737-yard Royal Lytham and St. Annes course for the playoff.

Rodgers, a 25-year-old ex-Marine, was out to become the 11th American to bring back the British Open title. The 10 previous United States champions won the tournament 15 times. The group included Walter Hagen, Bobby Jones, Gene Sarazen, Ben Hogan and Arnold Palmer.

Charles and Rodgers tied after first place with 277 total Friday after 72 holes of regulation play. Both were happy to wind up in the playoff after Friday's exciting two rounds.

Dodgers Get Sixth Win Straight

NEW YORK (UPI) — Bob Miller, who couldn't finish a game in the Polo Grounds last year as a Met, came back to haunt his former mates Saturday with a six-hit, 11-2 victory that gave the Los Angeles Dodgers their sixth straight win. It was New York's 14th straight defeat.

Miller, given 13-hit support by the Dodgers, breezed to his sixth victory in 10 decisions. The only runs he allowed came on Frank Thomas' two-run homer in the fourth inning.

After belaboring the tight budget, committee members voted to pay Edwards \$500 plus stenographic costs to work part time between now and Sept. 6 to draft preliminary budgets, and to attempt to interest some natural resources to fund in providing the committee with the services of a recognized, impartial biologist to study the explosive doe hunting issue.

Edwards said he already had a list of 700 foundations which might provide such a free service to the committee.

The committee scheduled a series of meetings Sept. 6-7 with the Fish Commission, Game Commission, Oregon State University wildlife group, and the state police.

LAS VEGAS (UPI) — Trainer Willie Reddish heatedly denied Saturday the "not sharp" rumors which caused the odds favoring Sonny Liston to drop from 3-1 to 4-1 for his July 22 heavyweight title defense against Floyd Patterson in this gambling metropolis.

Barney Perlman, announcing the unexpected one-point tightening of the price, said "more money is showing now for Patterson because of persistent rumors that Liston is not nearly as sharp as he was for their first fight and also that Patterson is greatly improved."

Perlman, proprietor of the Hi-Leah Turf and Sports Club in Las Vegas, explained that the betting range favoring Bob Sonny is 3-1 to 3-1, with the friendly, maitre d' 4-1 in the middle.

Kiwanis Upset By Lakers

Crater Lake, riding a five-game losing skid after dropping the first three games of the season, downed previously undefeated Kiwanis in a City Minor League game while Weyerhaeuser-Gene's toppled Motor Investment, 12-9.

East Side Electric slaughtered hapless Hal's, 21-12, in a Major League game and East Side also downed Weyerhaeuser, 3-2, in another contest.

Richard McClary was the winning hurler for Crater Lake in giving up only three hits. John Migliaccio was the loser in a heart-breaking four-hitter. The score was tied at 4-4 going into the bottom of the sixth when lead-off batter Jeff Washburn singled off the left field fence.

Pittsburgh's other run came in the first inning when Dick Schofield walked, stole second and took third on a throwing error by catcher Jim Campbell. Roberto Clemente then blooped a single to right field to score Schofield.

It was Law's fourth victory against three defeats. The loser was Dick Drott, who has a 2-7 record.

Minnesota Decisions Red Sox

MINNEAPOLIS ST. PAUL (UPI) — The Minnesota Twins, behind the home runs of Rich Rollins, Harmon Killebrew and Earl Battey, Saturday defeated the Boston Red Sox, 6-4, to stop a five-game losing streak.

Despite the loss, the Red Sox maintain second place by one percentage point over the rained-out Chicago White Sox.

The Twins jumped on Boston rookie Bob Heffner for all their runs with Battey's two-run blast in the fourth providing the margin of victory. The homer was a Battey's 18th of the season, and set a club record for most home runs in one season by a catcher.

Battey had hit 17 in 1961.

Rollins and Killebrew hit back-to-back solo shots in the third to tie the game at 3-3. The Twins also picked up single runs in the first and fifth.

Lou Clinton and Chuck Schilling hit solo homers for the Red Sox.

Lee Stange went the route for Minnesota to gain his third victory in four decisions. The loss evened Heffner's record at 1-1.

Sievers, raising his career homer mark to 298, belted both off Billy Pierce, who dropped the first game of his career to the Phils.

Angels Defeat Yankees

LOS ANGELES (UPI) — Relief hurler Art Fowler foiled a Yankee bases-loaded rally in the seventh inning and went on to give the Angels a 3-1 victory over New York, snapping Los Angeles' 10-game losing streak.

The Yankees, however, remained 5 1/2 games ahead in the American League lead, with the Chicago White Sox and the Boston Red Sox tied for second place.

Fowler entered the game in the seventh inning with one out and the bases loaded. The veteran right hander got Bobby Richardson to pop out and Tom Tresh to ground out. He saved the win for Angel starter Dean Chance, who now has a record of 7-9.

India Cancels Plane Landings

NEW DELHI, India (UPI) — The Foreign Office announced Saturday that India will bar all aircraft registered in South Africa from landing at Indian airports or flying over this country as a protest against South African apartheid racial policies.

The announcement said ships flying South African flags, also would not be permitted in Indian waters.

The Foreign Office said the government took the measure to give effect to a United Nations resolution of 1962 asking member governments to take steps to protest South Africa's racial segregation laws.

The only Yankee tally was scored by Joe Pepitone, who came home from third as Elston Howard hit into a double play in the fourth. The Yankees collected 10 hits but they weren't enough for starter Jim Bouton, who lost his fifth game of the year against 11 victories.
