

# Crater Cats Near Basin Babe Ruth Championship With Eighth Victory

ST. LOUIS (UPI) — Milwaukee manager Bob Bragan gambled on relief pitcher Hank Fischer as a last minute replacement for aging Warren Spahn Saturday and the 23-year-old Yankees, N.Y., right hander registered a 7-5 victory over the St. Louis Cardinals although he needed relief in the ninth inning.

The Cardinals knocked out Fischer and Dan Schneider in a ninth-inning three-run attack in which George Altman doubled and Gary Kolb and pinch-hitter Charley James homered.

The 42-year-old Spahn complained of an inflamed elbow, and Bragan called on Fischer to make his first start after 16 relief roles. The Braves inflicted a five-run, five-hit attack on Cardinal starter Curt Simmons who lasted three innings.

Hank Aaron hit his 26th home run in the first inning after Simmons walked Frank Bolling and Ed Matthews. In the third, Aaron reached first when Ken Boyer bobbled his grounder and scored on Joe Torre's triple. Torre scored the inning's second run on a wild pitch.

## Cadiz Wins Over Field In Gold Cup

INGLEWOOD, Calif. (UPI) — New Zealand-bred Cadiz, flying through the stretch, scored a surprise victory by two lengths Saturday in the \$162,100 Hollywood Gold Cup as the favored Crimson Satan finished out of the money in Hollywood Park's richest race of the summer.

Held well back in the pack until the final turn, Cadiz was turned loose by jockey Eddie Burns in the final quarter and quickly shot to the front to outrun Aldershot who held on for second while Olympiad King was third and the pace-setting Native Diver dropped back to fourth.

Cadiz raced the testing mile and a quarter distance in the fast time of 1:59 3-5, just a second off the track and stakes record set in 1956 by Swaps and equalled by Round Table in 1957 as a 3-year-old.

The 7-year-old horse from New Zealand returned \$50.20, \$23.80 and \$10.20 across the board.

## Favorite Regains Yacht Lead

HONOLULU (UPI) — The 72-foot ketch Ticonderoga Saturday regained the lead in the 2,225 mile trans-Pacific yacht race from Los Angeles to Hawaii.

At Saturday's roll call, the craft owned by Robert F. Johnson of Portland, Ore., reported a day's run of 215 miles. This put her 50 miles ahead of Audacious, Friday's leader, and 597 miles from the Honolulu Diamond Head finish line.

Baldwin M. Baldwin's Audacious, a 72-foot yawl from Newport Beach, Calif., logged 176 miles and was 667 miles from Hawaii, according to reports from the accompanying U.S. Coast Guard cutter Dexter.

The Dexter said some of the boats were in heavy squalls. Others were enjoying 10 to 15 knot breezes.

Tom Crockett's 40-foot sloop Islander continued to lead the 32-vessel fleet on a handicap basis, which will decide the actual winner. Islander has 888 miles from Honolulu with a day's run of 173 miles.

The 47-foot cutter Patronilla, owned by William F. Forrest, Roseburg, Ore., pulled into second place ahead of third place Tiare, a 40-foot yawl out of Long Island, N.Y., in the handicap standings.

Patronilla was 825 miles out of Honolulu and had a day's run of 187 miles.

Actual fleet leaders were Ticonderoga, Audacious, Kamalii, Orient, Queen Mab, Astor, Ichiban, Legend, Khamsin and Tenderfoot.

In the handicap standings, it was Islander, Patronilla, Iare, Mammie and Mistress tied for fourth and Spirit and Kne Matu tied for fifth.

The new list of pro keggers is led by Earl Johnson, former Tacoma bowler, presently in fourth place in the PBA money standings, and Billy Golembiewski, or "Billy G." as everybody calls him, one of the nation's perennial top pin blasters.

Johnson, now rolling out of Minneapolis, won the Schenectady Open in June and finished second in the Canadian Open last month, to jump to a total of \$16,030 in winnings in PBA tournaments this year. Johnson is well known in the Portland area and should prove one of the favorites in the City of Roses Open.

Billy G. just finished five straight weeks of appearances on the nationally televised "Make that Spare" show before losing out Saturday, July 6, to Dick Downey. Billy G. holds one of the best performance records in history in ABC tournaments and has won two ABC Master's titles during his bowling career. During 1962 he finished 10th on the PBA money list with a total of \$16,405 in winnings.
