

Cuba Denies Subversive Movement

HAVANA (UPI) — The Cuban government Friday denied it is sending subversive agents into Latin America through British Grand Cayman Island. It accused the United States of hampering Cuban airliner flights landing on the Caribbean island.

An official statement from the Foreign Relations Ministry also protested alleged British failure to keep a mob from blocking Cubans from leaving a plane on the island Thursday.

The statement said Grand Cayman is used to return home only by "persons visiting or working in Cuba using internationally recognized rights."

"The United States seeks to suppress such flights through diplomatic pressure and a campaign of lies," it said.

The United States has asked the British to stop such flights on the ground they carry subversive agents to Latin America.

Cougar Runs Down Street

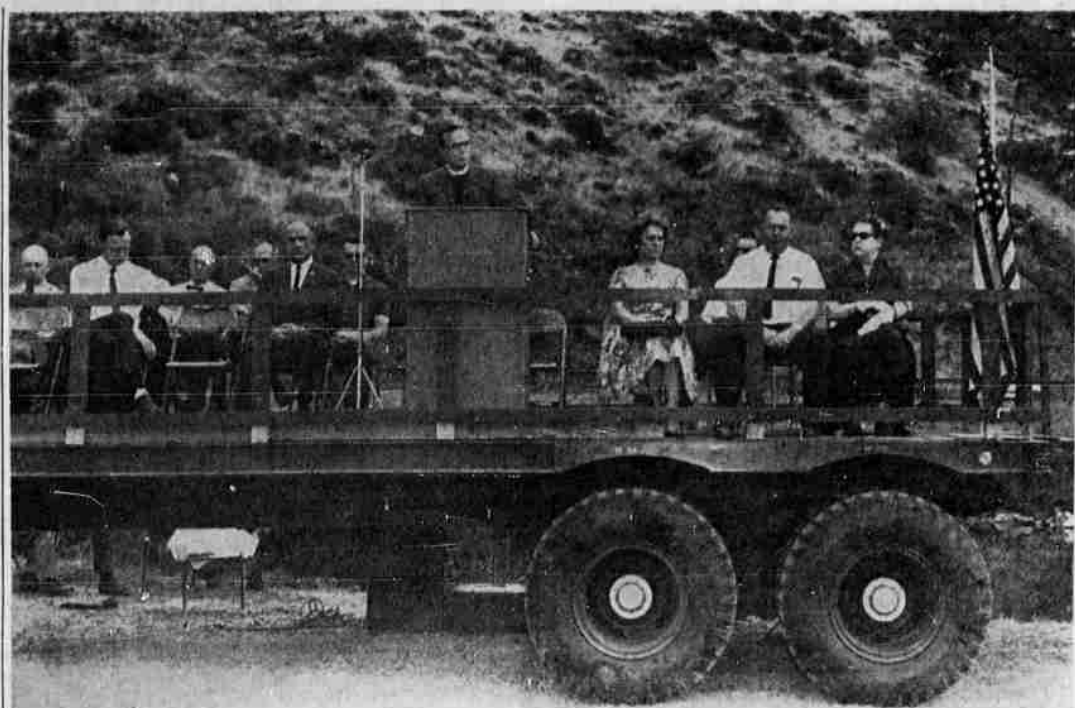
HELENA, Mont. (UPI) — A mountain lion roamed the streets of Montana's capital city early Friday before apparently deciding he had seen enough of civilization.

A motorist told police at 12:10 a.m. he saw the big cat running down the middle of a street in a Helena residential district. He described the animal as tan in color with short ears, a very short tail and about the size of a German Shepherd dog.

Ten minutes later a taxicab dispatcher reported one of the drivers had seen the mountain lion about a block away from the first sighting.

A policeman sent to investigate said he heard the cat scream but was unable to locate it.

When there were no further reports by midmorning, police assumed the animal had returned to the nearby hills.

Nixon Calls Goldwater Favorite

GENEVA (UPI) — Former Vice President Richard M. Nixon said Friday that Sen. Barry Goldwater has displaced Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller as the favorite for the 1964 Republican presidential nomination.

But Nixon told a meeting of the American Club in Geneva that neither the Arizona senator nor the New York governor will have the nomination "locked up" before the Republican nominating convention.

Nixon on an extensive tour of Europe and the Middle East named Goldwater, Rockefeller, Gov. William Scranton of Pennsylvania and Gov. George Romney of Michigan as the "only possible candidates." But he declined to name his choice.

"Goldwater has now just as commanding a lead as did Rockefeller three months ago," the former vice president said. Nixon said he expects to have "something to say" about the Republican candidate, the party's platform and the 1964 campaign but repeated he will not run for the presidency again himself.

Investigation Slated In Communism Charge

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Senate Commerce Committee Saturday promised to investigate a charge by Mississippi Gov. Ross Barnett that Communists are behind the nation's racial strife.

Several committee members, however, challenged the charge on the spot Friday after Barnett spoke. They said recent riots and demonstrations were the direct result of denial of equal rights to American citizens.

Sen. Warren G. Magnuson, D-Wash., the committee chairman, told Barnett the committee would ask the FBI to investigate his charge. But Magnuson said the committee would not be led off into "tangents" about who was behind the demonstrations.

Barnett also accused President Kennedy and Atty. Gen. Robert F. Kennedy of encouraging demonstrations that could result in bloodshed.

In charging a Communist plot, Barnett showed the committee a photograph of Negro leader Dr. Martin Luther King attending what the governor termed a "Communist training school."

The picture, Barnett said, was taken at the Highlander Folk School, Monteagle, Tenn., later closed by the state of Tennessee. The state of Georgia investigated the school and its attorney general called it subversive.

King, in New York, was reported "not ready yet to comment" on Barnett's statements.

The men in the picture were identified by Barnett as Aubrey Williams, director of the Southern Conference Education Fund of New Orleans; Abner Berry, a Negro; and Myles Horton, a former director of the Highlander School.

Williams testified before the Senate Internal Security subcommittee in 1954. He denied ever being a member of the Communist party. Another witness, who identified himself as a former Communist, testified he had been introduced to Williams as a party member in 1942.

Dismissals Proposed

PORTLAND (UPI) — Two of seven men charged with mail fraud and conspiracy to commit mail fraud involving eastern Oregon land sales have asked for dismissal of their federal indictment in a motion filed in U. S. District Court here.

The U.S. Attorney's office said similar motions were anticipated from the five others accused.

Richard Dale Walker and George Edward Isaacs, both of Los Angeles, Calif., alleged the indictment "does not consist of a plain, concise and definite statement of essential facts."

Others charged in the indictment were Abraham L. Koolish, David F. Koolish, John M. Phillips Jr., and Jack Cecil Cherbo, all of Chicago; and Maurine A. Hall, of Los Angeles.

They all entered pleas of innocent to the charges June 13. All are officers of the Harney County Land Development Co., which advertised Lake Valley subdivisions.

Man Charged With Murder In Stabbing

Hagan Lindberg Dean, 37, 410 South Fifth Street, died in Klamath Valley Hospital at 9 a.m. Saturday after he was admitted to the hospital last Monday night as the victim of a knife wound.

The deceased man's brother, John Wesley Dean, 37, 504½ South Fifth Street, who had been charged with assault with a dangerous weapon for allegedly slashing his brother's throat after an argument, has now been charged with second degree murder, city police indicated.

An autopsy performed on Hagan Dean Saturday morning revealed that he died as a result of the knife wound. The victim went into shock early Saturday from severe internal bleeding.

Hagan Dean is survived by his brother John and two other brothers in Troy, Kan.

Julia E. Bliss, 504½ South Fifth Street, who witnessed the stabbing from her window, said the brothers began fighting in the street outside her house. The Bliss woman told city police she saw a knife flash in John's hand and Hagan fall to the sidewalk bleeding from the throat. John told her to call an ambulance, she said.

Monday Set For Ochiho Sentence

Zelma Ochiho, who pleaded guilty to manslaughter Friday after her first degree murder trial last week resulted in a hung jury, could be sentenced to a maximum 15 years in prison plus a fine not to exceed \$5,000.

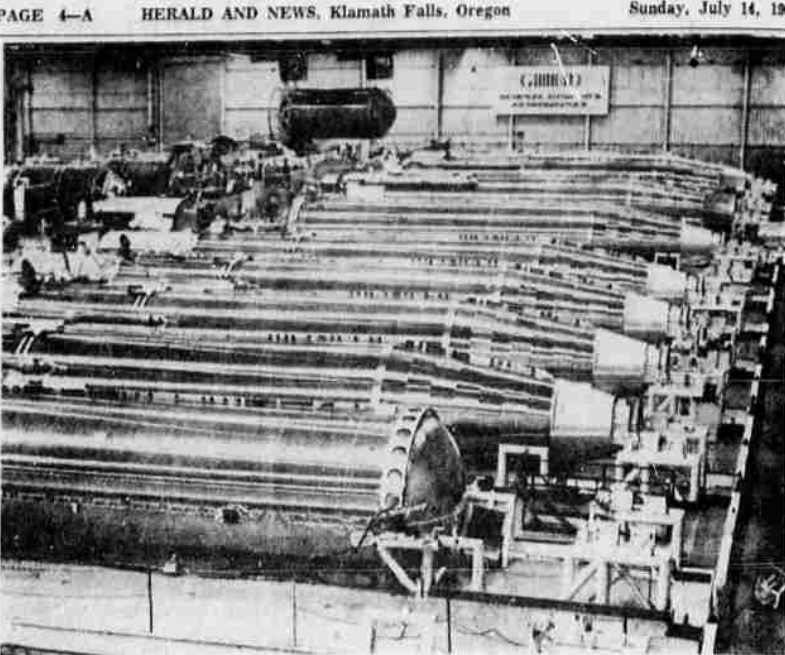
Circuit Court Judge Donald A. W. Piper set Monday, July 15, at 10 a.m. as the date for sentencing. Mrs. Ochiho was charged in the March 19 slaying of her first cousin, Mrs. Florence Huitt. Mrs. Huitt died from a wound inflicted by a .308 caliber bullet fired from Mrs. Ochiho's rifle, the same weapon with which she slew Bruce Miller about six months ago.

Mrs. Ochiho was acquitted by reason of self-defense in the first degree murder trial in the Miller case.

In the recent murder case the defense claimed that Mrs. Ochiho accidentally fired the bullet that killed her cousin. The state asked for a first degree murder verdict contending that the killing was done with premeditation and malice.

The jury of seven women and five men was finally dismissed at 3:30 a.m. Friday after they reported to Judge Piper that they were hopelessly deadlocked.

Early Friday afternoon Mrs. Ochiho's attorney indicated that his client wished to plead guilty to the lesser charge of manslaughter. The state accepted the lesser plea.

Crash Kills City Man

SUSANVILLE, Calif. (UPI) — Kenneth J. Wilson, 21, Klamath Falls, Ore., was killed early Friday when he was struck by a car on U.S. 395 while attempting to flag down an auto.

Wilson's auto, carrying a woman and five children, had broken down three miles south of Doyle, the California Highway Patrol said.

He was struck by an auto driven by Jess Arellano, 19, Reno, Nev.

The CHP said Wilson had no identification on his person. Officers said he was identified by the woman riding in his car.
