It read: Made in Hong Kong.

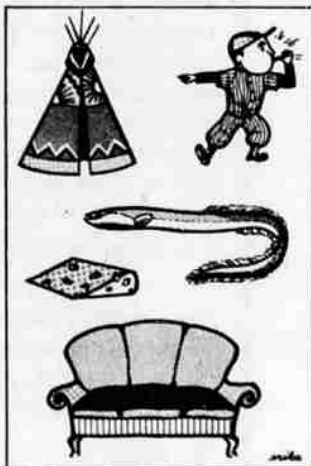

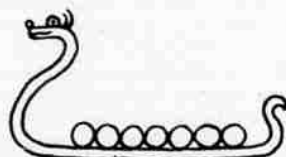

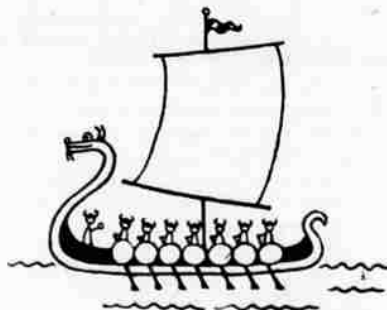
