

Firemen Still Douse Timbers After Pier Blaze In Tacoma

TACOMA, Wash. (UPI)—Firemen continued today in an attempt to douse small fires in the still smoldering timbers under Pier 7, scene of a huge waterfront blaze here Sunday which claimed one life, injured 17 and caused a great amount of property damage.

The fire roared over the million dollar pier Sunday afternoon, killing Fire Department battalion chief Arthur Strong, 57, and scorching four gigantic cranes.

The cranes were left standing over weakened and still burning timbers that threatened to give way and topple the 45-ton machines into the bay.

Seventeen firemen were injured and one, Dave Wilfong, 34, was admitted to St. Joseph's Hospital with smoke inhalation. His condition was listed as satisfactory today. Nine others were treated and released at hospitals.

The fire started when a crane ran over an electric cable and caused a short, sending sparks and flames onto the wooden pier area.

No Damage Estimate

Authorities of the Tacoma Port Commission were not able to make damage estimate immediately. A spokesman said the pier may not be a total loss and the damage to the cranes, if they do not crash into the water, cannot be assessed until the metal cools and their operating parts are tested.

The fire started about 2:30 p.m. and was brought under control about 8 p.m. The flames spread quickly to the timbers under the pier flooring and flashed along the whole length of the newest dock of the Tacoma waterfront.

Hoses Taken Under Pier

Firemen boarded 12-foot boats Sunday night and moved hoses beneath the pier in an attempt to prevent further outbreak of flames on the crescent-covered timbers.

At one point, firemen extinguished flames which had reached a shack used for storing a nitrate material which could give off poisonous fumes if hit by water. Residents and onlookers in the nearby area had been evacuated earlier when it was feared the flames could not be controlled.

Two large Japanese freighters, the Sanyo Maru and the Kuro Maru, were moved from the pier by tug boats in time to save them from serious damage.

U.S. Produces Millionaires Rapidly

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The nation is producing millionaires at the fastest clip since the get-rich-quick era of the late 1920s.

The Internal Revenue Service (IRS) in its latest tabulation on the subject — reported today that 338 persons filed returns showing \$1 million or more income in 1961.

This was the largest number since 1929 when the stock market was at the peak of its stratospheric binge, and the total of \$1 million taxpayers hit a record 513.

Ninety-two new faces were added to this select group in 1961, the biggest increase since 1929 when the number spurted by 221.

The IRS statistics show only those who reported earning \$1 million or more during the 1961 tax year. Authorities on the distribution of U. S. wealth estimate there are a lot more Americans who are worth \$1 million today.

Some have placed the number as high as 100,000.

Government tax reports, of course, mention no names, but from these studies, it is possible to get a statistical profile of the average \$1 million taxpayer in 1961. It would look something like this:

The average top-bracket taxpayer had an adjusted gross income of about \$2 million. He paid about \$300,000 in income taxes.

Most likely he was on a payroll, although his income from salaries was a drop in the bucket — to him, anyway. The biggest chunk of his earnings came from profits on the sale of such items as stocks and property.

The IRS Millionaires Club accounted for about .8 per cent of all taxes paid in 1961. By contrast, those in the \$6,000 to \$7,000 bracket paid 8.4 per cent of all taxes collected that year.

Rockefeller Warns Republicans Of 'Radical Right Lunatic Fringe'

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Supporters of Sen. Barry Goldwater today interpreted as a challenge New York Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller's attack on the GOP's "radical right."

Rockefeller, a possible GOP presidential candidate in 1964, said Sunday his party was being threatened by what he described as a growing subversion from the "radical right lunatic fringe."

Rockefeller also cautioned against abandoning northern industrial areas in order to concentrate on getting the southern vote. Such a plan would be disastrous, he said. He did not mention Goldwater; a conservatives' favorite for the GOP nomination, by name but his inference appeared clear.

Mrs. Ione F. Harrington, Republican national committee woman from Indiana and co-chairman of the new draft Goldwater committee, said today she believed Rockefeller's statement was "probably a prelude to the (national) governors' conference next week."

Rockefeller has announced that he plans to introduce a strong civil rights resolution at the conference. Previous attempts to put the governors on record with similar resolutions have resulted in a southern governors' talkathon that led to tabling of the resolutions.

Mrs. Harrington said she was concerned that Rockefeller interfered the Goldwater-for-president movement was sectional in nature. She said the committee had not "crossed off" any section of the nation in its projections of possible Goldwater vote strength in a presidential election.

Rockefeller pointed to the recent young Republican national convention in San Francisco as an example of how the "Republican party is in real danger of subversion by the radical, well-financed and highly disciplined" radical right.

He said the proceedings there were dominated by extremist groups, "carefully organized" well financed and operating through the tactics of ruthless, rough-shod intimidation.

"The leaders of the Birchers and others of the radical right lunatic fringe... who successfully engineered this disgraceful subversion... are the same people who are now moving to subvert the Republican party itself," he said. By "Birchers" he meant the John Birch Society.

"These are the tactics of totalitarianism," Rockefeller said.

The governor said these extremists preach programs of "disunity, disunity and the ultimate destruction of the confidence of the people in themselves. They are purveyors of hate and distrust."
