Test Ban Talks Underway

MOSCOW (UPI) — Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev, in a jovial, wise-cracking mood, met for 3 1/2 hours today with high U.S. and British negotiators in the opening of a Kremlin conference that could break the East-West deadlock on a nuclear test ban.

U.S. chief negotiator W. Averell Harriman and British Minister of Science Lord Hailsham, drove after the meeting to the U.S. Embassy where they presumably compared notes on the talks.

There was no immediate comment from either Western delegation.

Nor was it disclosed when the next meeting would take place in the talks which are expected to last about 10 days.

But Khrushchev's surprise move in heading the Soviet delegation at the opening of the negotiations raised Western hopes that some form of agreement—perhaps an accord for a limited test ban—might emerge from the crucial conference.

Khrushchev, in opening the three-power conference this afternoon, enthusiastically pumped the hands of presidential envoy Harriman and Lord Hailsham, and remarked: "Where do we begin? Perhaps we should begin by signing an agreement first."

In a bantering aside, the Soviet leader turned to Harriman and said: "You did right when you kicked the British out of America."

Khrushchev then turned to the British chief negotiator and said: "They acted with wisdom, they kicked you out."

Mumbled Reply

Hailsham's mumbled reply was not heard distinctly.

The Soviet leader had especially warm and personal greetings for Harriman, U.S. undersecretary of state who had dealt face-to-face with Josef Stalin while ambassador to Moscow during World War II.

Khrushchev, 69, vigorously shaking the 71-year-old Harriman's hand, exclaimed: "You are absolutely blooming, what are you doing? Are you counting the years backwards?"

"I began doing that a long time ago," answered Khrushchev with a broad grin.

In the light-hearted exchange before the doors were closed on the first session of the historic conference, Khrushchev told Harriman: "I am surrounded by the imperialists."

Large Conference Room

The three-power negotiations aimed at reaching agreement on at least a partial nuclear test ban opened in one of the large Kremlin conference rooms adjoining Khrushchev's office.

The Eastern and Western negotiators occupied 12 chairs on both sides of the table, with translators sitting at either end.

On the walls of the room were a map of the Soviet Union and portraits of Marx and Lenin. U.S., British and Soviet flags were arranged on the center of the negotiating table.

Khrushchev's decision to take a personal hand in the talks was one of the reasons for optimism among diplomats here that success may be in the offing after many months of deadlock on the nuclear testing issue.

Hailsham, Under Secretary of State W. Averell Harriman, the U.S. negotiator, and Soviet Deputy Foreign Minister Valerian A. Zorin all said they hoped the conference would lay the ground-work for a test ban treaty.

Joked With Hailsham

Hailsham, Britain's minister of science, held a courtesy meeting with Khrushchev before the formal talks to get acquainted. Khrushchev joked over Hailsham's mistake in confusing Zorin with Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko Sunday.

Gromyko, also present for the courtesy meeting, was all smiles.

Diplomats expected Khrushchev to sit in at the opening sessions of the negotiations, then turn over the job to a subordinate. But his presence added to other signs that have made observers here optimistic that East and West can reach their first major agreement since the Austrian state treaty of 1955. They included:

—Russia's growing split with Communist China and its apparent determination to put Khrushchev's "peaceful coexistence" policy ahead of all other considerations, including the unity of the Communist camp.

Called For Ban

Khrushchev's statement in East Berlin earlier this month calling for a partial test ban.

—Western willingness to settle for a limited ban if the Soviets will not agree to a comprehensive one.

Harriman made it clear on his arrival Sunday that the United States would like to end all testing, if agreement can be reached on inspection systems.

"We have come with the intention to do everything for the conclusion of a comprehensive ban on nuclear tests with the proper safeguards," he said.

"But if we cannot get a concrete test ban, we have prepared to agree on a partial test ban which would be a first step in the negotiation of a complete treaty."

Best Chances

Khrushchev's East Berlin speech and Western statements have indicated that the best chances for agreement now are on a ban of all tests in the atmosphere, outer space, and under water. These can be detected by each nation without the need for on-site inspectors or devices. If any power violates such a ban, the others will immediately know it.

Truck-Car Collision Injures Two

MACDOEL—A truck-car collision on U.S. Highway 97, two miles south of Macdoel at 2 p.m. Saturday, July 13, resulted in serious injuries for a California woman, Mrs. Doreen Townsend, 61, of San Jose and less serious hurts for three other California residents.

Mrs. Townsend suffered a broken arm, a deep cut across the eyes and other injuries. Her condition was reported by Klamath Valley Hospital officials to be satisfactory Monday morning.

Lesser hurts were suffered by her husband, Calvin K. Townsend, 62, a niece, Patterson Carr, 21, and Robert M. Carr, 39, driver of the southbound automobile which was pulling a 22-foot trailer.

All were taken to Klamath Valley Hospital by Peace Ambulance.

Carr, a retired federal employee, according to California State Highway Patrolman V. F. McMahon, apparently attempted to pass a flatbed truck, a 1950 southbound, driven by Archie W. McGarry, 61, P.O. Box 791 of Tulelake, a laborer, when McGarry made a left hand turn onto a county road. He was not hurt.

The collision demolished the car in which the San Jose residents were riding and slightly damaged the truck. The trailer was undamaged.

Passengers in the front seat were wearing seatbelts but Mrs. Townsend's apparently was not securely fastened and she was thrown out.

Carr was to be cited for passing at an intersection.

Following the wreck, Dailies Givan Jr., Klamath Falls, Henley district rancher, hauling cattle in a panel truck, discovered the truck was on fire and drove off the highway to extinguish the blaze, which set fire to dry grass.

The forest service sent men to put out the fire.

Slayer Of Three Children Confesses To Bizarre Crime

SANTA ROSA, Calif. (UPI) — A construction worker confessed to sheriff's officers Sunday that he killed three children, who had been taken to a California forest south of the Grand Canyon.

FBI agents and sheriff's deputies from Coconino County, Ariz., said Robert Alford, 36, a Negro, confessed the slayings after 12 hours of interrogation. The confession climaxed a month-long investigation by authorities in two states.

The bodies of the three Negro children were found June 6 in a heavily wooded area several miles north of Williams, Ariz. Each child had been shot in the head with a .32 caliber rifle and in the heart with a 45 caliber pistol.

The victims were Teddy Walker, 12, his sister, Jacqueline Walker, 11, and their half-sister, Carol Ann McCain, 14. They lived with their foster mother, Mrs. Bernice Fobbs, in Stockton, Calif.

Authorities said Alford, arrested Friday night on a sex offense charge from Los Angeles, gave this account of the events leading up to the slayings:

An unidentified friend told him last May that the children feared they were going to be separated, so he arranged for them to meet him when they got out of school in Stockton May 27.

Alford drove them back to his trailer camp residence in Santa Rosa, where he bought each of the children a bicycle and gave them money for new clothes during the next six days.

Started for Oklahoma

On June 2, Alford and the children left Santa Rosa for Oklahoma, where Alford said he had a sister who would take care of the youngsters. He said he gave each of the children \$50 for bus tickets that night in Bakersfield because he didn't think he could drive them all the way to Oklahoma.

The two youngest children gave their money to Carol Ann for safe keeping, but when the group arrived in Williams the following day Carol Ann said the money was gone.

Alford said a bitter argument started over the money, but he calmed down, bought the children soft drinks, and started out with them from Williams.

The construction worker said he turned off onto a dirt road about two miles from Williams, drove another mile and parked about 300 yards off the dirt road. There the argument over the money resumed, and Alford said he would find a home for the children in Williams.

Reached for Rifle

Alford told the children he could no longer afford to take care of them, but the youngsters said they would never leave him, Alford said he got angry again and reached under the floorboard of his truck for the rifle.

He said Carol Ann started to run and he fired at her. Alford told authorities that the next thing he remembered was that he was sitting on the ground with the two guns in his hands — both fired until they were empty.

Alford said he did not even look to see if the children were dead or alive. He jumped into the truck and drove back to Santa Rosa.

Chiloquin Woman Slain In Fight With Nevada Host

CHILQUIN — Barbara Jean Hatcher, 29, of Chiloquin, was shot through the heart and killed Sunday in what authorities at Gardnerville, Nev., said was the climax to an argument over who would buy the next bottle of liquor.

The victim, mother of a son and a daughter, Darrell and Denise Hatcher of Chiloquin, had been visiting in the Nevada town for about a month. She had been a guest of Mrs. Tomiseta Ruiz, 31, Sheriff's deputies reported that Mrs. Hatcher apparently got into an argument when Mrs. Ruiz, who had visited in Klamath County several times, said she had no more money for liquor. Officers reported the women had been drinking during the night previous to the morning slaying.

Mrs. Hatcher was shot twice, once through the arm and through the heart.

Mrs. Ruiz is being held for questioning in the county jail in Nevada.

In addition to her two children, Mrs. Hatcher is survived by one brother, Lloyd Lotches and a sister, Mildred Riddle of Chiloquin.

Also surviving are a brother and sister in California and three grandchildren at Newell.

Information Booth Issue Given Limited Support

MOUNT SHASTA—The fate of Mount Shasta's tourist information booth was still undecided at the July 11 chamber of commerce meeting. Orbell Apperson Jr., chairman of the booth committee, stated his group recommends the booth be kept open on a limited basis.

The chamber voted to pay \$150 a month for the next two months for the booth's maintenance. The Motel Hotel Association has withdrawn its \$75 monthly contribution but has offered to pay the chamber 10 per cent of the first night's lodging obtained through booth reservation. The Ski Bowl Association has withdrawn its \$50 monthly payment until the ski season starts, leaving the chamber the entire support which runs approximately \$1800 a year.

Letters to chamber members have been mailed advising them of a raise in dues effective July 1, 1963. Dues are now \$50 for general business, \$25 for representative business, and \$12.50 for government, state employees, and school teachers. Dues may be paid in a lump sum, quarterly, or semi-annually.

In other business, a committee was formed consisting of Curt Barnes, Pat Murdoch, David Otis, and Apperson to coordinate and integrate the interests of the chamber and the Ski Bowl Association for participation in a ski festival to be held in Dodger Stadium in October.

President David E. Otis received permission to begin his radio and newspaper advertising proposal for a general face-lifting of the city, to prepare an industrial brochure, and to give the public a resume of the chamber's functions and activities. A membership drive is to start at the next meeting.

The budget committee reported its tentative budget for the 1962-63 fiscal year as \$400 to the merchants' promotion days, \$500 for the lighted sign at Castella, \$500 for special promotions, \$750 for fireworks, and \$300 for conventions.

Appearance Set For John Dean

John Wesley Dean, 57, 504 1/2 South Fifth Street, will be arraigned in District Court Monday afternoon on a charge of second degree murder in the stabbing of his brother Hagan, 37, on July 8.

The victim died in Klamath Valley Hospital early Saturday morning and the district attorney's office indicated a prior charge of assault with a dangerous weapon would be changed to murder in the second degree.

City police said a witness, Julia E. Biles, 504 1/2 South Fifth Street, saw the brothers fighting in the street outside her house. She said the victim fell to the sidewalk bleeding from the throat. Hagan had been in satisfactory condition at Klamath Valley, but went into shock early Saturday from severe internal bleeding.
