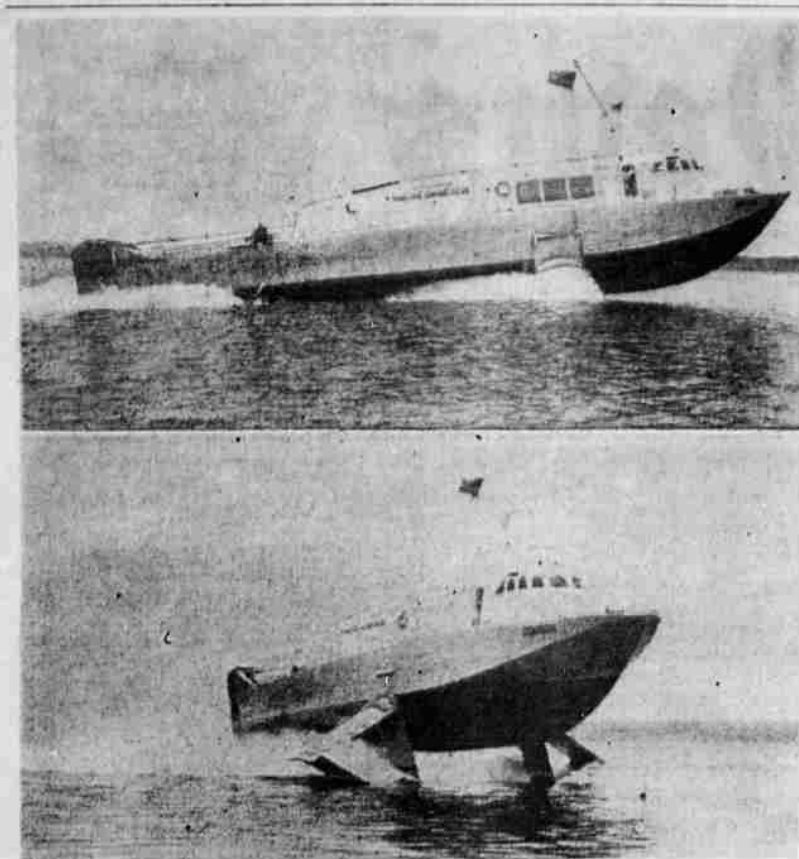

Nikita's Actions Quizzed

MOSCOW (UPI) — Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev has been acting oddly in recent days for a man who once banged his shoe at the West and professed eternal friendship for Communist China.

He has snubbed a Chinese delegation here for ideological talks, and just as openly welcomed a Western delegation here to discuss a nuclear test ban treaty.

The Chinese, nominally Russia's allies, are subjected to bitter attacks as racists, warmongers, and rivals for world Communist leadership. The United States and Britain, who are on the opposite side in the cold war, are greeted with jokes and hand-claps.

The contrast is so obvious that many diplomats here are asking if Khrushchev is planning to seek

Civil Rights Stand Taken

PORTLAND (UPI) — Former Sen. William Knowland of California said Monday it was too bad that those persons who had led the fight for one segment of civil rights have not equally stressed civil obligations and civil responsibilities.

Knowland, publisher of the Oakland Tribune, spoke at the opening session of the 23rd annual convention of the National Sheriffs' Association.

He said that a person seeking civil rights had no right to "ride roughshod" over the constitutional rights of the rest of the nation's citizens and to claim that any minority can impose by unconstitutional means its views upon the majority of our people without their consent.

"The American people are a just people, they are a patient people, they are an understanding people, and they are a law-abiding people," he said.

He said civil rights are far more broad than racial rights alone.

Hatfield Considered
On another subject, Knowland said Oregon Gov. Mark Hatfield was one of five men who rank immediately behind Nelson Rockefeller and Barry Goldwater as possible Republican presidential nominees next year.

Knowland listed the others as Govs. William Scrantom of Pennsylvania, George Romney of Michigan and James Rhodes of Ohio and Sen. Thurston Morton of Kentucky.

"Hatfield is personable and he is one of not too many Republican governors," Knowland said. "His name gets consideration in California."

The ex-senator said Hatfield also was considered as a top candidate for the vice presidency on the GOP ticket next year.

Turning to foreign policy, Knowland attacked the Kennedy administration for what he called its "vacillating policy" on Cuba. He offered a plan of action based on an increasing squeeze on Cuba and creation of a Freedom Volunteer Corps to be used as a last resort in freeing the island.

Rockefeller Attacks Goldwater

MASSENA, N.Y. (UPI) — Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller leveled another attack on the presidential candidacy of Sen. Barry Goldwater Monday night, expressing the fear that the Arizona conservative will become a "captive" candidate of extreme right wing factions.

"I have great respect for Goldwater," said Rockefeller following a speech before the New York State Society of Newspaper Editors, "but I'm concerned he may become the captive of those elements."

Goldwater, considered by many to be the front-running candidate for the 1964 Republican nomination, has made no formal announcement of his plans to run, but Rockefeller said it could be assumed the senator would indicate his availability.

Monday night's statement was Rockefeller's second attack in two days on "radical right" groups backing Goldwater, and the double assault was interpreted by political observers as an attempt by the governor to recover lost ground in the race for the GOP nomination.

Rockefeller was believed to be in the Republican driver's seat until his recent remarriage to a divorced woman when, suddenly, Goldwater's stock began to soar. Sunday, the governor lashed out at the "radical right lunatic branch," warning the Republican party was in "real danger of subversion" by this group. He said the radical right was "embarked on a determined and ruthless effort to take over the party, its platform and its candidates on their own terms."

He made no specific mention of Goldwater in those remarks but the senator's supporters took them as a challenge. A Goldwater spokesman Monday night quoted the senator as saying the Rockefeller statement amounted to his "formal declaration of candidacy" for the presidency.

Concerning his own candidacy, Rockefeller told the newspaper editors he had not made up his mind yet, but would make his decision known well before the 1964 GOP convention.

Prices Set On Milk

SALEM (UPI) — Producers of 3.5 per cent butterfat class 1 milk in all but three counties will be paid \$5.30 a hundredweight, the State Department of Agriculture ordered Monday.

The announcement was made by E. W. Sawyer, Department of Agriculture milk stabilization chief, as a result of hearings held in June. The price was set under the milk price control law passed by the 1963 legislature.

Class 2 milk was priced at \$2.90 for 3.5 per cent milk with a six-cent differential.

The new prices will go into effect Aug. 1 in all counties except Harney, Malheur and Curry.

The \$5.30 class 1 figure is equivalent to \$5.66 on the basis of a 4 per cent milk, which has previously been used as the price level.

In Curry County regulations call for \$5.40 for class 1 3.5 per cent milk with a 7.3-cent butterfat point differential. The class 2 price will be \$2.90 for 3.5 per cent milk with a 6-cent differential.

The Malheur-Harney class 1 price will be \$5.20 for 4 per cent milk with 8.5 cents per butterfat point differential and \$3.38 for class 2 with 7.1 cents per point differential.

All prices are FOB the milk handlers' plants, which means producers will pay the hauling charges.

Class 1 milk is that used in the bottle and can trade. Class 2 is surplus milk used in manufacturing such products as cheese and ice cream.

Sawyer said that in the last 10 years class 1 prices to producers have declined from \$6.20 to \$5.50 while production costs have increased about 20 per cent.

The \$5.30 price has been in effect since June 1 when two major dealers cut the price from \$5.85.

World Appears On Edge Of Profound Changes

Perhaps unfortunately for the bad taste that could come later, there is a mounting feeling that the world is at the threshold of profound changes. In Western capitals the hope is that it will be for the better.

Chief basis for this hope is the widening split between the Soviet Union and its Red Chinese allies, and the corollary belief that a split with Red China would make Nikita Khrushchev more amenable toward reaching understanding with the West.

Lending support to these hopes have been a number of factors: —In Moscow, the ideological battle between the two Communist giants has been going according to the script laid down weeks and months ago by the warring propaganda organs of the two nations and no compromise appears in sight.

—Khrushchev's own apparent belief, as reported to NATO by Belgian Foreign Minister Paul-Henri Spaak, is that now is the time to reach some agreement on at least a partial nuclear test ban and that such an agreement is possible in the talks which began this week.

—Of lesser importance but a straw in the wind, the arrival in Moscow this week, at the Soviet invitation, of an Indian team seeking Russian air-to-air missiles and other arms and equipment whose use clearly would be intended as defense against Red China.

Fancy Outruns Fact
In London, where hopes of an eventual accord with the Soviets always have run higher than in Washington, fancy has so far outstripped fact as to lead to speculation that partial agreement now on a nuclear test ban naturally would lead to an East-West summit.

The factors leading to these mounting hopes have been reported by Western capitals by correspondents with access to high sources.

America lost a soldier but gained a world-famed writer when a bottle of bourbon was found in the West Point cadet quarters of Edgar Allan Poe. Then, as now, this was cause for dismissal.

But a note of caution is not amiss.

A warning note came from chief U.S. negotiator Averell Harriman who said before leaving London that a test-ban agreement is "not in the bag by a long shot."

Khrushchev admittedly has big problems on his hands. But he did not reach his high estate in the Soviet hierarchy by giving away all the cards in his hand in advance.

In the Red Chinese he faces a formidable adversary. One of his strongest weapons against them is the threat that he will reach accord with the West, a possibility which he now is encouraging.

On their part, the Chinese already have labelled the ideological talks in Moscow a failure, but they also say they can be patient.

Agreement can come now or a year from now or later. The Chinese have been careful not to stir the enmity of the Soviet people. All of their fire has been centered upon Khrushchev personally and they are banking on his downfall.

Meanwhile, they also will be careful to keep their lines to Moscow open.

Debate Asked By Hatfield

SALEM (UPI) — Gov. Mark Hatfield suggested Monday that the two leading Republican presidential hopefuls, New York Gov. Nelson Rockefeller and Arizona Sen. Barry Goldwater, meet in face-to-face debate before the Oregon primary next year.

He called for the debate "as in the high level objective tone of the Dewey-Stassen debate."

Thomas E. Dewey and Harold Stassen appeared frequently in Oregon during the 1948 Republican primary campaign which was climaxed by a face-to-face debate.

Dewey's subsequent Oregon primary victory gave him a big boost toward getting the GOP presidential nomination that year.

"Our party is in no position to incite political mayhem by ruthless intramural attacks which can only lead to fratricide. We advance neither the cause of the party nor individual candidacies

by such tactics," Hatfield warned. Referring to recent Rockefeller and Goldwater speeches, Hatfield declared it is "obvious" from their statements "a magnificent opportunity exists for constructive discussion of bed rock issues."

"We can disagree without being disagreeable. Clear positive views on an impersonal basis should be welcomed by all within the party," Hatfield declared.

He warned the Republicans will face a common opponent in the coming election and declared the party would need the support of all its members, independents and "discerning Democrats" to win.
