Meany Asks Congress Aid

WASHINGTON (UPI) — AFL-CIO President George Meany asked Congress today to help the Negro find the same job opportunities on the assembly line that he now enjoys on the baseball field.

In testimony prepared for the House Judiciary Committee, Meany supported the administration's request for statutory authority for the President's Committee on Equal Employment Opportunity.

But, he said, the best way to end job discrimination is to provide enough jobs for everyone.

"Equal opportunity is meaningless without full opportunity," Meany said. "The real remedy is jobs for all."

WALL STREET

NEW YORK (UPI) — Stocks showed only mild reaction today to the Securities Exchange Commission's recommendation that floor traders be abolished on the New York and American stock exchanges.

Some of the higher priced more volatile issues such as IBM, Control Data and Xerox dropped considerably on the news. However, a few old line quality stocks like U.S. Steel, American Telephone and General Electric showed little effect.

White Motor and Chrysler rose roughly 1 in a higher auto sector, Eastman Kodak featured the chemicals, up about 1, Singer Co. topped around 2 after announcing it will acquire Friden for \$175 million of stock. Friden did not open during the first hour because of an accumulation of buy orders.

WALL STREET CHATTER

NEW YORK (UPI) — "The market realizes it faces a difficult test overhead in the attempt to move above the 1963 highs of 728.96 in the Dow-Jones industrial and 176.19 in the rails," notes Harris, Upham & Co.

Helping sentiment in coming weeks will be the second quarter reports which generally should compare favorably with a year ago. The 19-day breather on the rail strike also is encouraging.

"However, less favorable is the rumor of an increase in some interest rates," the company says.

Bregman, Cummings & Co. says the present consolidation in the market probably has a little farther to go but should be completed without severe impairment of price levels or sentiment. The company believes the next major move "will be up."

"Only the continued very low volume can be cited as a favorable factor as the market continues to go through this tedious process of rebuilding," says Bache & Co. However, the brokerage house says that with the flow of second quarter earnings reports about to reach heavy proportions it would be surprised if the current correction carries much farther.

Youngsters Drown In KID Canal

A tragic drowning took the lives of two Klamath area teenage boys at 10:45 a.m. Tuesday when the tractor they were riding slipped into the Klamath Irrigation District F canal three miles south of State Highway 66 along the Poe Valley Road.

The victims were Terry Eugene High, 14, and Martin William High, 12, sons of Mr. and Mrs. Taylor High, Route 2, Box 742. High is a well-known Klamath County rancher.

The boys had been helping their father in the fields Tuesday morning when they were told to go back home and mow the lawn. The youths took one of the family tractors and started to return home along the road on the canal bank.

State police said from the evidence at the scene they could not determine any reason for the accident. The tractor apparently just gradually went off the bank into the six foot deep water and the boys were pinned underneath, they said.

When High returned home about a half hour later he discovered that the boys had not returned and he went out looking for them. The father discovered the tractor in the water with only the wheels not submerged.

High rushed home to call state police and the Suburban Fire Department and then ran back to the field to get a second tractor to pull the other out of the canal.

The father then pulled the tractor part way out of the water and dove into the canal several times before he recovered his sons' bodies.

The fire department's rescue unit, which had been called about 11:20 p.m., arrived a short time later and attempted to revive the youths with the resuscitator and mouth to mouth breathing. Dr. Martin J. Adams, county medical examiner, pronounced the victims dead at the scene. The bodies were removed by Peace Ambulance and taken to O'Hair's Funeral Home.

The boys are survived by their mother and father, brother Dean, 11; sister, Brenda, 9; grandparents Mr. and Mrs. Rex High, grandfather Charles King, and other relatives.

Funeral arrangements have not yet been made, O'Hair's announced.

"The family said a memorial will be formed in the boys' names and anyone wishing to send gifts for the memorial is asked to contact Mrs. A. H. Stone, Route 2, Box 8105.

Ranch Sold For \$300,000

PORTLAND (UPI) — The 12,681-acre Yancey Dry Creek ranch near Prineville was auctioned off in parcels here for about \$300,000, it was reported Tuesday.

The ranch is one of the oldest livestock operations in the Prineville area.

The ranch was sold earlier this year by Orville and Don Yancey to Prineville Lake Ranch, Inc., of Los Angeles.

Barney C. Corbin, Los Angeles, spokesman for the latter firm, said the property was sold because of other pressing business.

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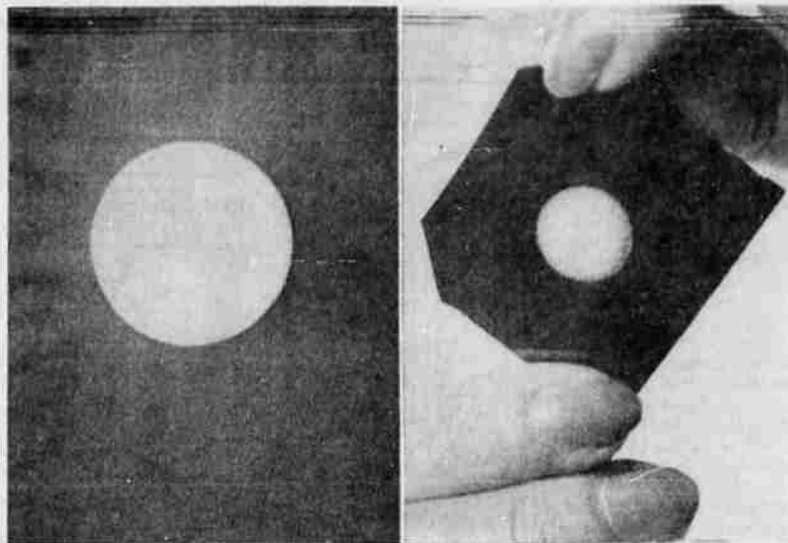

Fire-Fighters Mopping Up

Fire-fighters of the Klamath Forest Protective Association early today were continuing mopping up operations at the scene of a grass and brush fire which swept over one and one-half acres on the California-Oregon state line, near Highway 97, Sunday, according to George Wardell, KFFPA supervisor.

The fire was one of seven started by lightning on KFFPA lands since Sunday, increasing the number of forest fires for this year to 44. Of that number, 25 have been caused by lightning, while the other 19 were man caused.

Meanwhile, the Winema National Forest reported that no fires were detected within the forest boundaries since Sunday.

The fire near the state line took off about dark Saturday night and was observed by California Division of Forestry lookouts stationed at Mt. Ball and Mt. Orr. The California forestry department dispatched a six-man team to assist KFFPA fire-fighters in controlling the blaze, which brought a total of 14 men, a bulldozer, 1,000 gallon pumper truck, and two four-wheel drive trucks to the area.

As a KFFPA fire fighting team was winding up its operations on the state-line fire, another team was seeking out a fire which was reported near Swan Lake by Neil Banta, a rancher of that area. As of noon today the fire had not been located, Wardell said.

The six other fires occurred in the Camp Six area, near Bly, and consisted primarily of spot fires. Considerable rain accumulated.

The Oregon Scenic Area Commission held a hearing Tuesday on two proposals to keep billboards from the highway.

One petition filed by the Mill City Garden Club would prohibit billboards from the junction of U.S. 20 and Oregon Highway 22 east to Sisters.

A petition from the Mill City Women's Club would keep billboards from the highway between the junction and the Pacific Highway east of Salem.

If the Scenic Area Commission approves the petition the only billboards allowed would be those within city limits and on roadside business premises. About 40 billboards now standing would have to be removed within seven years.

Hearing On Contempt Charge Set

A hearing on a demurrer involving contempt of court charges filed against Sheriff Murray "Red" Britton by the district attorney's office has been set for 10 a.m. tomorrow, Thursday, in one of the county's two circuit courts, the Herald and News learned today.

The hearing will be held in either courtroom No. 1 or No. 2, depending upon which of the rooms is available at the time, according to a court spokesman.

Judge Don H. Sanders of Douglas County will preside at the proceedings which developed last April after Sheriff Britton was charged with having discussed the Robert Huitt case with a

member of the jury while the trial was in process.

As a result of the alleged conversation between the sheriff and the juror, the case was declared void by Judge David R. Vandenberg and a new trial was reset for Aug. 6 in the same court. Soon after the discussion was made known, Deputy District Attorney Bob Thomas presented

Huitt had been on trial for assault with a dangerous weapon as the result of shooting a California man in the leg at the defendant's residence in Agency.

Sheriff Britton is also a subject in two other court actions slated to take place later in Klamath County circuit courts.

On July 22, the sheriff is scheduled for trial on a charge of "causing a prisoner to escape from official detention," which developed March 16 when he allegedly released a prisoner from custody although that person had not posted bail.

The sheriff is also one of four county law enforcement officers named in a \$7,500 civil suit in connection with holding an Indian youth in the county jail for a period of 105 days without appearing with him before a judge.

The case against Jess Williams Jr., charged with contributing to the delinquency of a minor, has been dismissed by Judge David R. Vandenberg at the request of a deputy district attorney, who cited that there was not sufficient evidence to proceed with the trial.

The charge against Roy Weems, accused of knowingly uttering and publishing a forged bank check, was reduced to attempting to commit larceny by impersonating another. The lesser charge is a misdemeanor offense and the case, scheduled on the circuit court docket for today, was transferred to the district court which has jurisdiction over such offenses. Weems is alleged to have cashed a worthless bank check in the amount of \$53 to Dorene Dippold.

Both men were indicted by the grand jury last June 12.

W. H. Roush Dies At 93

LAKEVIEW — William Henry Roush, 93, who was born Dec. 8, 1869, in Cedarville, Calif., died in Lakeview on July 15. He was a retired rancher and had lived in this area for the past 30 years. In 1891 he was married to Melissie Alice Paxton, who died April 30, 1950.

Surviving are two sons, John of Lakeview and Roy of Santa Rosa, Calif.; two daughters, Mrs. Darrell Garrett of Ashland and Mrs. William Hotchkiss of Lakeview; eight grandchildren, 20 great-grandchildren, and 15 great-great-grandchildren.

Funeral services will be Thursday, July 18, at the Oakes-Osterman Chapel, with the Rev. Elwyn Tesche officiating. Burial will be in the IOOF Cemetery.
