Judge Studies Demurrer In Sheriff Britton Case

Judge Don H. Sanders of Roseburg has taken under advisement a demurrer filed on behalf of Sheriff Murray "Red" Britton, indicted last April by the Klamath County Grand Jury on charges of criminal contempt of court, it developed in County Circuit Court before noon today.

Sheriff Britton had been cited on the contempt charge by the district attorney's office for allegedly discussing the Robert H. Hitt trial with a member of the jury panel which was assigned to the trial, then in session. As a result of the conversation the trial was declared void and a date for a new trial was set for Aug. 6.

Later, Chief Justice William McAllister named Judge Sanders to preside over the case when the Klamath County Circuit Court requested the supreme court to appoint a disinterested juror to conduct the trial.

In court today, the attorney representing Britton argued the demurrer on two grounds.

First, the court does not have jurisdiction on this matter because affidavits charging the contempt had not been presented to the sheriff, he said.

Second, the affidavits do not define the nature of the conversation between the sheriff and the juror, nor does it disclose the intent of the sheriff in commenting on the case, the attorney said further.

The attorney charged that the only statement allegedly made to the juror by the sheriff was "Now you see what the D.A.'s office and we have to put up with."

The sheriff is accused of having joined the juror in an elevator at the basement of the courthouse and proceeded with her to the second floor. Then the sheriff stopped the elevator between floors and disclosed to the juror the contents of a letter that Hitt had written to his attorney.

"Nowhere in the affidavit is it stated what were the intentions of the sheriff in discussing this issue," the attorney continued.

Two burglaries and the theft of an automobile were investigated by the Klamath Falls Police Department Wednesday night. The stolen vehicle was recovered by police at 9:28 p.m. at the corner of Main and Tenth streets after it overheard and the thief abandoned it.

The vehicle was reported stolen by owner George Anderson, 3838 Alva Street, at about 8 p.m. Wednesday. He said it was parked in front of the Lucky Lanes Bowling Alley.

City police were able to lift several fingerprints from the car, but have no suspects in the case.

Some burglar might have gotten a "belly-full" Wednesday night after he broke into the Medo-Bel Dairy, 1114 East Main Street. The janitor told police locks on the firm's storeroom and warehouse were broken.

Police learned that apparently nothing was taken, except a quantity of ice cream. Police were not able to determine if the stolen goods were eaten then, or later.

Another break-in investigated by city police occurred at the Oregon State Employment Office, 801 Oak Street. One of the rear windows in the building was broken with what police thought might have been a brick and entry was gained through the window.

Nothing was reported missing except a letter opener knife that was on top of one of the desks in the office. Police suspect the culprits wore gloves and a tennis shoe footprint was found under the window.

Police indicated there were no suspects in the case.

Council Seeks Civil Defense Program Money

SALEM (UPI)—A new attempt will be made to get state money for Oregon's sharply curtailed civil defense program.

The new State Civil Defense Advisory Council decided at its first meeting here today to ask the State Emergency Board for \$50,000 at its Aug. 2 meeting.

Louis Starr, Portland, one of the two public members of the new advisory group, suggested the action be taken to assure that six county civil defense units could continue to function.

The money would be used to add three more persons to the present state civil defense staff. The staff was slashed from 10 to three by the 1963 legislature.

Part of the duties of the three additional persons would be to process county applications for federal civil defense money.

Starr said some of the present county organizations are "about ready to fold."

He said that one county has investigated the possibility of working through the state of Washington civil defense agency so that it could get federal equipment.

The new council which met today, set up by the recent legislature, replaces one made up entirely of public members. Heads of major state agencies are included in the new advisory group along with two public members, Starr and William Hedlund, Portland.

At this morning's session presided over by Gov. Mark Hatfield, a report was given on the new civil defense communication center in the Capitol.

Tulelake High School Board Rejects Proposed Budget Of Superintendent

TULELAKE — The Tulelake Joint Union High School Board of Trustees, faced with an agenda including a special election, the annual budget, decision on the mutual hiring of certified teaching personnel, class scheduling and other pertinent business for the coming school year, held a lengthy session at the high school July 16.

The proposed budget for the coming year in the amount of \$226,661, which was presented to the board by Superintendent J. R. Daughenbaugh, was rejected after a study of discrepancies in amounts needed between previous budgets and the budget for the coming 1963-1964 school year.

A specific item questioned was an increase of \$1,200 for fuel oil which Daughenbaugh explained was increased to permit the use of the added cash for expenses in other school departments when need arose.

The budget-minded board declined to approve this method of handling surplus money, asserting that each item should be budgeted as closely as possible with excess from the various cost areas to be turned into the surplus fund, and transferred for other use at the time needed.

Questioned as to the sharp increase in last year's budget, the superintendent explained that the extra money was used "to pay off a teacher and extraordinary costs for substitute teacher salaries." Other increases were not explained due to lack of records brought to the meeting by the school official.

The board approved a proposed annual budget compiled by the Siskiyou County school superintendent's office with the assistance of Robert Baker, Tulelake School Board trustee, after local board consideration. Another public hearing will be held in Tulelake during the Aug. 8 school board meeting and the acceptable budget will then be presented to the county school office for final action.

During the finances study, it was determined that the reserve fund for the Tulelake Joint Union High School approximates \$29,424.78 as compared to \$10,092 in the same fund in the budget rejected.

The board accepted the responsibility of giving aid in class scheduling and teacher placement, and called a meeting for Thursday, July 18, at 8 p.m. at the high school for this work.

In answer to questioning of others present on the availability of funds for buying up the coming year's contract from Superintendent Daughenbaugh in the amount of \$10,000, which has been proposed, the board assured the session that such funds were available in reserve and that there would be no school tax increase.

A replacement for the school official would follow from a list of available candidates should results of the proposed public election on Friday night, July 19, be in the affirmative for his removal.

Voters in the Tulelake Joint Union High School District on that date will have an opportunity to express opinion on retaining or releasing the superintendent from his present contract. Voting will start at 8 p.m.

In other business, a letter from Dugan and Mest, Klamath Falls, who furnish the high school with the driver training car, was read which stated that the firm considered the 26,000 miles registered at present on the car in excess of need, which could jeopardize further use of the vehicle by the high school.

It was further revealed by the office of the county school superintendent in a communication from the county office that the figure of \$96,228.83 quoted by Robert Baker of the Tulelake School Board at a recent meeting was correct. The amount was the increase in school expenses for the last two-year period over the previous two years.

The board turned down the installation of air purifiers in the locker rooms and instructed the administrator to seek samples of athletic gear before orders were placed.

It was conceded that more accurate records should be kept of the summer recreation program in which the school participates with other agencies, after a number of items listed could not be checked out.

Tulelake Joint Union High School has been accredited by the Western States Accreditation Service until June 30, 1969.

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West Coast Fishermen On 'Strike'

Commercial salmon fishermen on the West Coast are staying in port in an attempt to force an increase in the price of silver salmon, it was reported today.

The United Fishermen and Allied Workers in Canada started a strike Tuesday and asked for support from United States fishermen.

Leonard Hall, Coos Bay, a member of the Oregon Fish Commission, estimated the "strike" was about 90 per cent effective on the Oregon and Washington coasts. He said there were about 3,000 trollers in the two states.

The action was largely spontaneous on the part of the fishermen, he said.

Fishermen in the Coos Bay and Charleston area have remained in port since Wednesday night, demanding a five-cent price increase to 30 cents per pound for silvers.

Several other boats have been tied up at Florence.

However, at Newport fishermen were unloading their catches and said they planned to return to sea. A spokesman for Bumble Bee Sea Foods at Astoria said that firm has heard radio reports from boats that they plan to tie up, but have no direct word.

Fred Bullock, manager of Fishermen's Cooperative Association, Seattle, said his 1,700-member organization has no jurisdiction over independent fishermen and is taking no part in the tie-up.

He said the Halibut Producers Cooperative in Seattle has the same policy and will allow its salmon fishermen to do as they wish.

The boy had been berry-picking with his father and was crossing the road when he was hit by a car driven by Earl Russell Hill, 54, Eugene. He was pronounced dead on arrival at a Coquille hospital.

Negro Student Offered Post By Portland

PORTLAND (UPI) — A Negro college student who complained Tuesday he was discriminated against in hiring policies of the city park bureau has been offered a job.

Samuel Macon, 25, a Lewis and Clark College senior, said he will take the post, offered by City Commissioner Ormond Bean Wednesday.

Macon and another Negro, Nathan Jones, 24, also a student at Lewis and Clark, complained to the State Labor Bureau that they had been barred from jobs as city playground directors because of race.

City officials denied the charge.

Mayor Terry Schunk accused the bureau's division of Civil Rights of "putting on a big show."

The petition prepared by the Labor Bureau's civil rights division accused City Recreation Supervisor Dorothea Lensch of discrediting Macon's performance last year when he worked temporarily for the park bureau.
