

Klamath Basin Residents Will See Eclipse Of Sun

The first major solar eclipse visible in the United States since April 23, 1912, will be on display to residents of the Klamath Basin about noon Saturday, but people would be wise to let the phenomenon pass unnoticed.

The word of caution is from the National Society for the Prevention of Blindness which states that viewing the spectacle through smoked glass, exposed photographic negatives or colored bottles can result in incurable burns of the eye retina from infrared rays of the sun.

Dr. John Ferree, executive director of the national society, warned that there is no safe method of looking directly into the eclipse without risking incurable eye burns.

Nixon Blasts 'Concessions In Test Ban

FRANKFURT, Germany (UPI)—Former Vice President Richard M. Nixon Tuesday said any further Western concessions in nuclear test ban talks would be "a victory for communism."

Nixon, on an extended vacation tour with his family, told United Press International, "I feel we have made quite sufficient concessions on a nuclear test ban treaty."

"If we make any further concessions in Moscow, the treaty would be a victory for communism," Nixon said, referring to the Anglo-American talks going on now with the Soviet Union.

"On the other hand, if we enter the discussions hard-headed and with a realistic understanding of Soviet aims, we may very well achieve an acceptable treaty," the defeated 1960 GOP candidate for president said.

Discusses Presidential Race
Nixon, accompanied by his wife and two daughters and friends, also discussed the coming 1964 presidential race.

"I should have something to say in about three months. If you say anything now you put yourself out on a limb. All those who will be candidates will have to declare themselves within three months and then I'll be able to throw my support to the man I believe can do the best job," Nixon said.

"I definitely will not declare myself a candidate," he said. Nixon, pausing in Frankfurt on a hop from Switzerland to Hungary, spoke about New York Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller's charges that extreme right-wingers hope to gain control of the Republican party.

"Can Make Trouble"

"It's true that the extreme right wing — the nuts or the kooks as we call them in California — can make plenty of trouble for us as they did for me in California," Nixon said, referring apparently to his unsuccessful bid for the California governorship last year.

Nixon said the GOP's extreme right wing is "potent, noisy and well-financed, but I do not think they will dominate the convention," in which the GOP will pick its presidential candidate next year.

Nixon said it is true that "the extreme right wing is behind Sen. Barry Goldwater now. But I do not think he is one of them. And I am sure he must regard them as a liability just as I do."

Some extreme right-wingers regard the Republican senator from Arizona as "too liberal," Nixon said.

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rectly. But during an eclipse enough light is blocked out to permit easy observation," he said.

"This is when the rays do their damage unnoticed, because the retina is not sensitive to pain," he concluded.

"When the burn is serious enough to scar that small portion of the retina where the rays were focused, no treatment can cure it," he warned. The scar causes a defect of vision which may show up as a dark spot on whatever the eye is observing at the time.

Dr. William Shackelford, president of the Oregon Optometric Association, advised potential observers that their "best bet is to read about the eclipse after it happens."

But Dr. Seth Kerron, Klamath County Health Officer, said that the eclipse may be viewed safely through smoked glass for several seconds at a time. He emphasized the importance of observing the stellar attraction for only a moment or two at a time and stated that two peeks should be sufficient.

The celestial show is scheduled to start 11:04 a.m. and will reach its peak at 1:28 p.m. when the moon will eclipse about 55 per cent of the sun's surface. As the moon passes between the earth and the sun the Klamath Basin will emerge into a period of pseudo twilight—by 4:07 p.m. it will be all over.

Meanwhile, a 60-mile path extending from Anchorage, Alaska, across Canada to the east coast of Maine will be in total darkness during the incident. By 4:07 p.m. it will be all over.

The amount of shielding of the sun's rays will be lessened at various distances to either side of the eclipse, but even as far south as Mexico City 7.6 per cent

of the sun's surface will be covered.

A safe method of observing the eclipse has been advanced by the Washington State Medical Association and consists of punching a hole in a card to project the sun's image on a screen.

The observer then always has his back to the sun and avoids any direct exposure of his eyes. A simple modification of this method might be to make a hole in one end of an open carton and direct the hole toward the sun so that an image of the sun is formed on the opposite wall of the carton, the association added.

There will not be another eclipse of the sun visible in any part of the United States until 1970, and not until 2017 will a solar eclipse be visible to so many Americans as during this month.

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Committee Okays Mexican Labor

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The Senate Agriculture Committee Wednesday approved a one-year extension of a law under which Mexicans can be brought into the United States for seasonal farm work.

The action set the stage for a second congressional scrap this year over continuation of the Mexican program past its scheduled Dec. 31 termination date. The House earlier defeated a bill to extend the program for two years without change.

The committee approved the bill by Sens. Gordon Allott and Peter H. Dominick, Colorado Republicans, on an 11-5 roll call vote.

Under the Allott-Dominick bill, authorization for importing braceros — Mexican farmhands — would continue through Dec. 31, 1964 with no change in other terms of the basis bracero law. The Kennedy administration recommended a one-year extension coupled with new restrictions designed to reduce the impact of the program of domestic workers.

Farm spokesmen urging extension of the program have maintained that many farmers in parts of California and some other states, mainly in the Southwest, would be hit hard by a cutoff of Mexican labor because they could not get enough domestic labor at critical harvest and cultivating periods.

Church and labor groups have been fighting extension of the program, asserting that the use of Mexican labor depresses wages and working standards for American migratory farm workers.

Found Guilty
FORT SMITH, Ark. (UPI)—A jury found Spec. 4 Phillip C. Dimick Jr. of Jefferson, Ore., guilty of involuntary manslaughter Tuesday in the stabbing of another man May 31.

Dimick had faced first degree murder charges in the slaying of Denver Hubbard, 23, Van Buren, Ark. Another soldier, Pfc. John P. Meekma, testified Hubbard struck Dimick before the stabbing.

Circuit Judge Paul Wolfe set sentencing for Thursday. Dimick could receive up to three years in prison and a fine of \$1,000.

Dimick, 29, is stationed at nearby Fort Chaffee.

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
