Quartet Slates Local Gospel Music Concert

The Claiborne Quartette, a gospel singing group headquartered in Southern California, will present a concert of sacred music in the Immanuel Baptist Church on Wednesday, July 24, at 7 p.m.

Organized in 1948 by the four oldest Claiborne brothers, the quartet is acclaimed as one of the first full-time gospel quartets on the West Coast. The brothers sang for several years, disbanding when they were called into military service. In 1956 the ministry was resumed.

The quartet is presently composed of Byron Claiborne of South Gate, Calif.; Wayne Hall of Macon, Ga.; Burl Sanders of Springfield, Ore.; and Mike Schlee of West Covina, Calif.

In addition to traveling over 75,000 miles each year in a touring bus to present concerts before church groups, school assemblies, and civic clubs, the Claiborne Quartette publishes the "Gospel Singing News," a bi-monthly magazine devoted to gospel music.

The singing foursome also sponsors the annual Western States Quartet Convention in Los Angeles and the International Gospel Quartet Festival at each World's Fair and the Hollywood Bowl.

The quartet has recorded several long-playing albums and has appeared on national radio and television programs. During the summer of 1961, the members served as staff musicians at the Winona Lake, Indiana, Bible Conference, the largest Bible conference in the world.

Rev. William E. Cross, pastor, invites the public to attend the only local appearance slated by the Claiborne Quartette.

During the summer of 1956, Rev. Dellinger spent a summer in Cuba under the Practical Missionary Training program, and following his graduation from the Talbot Seminary he received the British Honduras appointment.

Rev. Kenneth Cummings, former missionary to Portugal, now represents the Conservative Baptist Foreign Mission Society in the northwest area of the United States. He and his wife, a talented artist, served in Portugal for five years. They returned to the United States when unable to obtain a permanent residence visa, and he accepted his present position.

While in Portugal, Rev. Cummings conducted an evangelistic ministry and acted as business manager of the theological seminary at Leiria, as well as directing a farm program which helped to support the seminary and a girls' training school.

He studied at the Moody Bible Institute of Chicago and has had experience in the pastorate and as an evangelist with Youth for Christ International in England and on the continent. Both Rev. and Mrs. Cummings will attend the Modoc Association Camp.

Mrs. Joyce Ausherman will also be a camp speaker. She and her husband, Rev. Eldon Ausherman, recently returned from a missionary appointment to Haiti.

Klamath Falls women who hold an office in the Modoc Association are Tillie Austad, president; Dorothy Brown, secretary-treasurer; Evelyn Probst, White Cross chairman, and Elva Broyles, program chairman. Opal Larson will conduct the camp Bible study classes.

The women's camp will open on Friday at 12 noon with lunch and registration, followed by a chapel service, Bible study period, and organized recreation. Special music and skits will be presented each day by the individual church groups.

Conservative Baptist Foreign Mission Society and Home Mission Society missionaries are slated as the guest speakers Friday through Sunday. A highlight of the program will be a question and answer forum conducted by the five missionaries to acquaint the women with the mission field and related work.

Interest And Incentive Stimulated By Catholic Youth Group's Travels

With their first tour of Oregon's religious shrines and scenic attractions only a month behind them, members of the Confraternity of Christian Doctrine are already making plans for future trips.

The four-day jaunt, June 14-17, was initiated by James J. O'Donnell, instructor of the Klamath Falls CCD, who thought a visit to the religious shrines in the state would be a good incentive to the students and also encourage more to participate in the CCD program.

The plan proved successful as 25 young people signed up for the tour and willingly worked on several projects to earn part of the necessary finances.

The local Confraternity of Christian Doctrine, a Catholic youth organization, draws its membership from the freshman through senior classes at Klamath Union High School. The students represent both the Sacred Heart and St. Pius X parishes.

Meetings are conducted every Wednesday during the school year, with emphasis on religious study and instruction, as well as social activities. O'Donnell instructs the ninth and 10th grade students, and Rev. Charles Grant of Sacred Heart is the 11th and 12th grade instructor.

The current growth of CCD has encouraged the group to consider a full summer program, which may be initiated next year.

The organization is headed by Sheari Murray, president; Kathy Cullen, vice president; Kathy Troyer, first vice president; Diane Hosley, secretary - treasurer; and Bud Valdez, sergeant-at-arms. New elections will be conducted at the beginning of the fall school term.

Arrangements for the first long trip ever made by CCD members began taking shape in January. One of the biggest boosts to their treasury was the money earned by giving the annual

breakfast sponsored by Catholic Daughters of America in May. The group received all proceeds, but it was still short of its goal until receiving assistance from Msgr. T. P. Casey of Sacred Heart, Rev. George Murphy of St. Pius X, and other friends. Later a substantial donation was given by an interested individual and this assured the charter of a bus.

The students, with four chaperones, finally departed the morning of June 14. The first stop was the state capital where Sen. Harry Boivin had arranged lunch and a tour of the buildings. In the afternoon they listened to speakers at Mount Angel Abbey, Mount Angel, and arrived in Oregon City to spend the night with the families of CCD members there.

For the next two and a half days, the youths used Oregon City as their headquarters and commuted to Portland, where they attended the Rose Festival Parade and visited the Portland Zoo, Lloyd's Center, International Airport, and the Oregon Museum of Science and Industry on Saturday.

Ragland Elected Delegate To Presbyterian Assembly

The North American Reformed and Presbyterian Youth Assembly (NARPYA) is the destination of Andy Ragland of Peace Memorial Presbyterian Church and 11 other youth delegates from Oregon.

The conference will be held July 19-23 on the Purdue University campus at Lafayette, Ind.

Approximately 2,200 delegates from the United States, Canada, and overseas will participate in the week-long assembly to discuss the question, "What is God calling us to be and do as youth of the Reformed Churches within the ecumenical movement?"

"Is God Alive?" will be one of a series of theme lectures to be delivered by Dr. Lewis S. Mudge, chaplain of Amherst College, Amherst, Mass. The keynote of the lectures, "honesty," will be carried into the follow-up discussion groups.

The purpose of the small discussion groups will be to determine what each delegate actually thinks, believes and doubts. Ragland will serve as the leader of one of the groups.

Co-vice-moderator of the Southwest Oregon Youth Presbytery and vice-moderator of the Senior High Westminster Fellowship in his own church, Ragland is also the vice president of the Henley High School student body. He will be a junior this fall.

Ragland is one of three youths selected by the Southwest Oregon

Presbytery to attend the Purdue assembly. They will travel by train with the Oregon and Washington delegations.
