

# U.S. Crime Rate Shows Staggering Five-Year Jump

WASHINGTON (UPI)—FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover reports the crime rate in the United States broke all previous records last year and jumped 6 per cent over 1961.

Hoover said Thursday in his annual "uniform crime reports" that during the past five years the crime rate in this country went up 27 per cent while the population increased 7 per cent.

He said that all types of major crimes except murder showed increases during 1962. Murder dropped 2 per cent.

"The record shows police effectiveness remains high despite mounting crime work loads and heavier demands for a wide variety of increasing complex police services," the FBI chief declared.

But he added that "law enforcement machinery is impaired and policing is hampered as a result of increasing restrictions being placed on enforcement operations."

"The effectiveness of (police work), depends to some extent on the action of the courts and the success of the correctional process," he said, "but most of all the degree to which the local citizenry supports law enforcement."

"Positive action to reduce crime," he said, "must begin with the individual citizen."

# Freeman To Appeal Denial For Hearing

SALEM (UPI)—A post-conviction appeal by convicted murderer Jeannette June Freeman was denied by Marion County Circuit Judge George A. Jones Thursday.

Her attorneys, Philip A. Levin and Carl R. Neil, both of Portland, said they would appeal Jones' decision to the Oregon Supreme Court.

Levin said that if the Oregon court held against them they will raise constitutional issues before either the U.S. District Court or the U.S. Supreme Court.

Miss Freeman, 22, Culver, was reported in the crime rates in metropolitan areas while rural counties generally reported a decrease.

Persons under the age of 18 accounted for 82 per cent of the arrests for auto thefts, 51 per cent for larceny, 49 for burglary, 25 for robbery, 19 for forcible rape, 13 for aggravated assault and 8 for murder and manslaughter.

# Agencies Get United Fund Allotments

LAKEVIEW—Completion of allotments to various agencies requesting funds from the United Fund board was made Wednesday morning following meetings held Monday and Tuesday nights with the agency representatives and the UF board of directors.

The total requests were \$15,787 and the amount allowed was \$10,700, according to Ed Casto, chairman of the board.

A budget of \$200 was also set up for campaign expenses.

# Skepticism, Wariness In Test Talks

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The limited nuclear test ban agreement that Undersecretary of State W. Averell Harriman seems likely to bring home from Moscow next week could turn out to have hidden strings attached.

Harriman can only initiate a tentative treaty and officials acknowledged the possibility of some slip between that point and formal signature, which could be many weeks hence.

Authorities here said today the Russians had not as of Thursday night tied any unacceptable conditions to the proposed pact to ban land, sea and air blasts but permit underground tests for the time being.

Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev has not, for example, insisted on the NATO-Communist non-aggression pact or an unopposed moratorium on underground testing as the price for the test ban pact.

Full Of Ideas

The Soviet leader has, however, tossed Harriman a grab bag full of ideas he wants to discuss with the United States. These concern "European security," East-West trade and other issues.

The implication appears to be that Khrushchev expects President Kennedy to take a new and more favorable look at some old Russian ideas on these subjects in the warm glow following tentative agreement on a test ban.

If the administration, for either foreign or domestic reasons, can give Russia no encouragement on any of these points, the tentative test ban might never reach a point of formal signature and ratification.

The President faces a delicate diplomatic task in reacting to some of the Khrushchev suggestions.

West Germany, the major military power in NATO after the United States, would certainly react with alarm to any indication Washington was favorably considering Khrushchev's proposed non-aggression pact between the Western alliance and the Communist Warsaw treaty countries.

U.S. concessions to Russia on trade issues would involve abandoning Washington's long-time policy — maintained against growing opposition from Britain and some other Allies — of barring all possible strategic goods from the Communist bloc.

And even a partial test ban outlawing only readily detectable blasts will encounter strong opposition from senators who distrust any agreement with Moscow. However, the administration probably has enough votes in the Senate to get the pact approved if there are no jokers in it.

In any event, authorities agree that even if Harriman comes back with an apparently acceptable agreement, it would be wise to reserve judgment until all implications of his suggestions on other issues have been carefully weighed and discussed with the Western Allies.

# Reversal Of Death Penalty Asked By Portland Man

PORTLAND (UPI)—The Oregon Supreme Court will be asked to reverse the death sentence of Richard B. Schwensen, convicted in the air embolism death of a Portland housewife.

Schwensen's attorney, Charles V. Elliott, said Thursday the filing could result in the state's first recorded reversal of a first degree murder conviction.

Schwensen, a 28-year-old former Portland college student, was convicted in the death of Mrs. Jean Bussey, 29, an east Portland housewife whose body was found in her parked car last September a week after she disappeared.

Attorney Cites "Flaw"

Elliott said there was a major flaw in the prosecution. He said his brief for reversal will be based on the state's charge that Schwensen caused the death of the woman through forcible rape which resulted in an air bubble that reached the heart through the bloodstream.

Evidence presented at Schwensen's 10-day trial last year did not support that allegation, Elliott said.

The attorney said he had been assured by four authorities in the field of forensic pathology that it would be impossible to detect air embolism in the blood of a body that had been dead for eight days.

Two Pathologists Testified

Two of the experts testified at the trial. They were Dr. Charles P. Larson, head of the Tacoma General Hospital and Dr. Warren G. Hunter, of the University of Oregon Medical School.

Elliott also received correspondence supporting the contention from Dr. Alan R. Moritz, professor of pathology at Western Reserve University, Cleveland, Ohio, and from Milton Helpern, chief medical examiner of the city of New York.

The prosecution's contention during the trial was that specific proof of the cause of death was not required if rape or attempted rape were shown. Circuit Judge Arno H. Deneke agreed.

# W. D. Miller Awarded Bid

A contract for construction of campground roads at Miller Lake has been awarded to W. D. Miller Construction Company of Klamath Falls. It was announced today by forest officials. The road construction job at Miller Lake consists of clearing and grubbing of approach roads, loops and parking areas for a campground on the southwest shore of Miller Lake at what is known as Digby Point. The camp construction is being undertaken in stages, with the road development being the first improvement to be installed.

Forest officials indicate they are hopeful that construction work can proceed next season to provide a completed camp facility.

Miller Lake is near the northwest corner of the Winema Forest, approximately ten miles west of Chemult, and is accessible from Highway 97 on the first road north of the Chemult Ranger Station.

# Welfare Chief Urges Training Of Recipients

SALEM (UPI)—State Welfare Administrator Andrew Juras urged county welfare administrators today to train "every possible client who has potential."

Juras told the administrators that the state's prime welfare goal is to reduce the taxpayer's burden by training welfare recipients to work and by getting support money from relatives.

Juras said a training program would have some expense but, "with sound training plans, savings will also be realized which will make the program well worth while."

"Every county administrator will be expected to take all necessary steps to cut ineligible cases to the bone," the state administrator told the county department heads.

The meeting of the county administrators continued today.
