

Wildlife Association Hits 'Politics' Of Fish, Game

DUNSMUIR — The fish and game commission received a blast from the Northern Counties Wildlife Conservation Association at its annual election meeting in Redding last Sunday.

The association membership is unanimous in its belief that the commission is playing politics instead of serving the public interest. The current mix-up over the commission's regulatory powers was termed "political antics" by this group of sportsmen devoted to promoting the interests of deer hunting in Northern California.

"The commission through its arbitrary actions and lack of cooperation with legislative bodies has created public distrust," Everett Warren of Weed, newly elected president of the association, said at the meeting at the Grand Cafe.

The efforts of Assemblywoman Pauline Davis to effect a curtailed hunting season in northeastern California, where mule deer herds are dwindling, were commended by the association. The failure to pass legislation to continue the powers of the fish and game commission was attributed to the

committee headed by Sen. Ronald G. Cameron, Auburn, and to commission members.

Morris Curry of Lake County was elected vice president of the northern counties group at the meeting; Paul Carter, Mount Shasta, secretary, and Rule Methvin, McCloud, treasurer. Representatives from nearly all the Northern California counties were present, many of them coming directly from the elk hearing in Eureka on Saturday.

In other business, the association withdrew its affiliation with the United Humane Front and voted to devote its energies solely toward continued and improved buck hunting conditions.

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Rec Commission Names Officers

DUNSMUIR—Members of the Dunsmuir Recreation Commission elected Ivan Young to serve another year as its chairman at the July commission meeting. Mrs. Thelma Bender was re-elected secretary-treasurer and Delwin Poe was elected vice chairman.

July business included setting employment rates at the Dunsmuir Community Swimming Pool. The commission, the center of a governmental quagmire last spring, has received notice that its status is no longer a matter of question. Special legislation was passed clarifying the law which presumably had put the commission out of business.

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New Teachers For Dunsmuir High School

DUNSMUIR—Two new teachers have been hired by the Dunsmuir High School.

Arline Young will teach English and girls' physical education. She has been making her home in Berkeley while taking graduate work. She received her bachelor of arts degree at the University of California, Berkeley, in 1959.

Mrs. Louisa Warren, who will teach languages at Dunsmuir High, taught at Etna High School last year. She is a graduate of Smith College in Missouri and has done graduate work at Bryn Mawr College. She has taught extensively in both private and public schools in California.

A replacement for David Blount, basketball coach, is under consideration according to Delwin Poe, superintendent, but a final decision by the board depends upon the applicant's receiving a California credential. He is from out of state.

Blount's letter of resignation was read at the July board meeting. He stated he wished to continue to coach as part of his teaching career. The board decided this spring to relieve Blount as varsity basketball coach.

Other July board business included the sale of a portion of high school property to the state division of highways. The state bought 4.5 acres of mountainside to stabilize a freeway cut and paid the school district \$900.

Ivan Young will serve as chairman of the high school board and Herman Gray as clerk for the fiscal year. Howard Jones, attorney, is a new school board member. He was named to serve the unexpired term of Nadine Anderson, who resigned.

Ray Tillotson Appointed To Dunsmuir City Council

DUNSMUIR — Ray Tillotson, who recently sold his automotive repair business because of a heart disability, is Dunsmuir's new councilman.

He was named to the council Monday night by a majority vote of the four remaining council members to replace Richard K. Lachenmyer, who resigned two weeks ago. Lachenmyer has moved to the Bay Area.

Tillotson owns residential property and serves as a deputy constable. His appointment is for the unexpired term which ends in March, 1966.

Councilmen Claude Slade, Dave McClintock, and Floyd Creason were asked by Mayor David Anderson to meet with the Siskiyou County Board of Supervisors in Yreka on Tuesday, July 23, to discuss disposition of the Mott Airport matter. The Dunsmuir City Council feels the airport ownership could be an asset to the city.

City Clerk Elizabeth Cavin was asked to investigate a franchise measure adopted by Yreka and Dorris which could increase the city's public utilities revenue as much as tenfold. She was also asked to investigate costs of codifying the city ordinance so laws in effect within the city could be easily determined.

Two Killed Near Albany

ALBANY (UPI)—Two persons were killed and seven injured in a head-on collision Thursday five miles north of Albany on the old Jefferson highway.

Dead are McKinley Byron Berry, 67, and two-month-old Peggy Louise Wilmoth, both of Jefferson.

State policeman Jack Crisp said a car driven by Jackie Guthrie, 16, Albany, crossed the center line and collided with a car driven by Berry.

Guthrie and a passenger, Charles Bronson, 15, Albany, are reported in fairly good condition today in an Albany hospital.

In addition to Berry and the baby, the other vehicle carried Russell Johnson, 2; Kenneth Johnson, 1; an infant, Debbie Johnson; their mother, Mrs. Frances Johnson, 22, and the mother of the dead child, Mrs. Betty Wilmoth, 17, all of Jefferson.

The three children were reported in good condition at the hospital. Mrs. Johnson was listed as "fairly good" and Mrs. Wilmoth as fair.
