

Klamath High Rally Squad Cops Squaw Valley Event

Hours of practice and novel routines paid off for the members of the KUHS rally squad when they captured the 1963 cheerleading championship at Squaw Valley this month.

The Squaw Valley title meant competing against and out-yelling more than 500 girls and 23 boys. Schools in all sections of the country were invited to send their rally squads to the cheerleading competition, with the greatest response from the north and south-west areas.

The KUHS squad, composed of Susan Leaming, junior; Mary Taucher, senior; Cindy Miller, senior, yell queen; Marianne Gallagher, senior; Carla Bartlett, senior, and Jeanne Carnini, senior, was noted among the best almost from the moment of arrival.

On the first day of the event, held June 20 through July 4, the squad was selected to present a yell before the entire assembly during a mass exposition.

The preliminary competition well organized, according to the yell leaders. For the first two days, the squads were divided into three divisions, small, medium, and large, depending on the size of the individual squad, and competition was conducted within each division.

The KUHS cheerleaders were grouped in the large division with 22 other rally squads. First, second, third, and honorable mention ribbons were awarded to the top four, and the Klamath Falls girls yelled their way to a first place ribbon on both days.

Senate Slashes Aid Bill

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Senate Foreign Relations Committee voted tentatively Thursday to slash \$32 million from President Kennedy's request for outright economic aid grants to friendly nations.

The action came as the committee got down to closed-door voting on the chief executive's \$4.5 billion foreign aid program. The vote was 11-1 in favor of the slash.

It would reduce from \$257 million to \$225 million the funds authorized for economic development grants. The reduction came on a motion by Chairman J. William Fulbright, D-Ark., after the committee rejected, 7-4, a motion by Sen. Wayne L. Morse, D-Ore., to cut the amount to \$200 million. Morse then voted against the lesser cut.

Senate Slashes Aid Bill

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The House Foreign Affairs Committee, meantime, rejected a move to tie new restrictions on U.S. aid to President Sukarno's regime in Indonesia.

The defeated amendment, offered by Rep. William S. Broomfield, R-Mich., would have cut off any further aid to Indonesia unless the President made a specific finding that it was vital to U.S. interests.

Broomfield said afterward he would take his fight to the House floor, where chances were considerably better for favorable action on the amendment.

Wirtz Favors Plan Advocated By Barry

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Labor Secretary W. Willard Wirtz said Thursday he favored a proposal by Sen. Barry Goldwater, R-Ariz., to deny certification for any labor union practicing racial discrimination.

Wirtz made the statement in response to a question while testifying before the Senate Commerce Committee on the administration's bill to ban discrimination in public accommodations.

Goldwater earlier this week introduced amendments to the bill which would make it applicable in some degree to labor unions. As submitted by the President, the measure would ban discrimination in motels, restaurants and places of amusement under the Interstate Commerce clause and the 14th Amendment.

One Goldwater amendment would deny certification under the Landrum-Griffin Act to any union which bars workers from joining because of their race. Wirtz said he favored such an amendment "in principle."

"I believe in doing all things necessary to prevent discrimination in labor unions," Wirtz said. Sen. Frank J. Lausche, D-Ohio, accused the administration of deliberately exempting labor unions from the main provisions of its civil rights package. He said workers denied membership in a union because of race should have the same right to call on the attorney general for help as a person denied access to a private business.

"Will you support the same sanctions against unions as against Mrs. Murphy's boarding house?" Lausche asked.

Wirtz said the sanctions against union discrimination were included in fair employment practices legislation now under consideration by the Labor Committee with administration support.
