Kiwanis Net Meet Begins

The biggest tennis tournament, entry-wise, ever held in Klamath Falls is now in progress at Moore Park with the semifinals slated Saturday and the final rounds Sunday.

The Second Annual Linkville Kiwanis Tennis Tournament is underway and has 150 entries. The semifinals are scheduled Saturday afternoon and the finals are to begin at 1 p.m. Sunday. The men's singles and women's singles will be played at that time with the other events to follow.

Defending champions still in the field are Earl Brooks in the men's singles, Ruth Hagelstein in the women's singles, Larry Tice in the junior men's singles, and Beverly Jennings in the junior girls' singles. Other defending champions are Brooks and Keith Baxter in the men's doubles and Brooks and Hagelstein in mixed doubles.

Brooks is the favorite in the men's singles but is expected to get some strong contention from Larry Tice an up and coming netter in the area ranks. Tice has beaten Ray Bissell, Reed Morrison and Kim Brown thus far in the tournament although he dropped his match against Brooks, 6-2, 6-1.

Hagelstein dumped Vee Gould, 6-0, 6-0, en route to the defense of her championship.

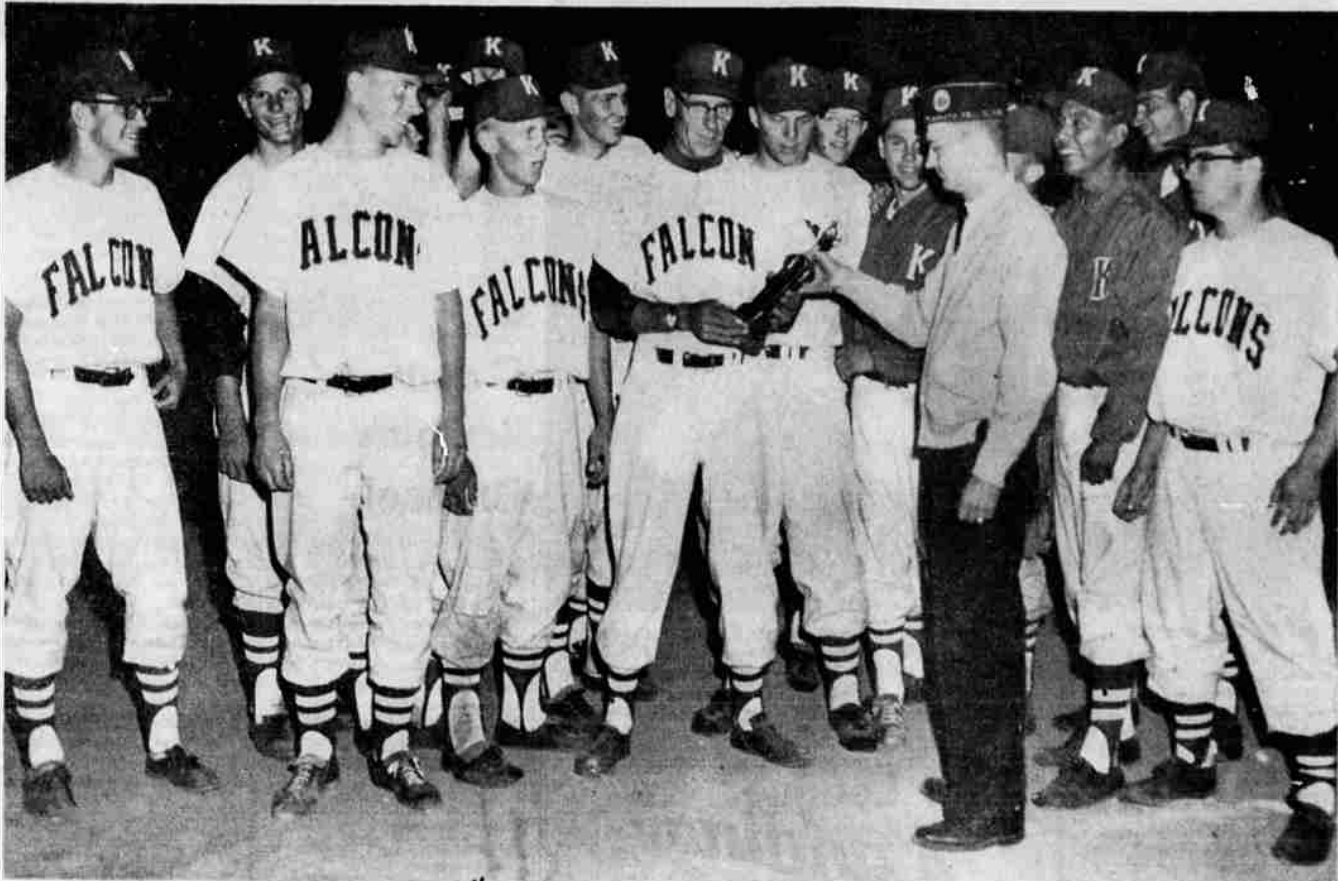

BOULEVARD, Calif. (UPI) — Two key members of the San Diego Chargers American Football League team have announced they will play out their options for 1963 and will not sign for 1964. Halfback Keith Lincoln, rated the Chargers' most valuable offensive player last year, and defensive end Earl Faison, rookie of the year in 1961, said they were dissatisfied with the offer made by General Manager Sid Gillman and would not sign a new contract. Lincoln attended Washington State and Faison is from Indiana.

2 Marks Broken, New Ones Set In Meet

Two records were broken and many new ones established Thursday in the second weekly track and field meet at Modoc Field by the Klamath Basin Athletic Association in the biggest turnout of competitors yet.

It was estimated that over 60 participants competed in the day's events which included the 60-yard dash, 100-yard dash, 220-yard dash and pole vault. All of the 220

marks set are new records with the exception of the boys 17 and over group where Bob Rice's mark stands. The program for next week has not yet been announced but it is hoped some distance runs, the discus, shot put and broad jump can be run off.

The two new records came in the boys' divisions. The first one was beaten in the 7-8-year-old 60-yard dash where Jeff Foster was clocked in 10 flat and previously by Mark Holladay. The other record broken was that held by Don Div-

beats in the 220 dashes. Jeff was timed in 38.8 in winning the 7-8 group and Tommy in 39.4 in the 6 and under group. Wendt had a very fine 33.4 in the 9-10 group. Meisner was timed in the 15-16 group at 25.1 and Nick Demetrakos in the 13-14 class in 26.1. John Diver got the record in the 11-12 group at 32.4.

Chris Brosterhouse won again in the girls' events with a 9.1 clocking in the 60-yard dash. Louise Pridemore ran the 100-yard dash in a fine 13.6 in the 11-12 group and Janis Narramore clocked a good 13.3 in the 13 and over group.

The girls winning the 220 dashes and getting new records were Denette Zimmerman in the 8 and under in 39.3; Chris Brosterhouse in the 9-10 group in 34.4; Louise Pridemore in the 11-12 group in 32.6 and Janis Narramore in the 13 and over group in 32.3.

There were only three groups Treve McReynolds in the 11-12 group won at 7-3. B. G. Brosterhouse was second at 7-0 even.

Danny Dahle was the only competitor in the 13-14 group at 8-6 and Curt Peterstener won the 15-16 group at 9-6. Vern Huck was second at 9-0 even. Meets will be held again Tuesday and Thursday at Modoc.

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Pitcher Hurls, Bats Locals To Win Before Huge Crowd

Gary Benson, a strong-armed right hander, pitched and batted the Klamath Falcons to a clutch victory over the Medford American Legion nine at Gem Stadium Thursday night, 4-0, with a brilliant two-hit pitching performance and three-for-three at the plate.

Benson, although erratic at times and in trouble by walks, got some great team play from his mates as they turned in three double plays for the game which kept killing off Medford chances. This was the stick which broke the back of the Medford club.

The victory broke a jinx for the Klamath teams over the Medford nine. The Falcons' only two league losses of the season had come at the hands of the Medford Club and the last one had sent the two teams into this playoff game. The KU Pelicans, which is virtually the same team as the Falcons, lost both games to Medford during the high school season. But when the chips were down Thursday night, the Falcons came through with flying colors.

They will take on the North Bend team, winner of the coast league, in a series of the best-two-of-three at a site and date yet undetermined. The next game for the Falcons will be a warmup game at Gem Stadium Saturday afternoon with Corvallis.

Benson was wild as a March wind in the first inning and was in deep trouble until a double play pulled him out. The second double play came in the fifth to chop down a possible rally. The final double play definitely stopped a rally which could have hurt badly in the seventh and final inning.

But Benson was erratic enough

to be effective. He didn't try to overpower the Medford batsmen but rather let the team do the work for him. He struck out only two Medford batsmen for the night. The Falcons had 12 assists and picked off four fly balls.

The first inning was a shaky one for Benson and the Falcons who are known for slow starts. He walked leadoff batter Don Anderson and second batter Dan Miles. The Falcons then came up with their first double play when Mike Neathamer ground sharply to John Parisotto at third. He tagged the runner and fired to John Gray at first to complete the twin — killing, Jim Calhoun ground to LeVoy Young at deep short and was tossed out.

The Falcons had a breath of hope in the first inning as the estimated 1,000 fans looked on. With one out Larry Binney lined a shot over the left fielder's head for a double but was called back to bat because the third base umpire had called time out because a baseball was lying behind the plate umpire. Binney fled out to right.

He was in some trouble again in the second but some sleepy Medford base running helped him out there. After Tom Barker had lined out to Gray, catcher Ken Phipps hit a hard shot back to Benson which he touched but it got past him. He took second on a wild pitch and tried to go to third on a ball hit deep in the hole at short. Young made a fine play on the ball and threw Phipps out at third in a rundown.

Klamath got its first tally in the third frame on some good hitting and heads-up baserunning by John Gray. After Dave Johnson had whiffed, Gray drove a double between the center and right fielder. The throw to third base bounded off the knee of Ron Edmonds out towards the pitcher's mound. Losing pitcher Bill Enyart was off the mound backing up the throw at third and there was no one around to field the ball and Gray raced to third. He tallied the first run when Benson lined a shot past the second baseman who was charging in for an expected out.

The second run came in the fourth. John Parisotto made first on an error and was chopped down at second on Mike Kitching's fielder's choice. Kitching

took second when Dan Miles' throw to first was high and got away from the first sacker. Lanny Guyer tried to hunt Kitching to third and Enyart bobbled the ball several times and both runners were safe. Jay Paxton's high fly to center scored Kitching.

The fifth inning run again was aided along by Benson. He had a hot bat in this game and it boomed for a triple to the right centerfield fence. Young struck out for the second out but Binney wasn't robbed of his hit this time and he pushed it between first and second to score Benson.

The final run came in the sixth. Guyer walked and stole second on the first pitch. Paxton's single moved him to third and he scored on a wild pitch.
