

Falcons In Brookings Today For First Game Of Playoffs

Last Two Contests Set Here

The Klamath Falcons, winners of American Legion Southern Division Area 4, will take on Brookings today at 2:30 p.m. in Brookings in the first of a best two-of-three series to determine which team will play Roseburg in another best two-of-three series.

It was previously announced that North Bend was the champion of the Coast League but that turned out to be erroneous as Brookings tied North Bend in league at 7-4 and then won a playoff Friday night over North Bend to gain the berth today against Klamath.

The second game, and third if needed, will come off Monday and Tuesday nights in Gem Stadium in Klamath, game time being 8:30 in both nights.

Brookings had a 7-4 league record and beat North Bend in the playoff Friday night to gain an 8-4 record. The Falcons finished with an 11-2 mark, including the playoff win over Medford.

Coch John Paxton will probably start Rich Jackson, the loser of the Medford first game last week. It was his first defeat of the season. He should be ready to go against Brookings. The Falcons hope to take this series in two games. Gary Benson should be ready for the Monday night game. He was the winning hurler over Medford in the playoff on a two-hit performance.

The remainder of the lineup should find Jay Paxton behind the plate, John Gray at first, Larry Guyer at second, LeVoy Young at shortstop, John Parisotto at third, Larry Binney in left, Mike Kitching in center and Dave Johnson in right.

The Monday game, and Tuesday's if needed, will begin at 8:30 p.m. because of the sun factor. The sun isn't usually down until around 8:30 and the teams want to have every advantage.

The season tickets will not be good for any Legion games from here on out because of the playoff status. The first Roseburg game will be here if the Falcons win the Brookings' series and the other two, if needed, at Roseburg. That series must be finished by July 30.

Khrush Plans Belgrade Visit

BELGRADE (UPI) — Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev is coming to Belgrade next month to woo — but not wed — the Yugoslavs in his ideological struggle with Communist China, informed sources said Saturday.

They said Khrushchev is expected to present his side of the Moscow-Peking falling out to Yugoslav President Josip Broz Tito, who was a lightning rod for Peking's thunderbolts long before the Communist Chinese began aiming them at the Kremlin.

Man Escapes

BERLIN (UPI) — Western officials said Saturday the escape of an East German secret police sergeant major to West Berlin would smash a Communist spy ring here and lead to the arrest of up to 50 Soviet spies.

Herbert Rockstroh, 31, of East Germany's state security service, fled to West Berlin last month with a list of Communist spies working in West Berlin.

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American Men Leading Russians Despite Goof

MOSCOW (UPI) — A stunning disqualification in the 400-meter relay for an illegal baton pass held the United States to a slim 61-54 lead over Russia in their men's track meet Saturday and left the Yanks needing "supreme performances" Sunday to avoid losing to the Soviets for the first time.

The U.S. men won seven out of 11 events on Saturday's program under warm, sunny skies before a crowd of 67,000 at Lenin Stadium. Included in the bag was a dramatic hammer throw triumph by injured Hal Connolly, who wasn't supposed to compete.

But, in addition to the relay win, the Russians scored a surprise triumph over "unbeatable" Hayes Jones in the hurdles, won two other events as expected, and gained two surprise second places.

And the Soviet women swept all five of their events Saturday to take a 35-17 lead over the U.S. women's team in their separate competition.

All this left Payton Jordan of

Stanford, coach of the U.S. men's team worried about the outcome of the two-day competition which ends Sunday.

On the other hand, Soviet coach Gabriel Korobkov was a happy man and said: "Our men are doing almost the impossible, especially in the track events. The points ratio is fully satisfactory."

Win Disqualified

The U.S. relay team, anchored by "world's fastest human" Bob Hayes who had opened the men's program by winning the 100-meter dash, finished first. But then the judges announced that it was disqualified because the third U.S. runner had passed the baton too soon to the anchor man.

Connolly's surprise appearance and triumph in the hammer throw made up somewhat for the Yank defeats in the relays and the hurdles.

In addition to Connolly and Hayes, other U.S. winners were: Jim Dupree of Los Angeles in the 800 meter run in 1:47.8; Dave Davis of the U.S. Marines, who

paced a 1-2 sweep in the shot put with 61 feet, 1 1/2 inches; Ralph Boston of Los Angeles, who got a revenge victory over broad jump rival Igor Ter-Ovanesyan with 26 feet, 10 1/2 inches; John Uelses of La Salle College, who led a 1-2 sweep with a leap of 16 feet, 1 1/2 inches, the first 16-footer ever performed in Russia; and Ellis Williams of Arizona State in the 400-meter run in 46.2 seconds.

The defeat of Hayes Jones in the hurdles was a shock to the U.S. team, which had regarded the Detroit native as the "surest winner on the squad." First Jones was left at the start as the other three runners went all the way in a race that was called a false start. Then, in the re-run, he could do no better than third as Anatoli Mikhailov, the Soviet champion, surged from behind to nip Blaine Lindgren of Glendale, Calif., at the tape for first place in 13.8 seconds.

Other Soviet Victories

The other Soviet victories, as had been forecast, were scored by Gennadi Solodov in the 20-kilometer walk in 1 hour, 35 minutes, 5 seconds, and Leonid Ivanov in the 10,000 meters in 29:10.2. Russia had a 1-2 sweep in both events.

In addition, Vassily Kuznetsov of the Soviets won two of five events to take the halfway lead in the decathlon with 4,103 points against 4,004 for U.S. Marine Dick Emberger and 3,927 for Steve Pauly of Oregon State.

The U.S. women had hoped to win two of Saturday's five events — the 100-meter dash and the 400-meter relay.

But Galina Popova led all the way to upset Edith McGuire of Atlanta in the 100-meter dash in 11.7 seconds. Miss McGuire was the only member of the current U.S. women's squad who scored a victory in last year's dual meet. And when the Soviet women's relay, which was doomed to defeat in the days when Wilma Rudolph was running for the U.S., nosed out the American girls in 45.0 seconds flat.

The other Soviet women's victories were expected and were scored by Elvira Ozolina in the javelin with 178 feet, 6 1/2 inches; Taisiya Chenchik in the high jump with 5 feet, 8 1/2 inches, and world record-holder Tamara Press in the discus with a throw of 102 feet, 5 inches.

Although the meets are officially scored as separate competitions for men and women, the Soviet press followed its practice of previous meets and combined the two scores to claim an "overall" lead after the first day, 89-78.

Counting the decathlon, there are 10 men's finals Sunday and the Russians are favored to win 5. If they do, then the final victory could be a hairline decision either way.

Klamath Swimming Team Victorious

The Klamath Falls swimming team defeated Lakeview and Malin in a three-way meet Saturday at the Klamath Municipal Pool as the locals make ready for the Emerald Empire championships and the Junior Olympics.

The Klamath aqua team scored 358 points to 297 for Lakeview and 68 for the Malin team.

Coach Adolph Faller's team will be in the Emerald games at North Bend July 28-29 and in the

Junior Olympics at the short course Medford pool Aug. 3-4.

The Klamath team took 22 first places in the 51 events of different age groups. The classes ranged from boys 8 and under and girls 9-10 to the high school groups of seniors.

Balsiger, Kramer, Winterholder, Perry, Fern, Linville, Hadlock, Hunsaker, Aubrey, Buck Bridge, March, Thornton, Molatore, and Hampton were in on the first place winning events.

Senior Jerry Kramer, the summer team captain, captured the individual medley in 1:39, the 100-yard backstroke and the 100-yard freestyle in a fine 59.2. He also swam anchor on the winning mixed relay with the team of Hunsaker, Aubrey and his sister, another of the swimming Kramer clan. The team won in 1:19.

Bend was supposed to have been in the meet but failed to show up. This was sweet revenge in some ways. The Klamath team had fallen to Bend and Lakeview earlier in a three-way meet. The home team came through with flying colors in this meet and with a lot of strength, depth and experience.

Coach Faller reports that it was the first time in seven years that any Klamath coach had been heaved into the water by a winning team. "This is met with mixed emotions to be sure, but nevertheless is fun," he claimed.

Harold Johnson of Klamath won a diving exhibition and Chester Aubrey of Klamath was second. Those two events did not count in the final team standings.

Bruce Crampton Grabs Third Round PGA Lead

DALLAS (UPI) — Bruce Crampton, the 27-year-old "iron man" from Australia, grabbed the third round lead in the PGA golf championship Saturday with a six under par 21-34-45 for a 208 total while Arnold Palmer's hopes died when he fell 12 strokes off the pace.

Crampton, who has played more tour tournaments the last two years than any man in golf, on this blazing day ignored 105 degree heat as he smashed his way to a two stroke lead over 1958 champion Dow Finsterwald and three ahead of Masters champion Jack Nicklaus.

His sun-blistered scoring featured a day in which Palmer, trying for the only big one which has eluded him, blew his hopes with a 73 for 220; Gary Player blew his stack at a photographer and unknown Dick Hart, the assistant pro from Hinsdale, Ill., blew a three shot lead he had carried into the third round with a "tight collar" 76.

Finsterwald shot a 33-33-66 with a putter which was as hot as this scorching day while Nicklaus fired a 69 to finish one stroke behind slender Dow. Another shot away at 212, one under par for the distance, was young Dave Ragan.

At Even Par

At even par 213 came Billy Maxwell with a 69, Doug Ford with a 71 and Doug Sanders with a 70. And one over par at 214 were Dave Hill and Al Geilberger with 69's, Sam Snead with a 70, Julius Boros with a 73 and the broken-hearted Hart with a 76.

Art Wall fired a 66 which moved the former Masters champion into the 215 bracket with Mason Rudolph, who had a 71, and Bill Johnston of Phoenix with a 72.

Player shot a 32-35-67 which he said "might have been a 63 or a 64" if he hadn't been upset by a photographer when he was lining up a six foot putt for a par on the 15th hole.

"Don't you realize you could cost me the tournament?" Player shouted at the photographer. "Don't you have any feelings?" Gary blew the putt and then, still upset, three-putted the 16th from 30 feet — missing the second time from a mere one foot.

That put him at 216 along with Jim Ferrier and Tommy Jacobs, who shot 70. Wes Ellis with a 71 and Manuel De La Torre with a 74.

Lema Hits 76

Champagne Tony Lema, who had been making a big run at the front, zoomed to a 76 which

placed him at 217 along with Shelley Mayfield, Dan Sikes, Big Mike Souchak, British Open champion Bob Charles, Paul Harney, Bo Wininger, and Earl Stewart. Billy Farrell and former U.S. Open champion Gene Littler were at 218; former winner Jerry Barber at 219, and at 220 along with Palmer were former champion Jackie Burke and Don January.

Crampton, who played in 28 tournaments on the tour last year and in 28 straight this season, started his blistering round with an eagle three on the 521-yard par five first hole when he chipped into the cup from 30 feet off the green. He reached the green of the 573-yard par five

fourth in two to birdie that one and rammed home a 30-footer for a bird on the sixth. Then, on the ninth, he wedged to within three feet for a birdie which put him into 31 — five under par.

Starting back, Crampton fired six straight pars before he knocked his approach over the green on the 16th for a bogey. But the man from down under wasn't finished yet. For he calmly stepped up and holed a six footer on the 17th and an eight footer on the 18th to close it out with two birdies for his 34 in and front-running 65 which put him five under par for the tournament and two shots in front in the race for the \$13,000 top prize.

Ku's Humphrey Wins Match Against Japanese

HACHINOE, Japan (UPI) — A team of Oregon high school wrestling champions Saturday night defeated an all-Amomori Prefecture high school contingent by a 6 1/2 to 1 1/2 score.

The Klamath Falcons, keeping warm by playing a doubleheader, split a pair with Corvallis in non-counting games Saturday at Gem Stadium. The Falcons won the first, 7-6, with a late rally, and dropped the second, 4-3.

The games were already on the schedule and were warmups in this case for the Falcons. They journeyed to Brookings today for a 2:30 p.m. game with the Brookings' nine in the first of a best-of-three series to establish a team to go against Roseburg in another two-out-of-three set later.
