DEW Line Stations Close Oregon Rider

The North American Air Defense Command (NORAD), an organization to which Kingsley Field belongs, recently announced plans to close 28 intermediate Distant Early Warning (DEW) Line stations in the Far North. Twenty of the small intermediate stations — popularly called DEW Line gap fillers — are located in Canada; the remaining eight are in Alaska.

In 1955 Canada and the U.S. signed an agreement for the establishment of the DEW line on Canadian territory as part of a comprehensive North American air defense control and early warning system. This agreement was announced on May 20, 1955.

The closure action grew out of recent U.S. studies indicating limited adjustments could be made in the DEW Line equipment configuration and still provide adequate early warning. The new configuration proposal led to the U.S.-Canadian decision to discontinue the 28 smaller DEW Line stations. The facilities will be disposed of in accordance with existing agreements between the two governments.

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Klamath Visitor Has Interesting Scientific Life

A learned scientist who does not hesitate to spend months on an island not much larger than a handkerchief, to study bird life, and who probably knows more about penguins and petrels than any other student of natural sciences, "half the world around" was a guest this week of Mr. and Mrs. Irving Dixon of 6235 Maryland Avenue, Klamath Falls.

Dr. L. E. Richdale and Mrs. Richdale of Dunedin, New Zealand, en route home after four years abroad for study, have

both played an important part in research.

Mrs. Richdale and Irving Dixon are brother and sister.

The doctor has two separate occupations closely aligned . . . in education for the Board of Governors, University of Atago in New Zealand, which he says is his professional work, and his career in zoology on a worldwide scope, as a hobby.

The waters and the lands of the universe are as nearly common to these travelers from New Zealand as their own back yard. They have been in the United States several times while the doctor has accomplished research commitments on Fullbright and Carnegie grants attached to Cornell University.

He has completed his most recent work in natural science on a grant from the Nuffield Foundation, researching in London for three years, establishing an office there . . . working at the London Zoo, one of the Richdale termed "not as good as the library of natural sciences museum in New York City."

He is the author of two books,

Eugene Man Heads Study Of Insurers

SALEM (UPI) — Rep. F. F. Montgomery, R-Eugene, the House minority leader, was named chairman of the Legislative Interim Committee on Insurance this morning.

Vice-chairman of the newly organized group is Sen. Eddie Ahrens, R-Salem.

Sen. Walter J. Peason, D-Portland, said he hoped the committee's studies can bring out some of the good things done by the insurance industry in the state, as well as any faults.

Rep. Morris Crothers, R-Salem, said the study should be designed to "get the best laws we can" and that the committee's recommendations should be designed to make the laws "clear and clean."

The committee is specifically charged to look into the sale by mail of health and accident policies by out-of-state companies, title insurance rates, life insurance policies which provide mutual fund participation, and reserve surplus and capital requirements of casualty and disability insurance.

The committee plans to go into other areas in the insurance field and may get into the controversial workmen's compensation question.

Sacramento Dedicates Inland Port

SACRAMENTO (UPI) — Sacramento's new deep water port which will link the inland capital city to the sea was officially in business Saturday.

The \$5 million facility was dedicated Friday by President Kennedy, who spoke to ceremonies by phone, Interior Secretary Stewart Udall, Gov. Edmund G. Brown and California's two senators.

Kennedy termed the facility "a regional project with national significance" and predicted it would usher in "a new era in the development of Northern California."

Kennedy's message was received by Udall on a flag bedecked dockside platform and relayed by loudspeaker to thousands who watched in 90 degree heat.

The main features of the new 90-mile route into California's agriculturally rich Central Valley include a 60-acre harbor and turning basin just outside Sacramento, a nearby barge canal and navigational lock which connects the harbor with the Sacramento River and a 25-mile deep water channel that runs generally parallel to the meandering river. In addition, an 18-mile section of river below the channel has been extensively widened and deepened.

The federal government financed \$40 million of the cost and the Sacramento-Yolo Port District put up another \$15 million.

Kennedy said the dedication "vindicates the confidence and judgment of the people" in the district and "fulfills a dream to revitalize Sacramento as a great navigational center."

Air Force Fires Largest Rocket

COYOTE, Calif. (UPI) — The Air Force Saturday fired the free world's largest solid-propellant rocket motor—a 75-foot, 230-ton prototype of engines which will form the first stage of the Titan III-C space launch vehicle.

Shortly after the five-cylindrical segment of the sleek white booster ignited, shooting skyward a brilliant red pillar of flame, the Air Force said the motor developed a thrust of "in excess of one million pounds."

"The Sexual Behavior of Penguins," and "Population Study of Penguins," published by the University of Kansas and the Clarendon Press in Oxford, England. He is at present occupied with the written history of his research into five species of "petrels," a large family of sea birds allied to the albatross, and tubular nostrils.

They are common mostly to the Southern hemisphere and live on small islands in holes in the ground like gophers. They come out at night. Natives call them "mutton birds."

This is one of the species of birds that the native Maoris of New Zealand are permitted by law to catch. They breed only on islands.

The professional name of one species of the bird is Puffinus Griseus, a dark, slatey-blue bird. It was this species that took Dr. Richdale and his wife to the tiny island, three miles from shore to live in a tent and a small shack for nearly two years.

All food and water was taken by boat to the spot of land just 64 feet above the water.

These birds migrate thousands of miles over water and one species

was caught by fishermen off the coast of San Diego wearing a band placed on a leg by Dr. Richdale.

This was proof that the birds come to American shores, 6,000 miles across the ocean. They do not come to land except to breed, Dr. Richdale said. They inches. They rest and feed at sea usually at night.

Dr. and Mrs. Richdale spent four months in Africa before going to London.

Mrs. Richdale reads, edits and types all of the mass of research data that her scientist husband accumulates, often "snowed under" by the copious copy.

She has "religiously kept" a day by day diary on people and birds on their travels and is an author too, writing for publications on natural history, under her own name.

"That way," says Mrs. Richdale, whose eyes sparkled with enthusiasm and she talked of her husband's contributions to the world of letters, "I can refer back when we get home, and know exactly what happened, when."

Coming to Klamath Falls by way of the Polar Air Route, they left Thursday for Hawaii for a stay, will go to the Fiji Islands and then home . . . for more research on petrels.
