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Nicklaus PGA Winner; Claims He's Now A Man

DALLAS (UPI) — Jack Nicklaus, at 23, figured today he was "a grown man."

For now he has won 'em all that he set out to win when he turned professional golfer a year and a half ago. He won the U. S. Open in June of 1962, and the Masters last April.

After that victory he said he didn't think he still had arrived. "Wait until I win the PGA," he declared. "When I win that one, I'll consider myself a man."

He won that Sunday when he broke the hearts of those chasing him with a 30-foot birdie putt on the 15th hole of the heat-seared Dac Country Club course before a 110-degree sweat-soaked crowd of 12,500.

The triumph swelled his bankroll \$13,000 to a total of \$75,140, leaving him only \$10,815 behind Golden Boy Arnold Palmer, who finished in a tie for 40th place — and \$410 prize money — as once again he failed to win the only major golf tournament that has eluded him.

He became only the fourth golfer in history to win the three big ones — the Open, Masters and PGA — putting him into the ranks of the game's greatest — Ben Hogan, Byron Nelson and Gene Sarazen. But none of them did it like Nicklaus. It took them years — it took Nicklaus only a year and a half.

That 15th hole birdie in the scorching heat turned back the bids of two 27-year-olds, Dave Ragan and Aussie Bruce Crampton. They had been chasing Nicklaus down to the wire until that big putt on the 15th.

After sinking that long one, Nicklaus, the 210-pound, six foot Ohio belter played it cozy, being satisfied to par the last three holes. That 34-34-68 over the 7,046-yard par 36-35-71 Dac Country Club course, gave him a 72-hole of 279 — five under par for the distance — and two shots ahead of the second place Ragan, who finished with a 33-36-69 for 281. Ragan started the day four strokes behind Crampton, Crampton with a two over par 74 finished in a third place tie with former PGA champ Dow Finsterwald at 282. Finsterwald closed with a one over par 72.

Picked Up \$7,000

Ragan's second place finish was worth \$7,000 while Crampton and Finsterwald picked up \$3,750 each.

Al Geiberger with a 70 and Billy Maxwell with a 71 came next at 284 while another stroke back was former PGA champ Jim Ferrier with a fourth round 66.

At 285 were Gardner Dickinson, Tommy Jacobs, Bill Johnston, defending champion Gary Player and former Masters champion Art Wall. A stroke further back were U. S. Open champion Julius Boros, British Open champion Bob Charles, Wes Ellis, Tony Lema, and Jack Sellman.

Dick Hart, who like Ragan and Crampton is 27 and who led for the first two rounds, wound up at 283 along with Dave Hill, Bob Goalby and Manuel De La Torre. Slammin' Sam Snead, Mike Souchak, Doug Sanders, Bobby Nichols and Mason Rudolph were those at 289 while another former PGA king, Doug Ford, was among a group at 290.

Yankee Men Edge Russians, 119-114

MOSCOW (UPI) — American track and field athletes showed their thanks today on hammer-thrower Matt Connolly for saving a narrow team victory over the Russians when, but many wondered out loud, "who'll save us in the 1964 Olympics?"

A 1-2 finish in the 1,500-meter run by Dwyer Bursleson and Tom O'Hara was the highlight of five Sunday victories that enabled the Yanks to edge the Soviet men, 119-114. This was the narrowest American margin of victory in the five meets that have been held between these two leading world track and field nations.

Russian women swept the 11 events on the two-day program to rout their United States counterparts, 75-28.

From the Soviet standpoint, the most heralded achievement was Valery Brumel's world record high jump of 7 feet, 5 1/2 inches. The Russians won six of the final day's 11 men's events but could not overcome the 61-34 advantage the Yanks had piled up in Saturday's competition.

Still, the United States might have lost this meet for the first time had it not been for Connolly's unexpected victory in Saturday's hammer throw.

The 32-year-old Connolly, now teaching in Finland with his wife,

Olga, had notified U.S. officials that he would be unable to compete against the Russians because of a back injury. He changed his mind at the last minute and came to Moscow for the meet.

Had it not been for Connolly's victory, the U.S. undoubtedly would have lost the men's competition, 117-116.

As it was, the Russians' 10 victories in 22 men's events was their best showing in this series and posed a serious threat to American track and field supremacy at the 1964 Olympics in Tokyo.

Payton Jordan, the U.S. coach from Stanford, praised the Russians as being "perfectly prepared for the meet." And he added that "we are pleased with everything — the weather, the wonderful Moscow spectators and the showing made by many of our sportsmen."

He lauded Bob Hayes of Florida as "the world's fastest human," miler Burleson and sprinter Henry Carr as "stars from our constellation of hope at the forthcoming Olympic Games."

The win was a big one for the Falcons as they brought the playoffs back home with the chance to wrap it up tonight before the home folks. The win was the 28th of the season for the Falcons against seven losses.

McKinley Wins Clay Net Title

CHICAGO (UPI) — Chuck McKinley won his second successive men's singles titles at the National Clay Courts championships Sunday by defeating Dennis Ralston in a battle of two young men who hold the key to the United States' Davis Cup fortunes.

Both McKinley and Ralston frankly admitted after McKinley's 6-2, 6-2, 6-4 victory at River Forest that the Davis Cup was foremost in their minds.

McKinley, 22, San Antonio, Tex., the Wimbledon champion, said he was not going to think about turning pro until after the Forest Hill, Davis Cup and other championship — "and a lot could happen before then," he said.

Ralston, 20, Bakersfield, Calif., playing the summer circuit with blisters on his hand he got while winning the national collegiate title this spring, said the Davis Cup team was his big goal of the moment.

In other play at River Forest Sunday, Nancy Richey, 20, of Dallas, Tex., defeated Vickie Palmer, 18, of Phoenix, Ariz., 6-1, 6-1, for the women's singles title in a contest in which Miss Richey's machine-like efficiency won out over Miss Palmer's powerful play.

Marty Riessen, Evanston, Ill., the Big Ten singles champion, and his Northwestern University teammate, Clark Graebner, Shaker Heights, Ohio, upset McKinley and Ralston, 6-4, 6-6, 6-4, 5-7, 6-3, for the men's doubles title.

Darlene Hard, Los Angeles, Calif., and Maria Bueno of Brazil won the women's doubles title Saturday by defeating two Los Angeles State classmates, Billie Jean Moffitt, of Long Beach, Calif., and Carole Caldwell, of Santa Monica, Calif.

Mills pocketed a record \$2,000 first prize in the record-breaking tournament which saw some of the top pros strung out down the line in the finish.

Fourth place went to Clifford Ann Creed of Alexandria, La., at 299. There was a three-way tie for 29th at 302 between Kathy Cornelius of Scottsdale, Ariz., Mary Lema Faulk of Sea Island, Ga., and Patsy Hahn of Wilmington, Del.

Liston Heavy Favorite To Keep Title With Win Over Patterson

LAS VEGAS, Nev. (UPI) — Fast and fearless Floyd Patterson, admittedly in the best physical and mental condition of his career, will try tonight to stretch his record to three-time heavyweight king in a return title fight with champion Sonny Liston.

A victory by Patterson would knock Liston out of a "seven-million-dollar fight" with Cassius Clay at Philadelphia Sept. 30.

"I feel more relaxed than at any time since I first won the title seven years ago," explained 29-year-old Patterson at the Dunes Hotel, after driving in from his quarters at the Hidden Well Ranch.

The massive, muscular Liston of Chicago was favored at 5-1 to keep his title before a sellout crowd of 7,691 paid spectators in the Las Vegas Convention Center, A record Nevada gate of more

than \$280,000 is assured, promoter Al Bolan said.

The betting was practically on a par with a United Press International poll of 64 sports writers here in this gambling metropolis. Thirty-year-old Liston was favored by the poll, 51-13.

That the bout was not expected to last its scheduled 15 rounds

was emphasized by the fact that all 51 votes for Sonny were on knockouts and nine of the 13 for Patterson called for kayoes.

Liston was a lopsided favorite because of his explosive left hook to body or head, and his ruggedness record of never having been knocked out or even floored in his 35 professional fights. Also because of his previous first-round knockout over Floyd.

Before that Sept. 25 match at Chicago's Comiskey Park, Liston was favored at only 8-5, and a poll of sports writers actually favored Patterson. But Sonny knocked him out at 2:06 of the first round, for the all-time quickest capture of the heavyweight crown.

After Sunday's third examination by Drs. Don Romeo and Charles West, the physicians reported both in excellent physical and mental condition.

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Heavyweight Crown Bout Tops Week's Boxing
