

Milwaukee Decisions Leading Dodgers Twice

You say you were thrown out of both ball games Sunday for umpire-baiting? Your team lost a doubleheader and you were hit in the face with a beer container?

Chin up, Walter Alston, your Los Angeles Dodgers are leading the National League by six games and you have a nine-game home stand coming up.

Despite 7-2 and 13-7 losses to the Milwaukee Braves Sunday, the Dodgers wound up their successful road trip with a 10-4 mark, giving them a six-game lead over the St. Louis Cardinals. When the road trip began, the Dodgers held only a three-game lead over the San Francisco Giants.

The usually quiet and restrained Alston, with the Dodgers' disastrous collapses of the past two seasons indelible in his mind, was ejected in the sixth inning of the first game by umpire Tom Gorman. In the first inning of the nightcap, umpire Stan Landes gave the Dodger manager the thumb. And then a Milwaukee fan belted Alston with a paper beer container.

Alston Claimed Balk
Alston claimed that Bob Sadowski was talking in the open and then became incensed when a balk was called on rookie Nick Willhite of the Dodgers in the second game.

In other NL games, the Cardinals rapped out 17 hits to beat the Houston Colts, 5-4; the Giants clubbed 16 hits in downing the Cincinnati Reds, 10-5; the Philadelphia Phillies swept a doubleheader from the New York Mets, 8-0 and 7-2, and Pittsburgh and Chicago split the Cubs taking the nightcap, 6-5 in 14 innings.

Milwaukee clobbered eight Dodger pitchers for 26 hits, including homers by Hank Aaron, Denis Menke, Joe Torre and Gene Oliver, in sweeping the twin bill. Sadowski earned his first major league victory in the opener while reliever Tony Cloninger got credit for the second-game triumph.

Gibson Notched Win
Bob Gibson pitched an eight-hitter and George Altman and Ken Boyer slammed homers in pacing the Cardinals to victory. Dick Groat drove home three runs for St. Louis.

Jim Davenport, Felipe Alou and Orlando Cepeda contributed homers as the Giants routed 13-game winner Jim O'Toole. Bob Bolin limited the Reds to three

hits in 5 1-3 relief innings to gain the victory.

The Phillies, on another second half of the season surge, extended their winning streak to seven as Chris Short hurled a four-hitter in the opener and Dennis Bennett and Johnny Klippstein combined for a seven-hitter in the nightcap against the Mets. Philadelphia has won 13 of its last 16 games for its longest winning streak since 1955.

Lou Brock's two-run homer and Paul Tolt's seven-hit pitching gave Chicago its first game triumph while Pittsburgh bounced back in the nightcap on Bill Virdon's run-producing single in the 14th inning. Jerry Lynch of the Pirates equalled the major league career record for pinch-hit home runs when he hit one to tie the score 5-5 in the ninth inning. Lynch shares the record of 14 with George Crowe.

Frank Lary Hurls Tigers By Angels In Comeback

It was an old familiar baseball tableau: Veteran Frank Lary of the Tigers struggling along the comeback trail to save his pitching career while young Al Downing of the Yankees jauntily strode the road to World Series gold and glory.

There was satisfaction for both Sunday.

The 32-year-old Lary scored his first victory in more than a year when he pitched a four-hitter as the Detroit Tigers defeated the Los Angeles Angels, 8-2.

And the 22-year-old Downing pitched his sixth victory to start the New York Yankees off to a doubleheader sweep against the Cleveland Indians, 5-2 and 5-4 in 11 innings. The wins widened the Yankees' American League lead to seven games—their widest margin of the season.

All three other games in the AL Sunday were decided by 3-2 scores: the Minnesota Twins edging the Washington Senators, the Boston Red Sox beating the Chicago White Sox, and the Kansas City Athletics topped the Baltimore Orioles. Rain forced postponement of a scheduled twin bill second game between Boston and Chicago.

It was a long time between major league victories for Lary, who returned to the Tigers three weeks ago after a stretch with Knoxville of the Sally League, where he had been sent to pitch his ailing shoulder back into shape.

Lary struck out five batters and walked only two in pitching the distance. A 13-hit Tiger attack with four stolen bases, and four Los Angeles errors, all helped. Angels starter Dean Chance aided Lary's cause with an

error during Detroit's three-run sixth inning.

Meanwhile, Downing pitched an odd game in which he struck out 10 batters and walked nine before tiring in the ninth inning and requiring relief from Hal Reniff.

This was the fourth straight game in which Downing fanned 10 or more hitters. Harry Bright hit a two-run homer for New York.

Won in the 11th

Bobby Richardson's one-out, 11-inning single off old Early Wynn produced the Yankees' nightcap victory and stretched the Indians' losing streak to nine games. Wynn, who scored the 300th win of his career eight days ago, entered the game in relief after Woody Held's triple had tied the score in the ninth. Reliever Steve Hamilton was the winner.

Bob Tillman's 10th-inning homer off knuckleballer Hoyt Wilhelm earned the Red Sox victory over the White Sox. Dick Radatz was credited with his 12th win against a lone defeat after pitching one-hit relief ball for the last two innings.

Don Mincher hit two homers, and John Goryl added another, enabling the Twins to beat the Senators. Each hit one back-to-back in the eighth off Don Du-dolph. Garry Roggenburk was the winner in relief.

A sixth-inning homer by Wayne Causey broke a 2-2 tie and gave the A's their win over Baltimore. Moe Drabowsky, celebrating his 28th birthday, pitched a five-hitter for Kansas City. Mill Pappas was the victim of Causey's homer.
