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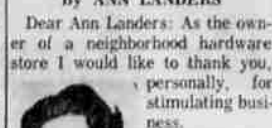

NOTTINGHAM, England (UPI)—The sheriff of Nottingham, Alderman Percy Holland, said Sunday he will "shoot it out" in an archery contest against two American mayors.

The challenge came from the mayors of Portland and Sherwood, Ore., to the Lord Mayor of Nottingham, who has made the sheriff his champion.

The match — six arrows at 10 yards — will take place at Nottingham Aug. 24, when the sheriff will shoot his round at the opening of the Golden Arrow Tournament, which according to legend was first staged as a trap for the outlaw Robin Hood.

The contestants will stay in their own cities and their scores will be cabled across the Atlantic.

Reversal Of Spending Needed To Save U.S.

President Kennedy gave himself high marks at last week's White House news conference. He said his Treasury deficit in the 1963 fiscal year would be only \$6.2 billion instead of the \$8.8 billion estimated six months ago.

The President and his successors must do better than that, however, if the United States is to escape from the tailspin of deficit spending that threatens the American way of life. A stronger president than the United States has had in the past 30 years must come along soon to reverse the trend of spending.

There have been 27 Treasury deficits in the past 34 years. Public and politicians were shocked years ago as the deficits accumulated from year to year. Franklin D. Roosevelt regularly promised to balance the budget but always "next year." He never made it. Now a president considers it reason for congratulation when his budget deficit is a mere \$6.2 billion.

Debt \$306 Billion

All of these budget deficits are paid off with borrowed money. This public debt in 1930 was \$18.1 billion, a holdover from World War I. Interest on the public debt that year was \$659 million.

The public debt today is \$306 billion. The taxpayers have paid \$133 billion in interest on the public debt since 1930, the most costly dead horse of all time. The cumulative budget deficit, 1930-64, was \$278.9 billion. That is the margin by which the United States government has been living beyond its income. The spending trend has been steadily up as politicians happily overworked the late Harry L. Hopkins' famous New Deal system of remaining in office. The system, according to Hopkins, was:

"Tax and tax, spend and spend, elect and elect."

But the politicians lag on taxes, speed on spending. Government expenditures in fiscal 1960 were \$76.3 billion and revenue was \$77.7 billion for a fat surplus. If this
