Wall Street Chatter

NEW YORK (UPI) — The market's ability to maintain reasonable equity price stability despite emotionally disturbing headlines is regarded by E. F. Hutton & Co. as proof that it is in pretty good shape.

It says that internal market factors such as a continued shift of equity ownership from weak to strong hands also are promising. "The market looks like it is marking time here," Hutton says.

Reynolds & Co. says that "the outlook for machine tool makers has been steadily improving and present indications are that this will continue into 1964. By April of this year new orders for metal cutting tools were 51 per cent of year earlier figures. This pickup has continued, Reynolds notes.

Bache & Co. says that although recent developments have clouded the market's short term outlook, it remains convinced that it will move higher later in the year.

Farm Safety Week Starts

The week of July 21 to 27, designated National Farm Safety Week by President Kennedy, is being observed by Basin farmers with special emphasis on the prevention of fire and fall accidents around the farm.

The theme of the 1963 farm safety campaign is "Inspection Plus Correction Equals Protection."

This is the 20th annual campaign sponsored by the U.S. Department of Agriculture and the National Safety Council.

Falls cause between 15 and 20 per cent of the farm accident deaths, while about seven per cent is due to fires. Property losses from fires have increased steadily since 1940. In 1961, fire cost the nation's farmers \$163 million.

Farm tractors lead the list of killers in fatal farm work accidents. Upsetting is by far the most common way for accidental tractor deaths to occur. When a person is injured in an accident of this kind, a high per cent of the injuries result in death. Tractors upset much more easily than most people seem to think. They are heavy, but the weight is high. Once they reach a certain angle, it does no good to disengage the clutch because the tractor will have enough momentum to continue the upset.

Some of the pitfalls to avoid while riding a tractor are:

1. Tractor wheel dropping into either a rut, hole or ditch or hitting a stump or rock.

2. Banks of ditches, creeks or rivers cave in under tractor weight.

3. Driving on a hillside puts tractors in a partly upset position to start with.

Nine people were injured, including three who were hospitalized, in two automobile accidents in the Klamath Falls area Sunday, the Oregon State Police have reported.

In satisfactory condition at the Klamath Valley Hospital Monday were Jean Arlene Alexander, 17, 2411 White Avenue, who received shoulder and rib injuries when her car went out of control and into a ditch near Onyx Avenue and Bisbee Street; Walter Lee Smith, 17, (address unknown), facial laceration, and Patricia Landrum, 39, 823 Newcastle Street, fractured arm, both victims of a two-car accident at Shasta Way and Alameda Avenue.

The latter accident resulted as Eloise Jane Landrum, 15, accompanied by three passengers, was driving northbound along Alameda Avenue when she turned left onto Shasta Way and into the path of a southbound car operated by Conrad Louis Schweiger, 17, 4677 Peck Drive.

Schweiger's car skidded 100 feet before colliding broadside with the Landrum vehicle, resulting in injuries to the six occupants of both cars.

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National Governors' Meeting Deals GOP Civil Rights Defeat

MIAMI BEACH (UPI) — Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller and other Republicans pushing for a vote on the civil rights issue were dealt a setback today by the National Governors' Conference which abolished its resolution committee.

The Democratic-led move had the effect of avoiding on-the-record voting on the politically-inflamed issue.

The showdown vote was 33-16 in favor of an amendment offered by Democratic Gov. Grant Sawyer of Nevada. The result was reached on an almost party line basis.

But Gov. Mark Hatfield, Oregon Republican, who had offered an alternative to force voting on civil rights with limited debate permissible, warned that the governors still could get into controversy in voting on committee reports.

Hatfield forecast a fight over the committee report on public welfare, in which he and Gov. George Romney of Michigan plan to file minority views.

Rockefeller and other Republicans fought to keep the door open for a vote on the issue but Sawyer came up with the plan to abolish the resolutions committee and thus head off another fiasco such as that last year when Southern governors staged a filibuster on the conference.

Rockefeller and Hatfield wanted a rule to permit adoption of resolutions on civil rights and other issues with a proposal containing an anti-filibuster provision.

Sawyer proposed that the entire resolutions process be abolished to avoid another Southern Democratic filibuster.

Both proposals were offered as a substitute for an executive committee proposals to abandon the present two-thirds rule for resolutions and to return to the rule in force before 1956 to require a unanimous vote.

The unanimity rule would permit a single governor to veto any resolution.

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Robbers Hit Dorris Bar

DORRIS — Two armed men masked in women's stockings forced their way into the Star Inn in Dorris early Saturday morning and stole \$200 from the cash register. They fled after knocking the bartender unconscious.

In reporting the incident, George Wise, bartender, stated that shortly after closing, around 2:30 a.m., he heard a knock at the door. He opened the door slightly to check and two men pushed their way inside, armed with a sawed-off shotgun and a pistol.

Wise said they proceeded to loot the cash register and then struck him on the back of the head. He regained consciousness several minutes later and called the owner, Aidan Fenwick, who notified the police.

Wise was hospitalized with a skull fracture.

According to the Sheriff's Office, which is still conducting the investigation, the automobile used by the men was stolen from Klamath Falls and abandoned after the robbery. It was recovered by police about three miles north of Dorris.

MOUNT SHASTA — The W. H. O'Hair Company, with headquarters in Colusa and sub-headquarters in Mount Shasta, is now winding up a total of 2,003 cars of ballast to the Southern Pacific Railway Company for use between Grass Lake, Calif., and Klamath Falls. The last
