

## Aerial Spraying Program Kills Sage, Rabbit Brush

FORT ROCK—Willing of sagebrush and rabbit brush at several Fort Rock and Silver Lake ranches assures a good kill after aerial spraying. The spray program, with ranchers pooling acreages to secure a better price offer, was arranged through the Lake County Extension Service. Bill Moser was in charge.

Done in early June when brush is growing rapidly, this type of range improvement is on the increase. It does away with the wind erosion problem which accompanies plowing of brush.

Sites are selected which have a heavy growth of brush, indicating better soil. After spraying, native grasses can use the moisture which has previously gone to the brush. Some ranchers will then do fall seeding of crested wheat or tall wheat grasses.

Ranchers who took part in this year's spray program were Rich-

ard Morehouse, Maurice Ward and Bud Parks, Fort Rock, and Dudley Long and Jess Penington, Silver Lake. Each rancher provided flagmen to insure spraying of the right location.

Paul Orwein of Lakeview provided the equipment, with Merle Williams of Bellingham, Wash., piloting the Callair spray craft.

## Navy Man Found Guilty Of Espionage

NEW YORK (UPI) — Navy Sept. 28 outside a diner in Larchmont, N.Y. where FBI agents arrested him.

The defendant's first trial ended in a hung jury on May 23.

Under cross-examination in the latest trial, Drummond estimated that he was paid between \$20,000 and \$24,000 by Russian agents since he began working for them in 1957 or 1958 while stationed in London.

However, the panel failed to agree after almost 12 hours of deliberations on a second charge brought against the 34-year-old sailor. Murphy planned to hear motions on the charge July 30.

That count charged Drummond with the specific overt act of attempting to give six naval documents to two members of the Soviet United Nations delegation last

U.S. ships that would be "extremely helpful" to the Soviets.

Broderick said it was too early to say what action the government would take on the second count. He said he considered it "most unusual" that the jury was permitted to make a verdict on the basis of only one of the two charges against Drummond.

## Nelson Gets Horse Association Files Court Charge

MARVIN L. Nelson, administrative officer for Crater Lake National Park, received a superior performance award, Superintendent W. Ward Yeager announced. The award recognized Nelson's outstanding performance rating and his work performance, both in general and during the period April 1962 through March 1963 in particular. During that time, he performed additional duties—created by staff vacancies and by unprecedented park operations—in a manner above and beyond any normal expectation of his job's requirements.

The award was read and presented to Nelson by Superintendent Yeager during staff meeting. It was approved by the National Park Service's Western Regional Office in San Francisco, and the award includes a check for \$250.

Nelson came to Crater Lake National Park in June, 1963, from the service's Midwest Regional Office in Omaha, Neb. Starting with the service as a CCC enrollee in Grand Canyon National Park in 1934, he has served for 29 years with the United States Department of the Interior. Twenty two of these years have been with the National Park Service in various areas and in several capacities.

## Horse Association Files Court Charge

ALTURAS—Contempt of court proceedings are now pending against the American Quarter Horse Association, Amarillo, Tex., over a court decision made by Superior Court Judge M. G. Del Muto on June 28 in San Jose, Calif.

The judge ordered the American Quarter Horse Association, the Pacific Coast Quarter Horse Association, and the California State Horsemen's Association to cease interference with the Model Quarter Horse Association in scheduling of two events at a recent San Jose horse show.

In granting the injunction, Judge Del Muto agreed with the Model Quarter Horse Association in its contention that the AQHA and other parties named had induced a breach of contract between the MQHA and the San Jose horse show committee by acts of a threatening nature.

In the complaint, the Model Quarter Horse Association has

stated the agreement between it and the horse show committee was made May 14, 1963, calling for the inclusion of two classes in the open section of the two-day show. The open show followed by one day the section of the show approved by the American Association.

It was charged that the AQHA threatened the show committee with a revoking of AQHA approval of its portion of the show if the MQHA was allowed to show horses in the open section of the San Jose show.

In spite of the restraining order by Judge Del Muto, the show committee withdrew the MQHA section of the show.

The Model Quarter Horse Association was established two years ago and now has over 10,000 horses in its registry. Headquarters of the association are in Alturas, Calif., with horses registered in every state and several foreign countries. The Model Quarter Horse was accepted this year by the USDA as a recognized breed in its official registry.
