TULELAKE — Catherine Ross of Chilquin, the 1963 Klamath County Dairy Princess, has received a second honor, the Junior Gardening Award, and a \$100 scholarship from Mr. and Mrs. Ed Greene of Oregon Agricultural Chemicals of Tulelake.

The presentation was made at Portland at a meeting of the Oregon Federation of Garden Clubs to Mrs. Arnold Bohnert, president of the Central Point Garden Club in the absence of the recipient who was unable to attend.

Mary Greene of Forest Grove, Ore., daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Greene, made the presentation for her parents.

The award, known as the Lela MacDougal Award honors Greene's mother who is a member of the Agate Beach, Ore., Garden Club. Mrs. MacDougal and members of her club made the first litter bags from common brown paper sacks, decorated them, and distributed them, to help remind Oregon residents and visitors to the state to keep Oregon clean.

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Douglas Fairbanks Jr.'s Name Enters British Vice Trial Testimony

LONDON (UPI) — Blonde Marilyn Rice-Davies, 18, testified today at the morals trial of Dr. Stephen Ward that she had intercourse with former American film star Douglas Fairbanks Jr. At an earlier hearing, Miss Rice-Davies named Viscount Astor, 55-year-old son of American-born Lady Nancy Astor, as another of her lovers.

Fairbanks now is a businessman with wide interests in Britain and Europe.

Fairbanks, 53, is one of the leaders of the American colony in London. He and his wife, the former Virginia Lee Epling of Bluefield, Va., are among the few foreigners who have entertained Queen Elizabeth and the Duke of Edinburgh at home.

There was no immediate comment from Fairbanks on the girl's story. His office referred to all questioners to his solicitor, Philip English, whose representative said only there might be a statement later.

Portlander Found Shot In Pickup

HAGERMAN, Idaho (UPI) — A Portland, Ore., man was found shot to death in a pickup truck parked alongside Highway 30 Monday night.

Gooding County Sheriff Keith Anderson said the victim tentatively had been identified as Richard A. Harald, 31. There was no identification in the man's clothing or in the pickup, Anderson said, but Harald's boss, George Owen, Portland, furnished a physical description that matched the dead man.

Law enforcement officers throughout southern Idaho set up roadblocks Monday night but failed to net any suspects, Anderson said. The roadblocks later were pulled down. Anderson said he questioned three men about the case but later released them.

The body was found in a pickup truck parked in a roadside park about 2 1/2 miles south of here. Harald had been shot in the head.

The vehicle, which bore Oregon license plates, was traced to Owen. At first, it was believed he might be the victim, but officers later spoke with him by telephone. It was Owen who suggested the victim might be Harald.

"It looks like someone probably shot him in his sleep," Anderson said. He added the motive appeared to be robbery.

3 Climbers Recovering

HOOD RIVER (UPI) — Three climbers who fell about 1,500 feet onto Elliot Glacier on Mt. Hood Sunday were recovering today in Memorial Hospital here.

Hospital attendants listed Dr. Mark Hanschka, Dr. Eberhard H. Gloekler and Robert C. Shoemaker Jr., all of Portland, in satisfactory condition.

They suffered multiple injuries, but none considered critical, the hospital said.

The climbers fell while descending the mountain's northeast slope. Winds estimated at from 40 to 60 miles an hour sent boulders crashing past the fallen men.

Rescue efforts of the Crater Lake and Alpinists from Hood River and Mazamas from Portland, along with forestry employees and other mountaineers, were begun about noon, but blowing sand, hail and finally fog delayed the work. It was about 9:30 p.m. before a sled carrying Dr. Hanschka began inching down the mountain.

Dr. Gloekler was able to walk part of the way and overtook the other party. Shoemaker was brought off the glacier about two hours later.

JFK Names Commission To Ponder Automation

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Kennedy is appointing a commission on automation to search for means of easing the unemployment backwash caused when machines replace men.

The President announced appointment of the commission Monday as part of his message to Congress asking that the Interstate Commerce Commission step into a prime example of the impact automation can have — the railroad work rules dispute.

He said the commission would outline the effects automation is likely to have during the next 10 years and recommend governmental action. The commission "should undertake the most comprehensive review of this complex and many-sided subject ever ventured," Kennedy said.

He gave the commission until the end of next year to complete its study.

Act Is "Too Limited"
Kennedy said that last year's Manpower Development and Training Act is "too limited" in scope to "provide the full answer" to a problem of the magnitude of that posed by unemployment in an age of rapidly advancing technology.

A Labor Department report this month blamed automation as the chief cause of wiping out 775,000 production jobs since 1957.

Here are some of the problems of automation age unemployment that the presidential commission must face:

— The Labor Department's manpower report which Kennedy submitted to Congress in March said that U.S. manufacturers had an output in 1962 that was 20 per cent above that of a half-dozen years earlier but employed 1 million less production workers.

Shakespeare Visit Dated

A trip to the Oregon Shakespearean Festival at Ashland, Aug. 13-14, has been arranged by the Horizon Club of the Camp Fire Girls for girls in the eighth grade through high school.

Travel will be by bus with room accommodations at the Mark Antony Motor Hotel. The trip will include two plays, "Merry Wives of Windsor" and "Romeo and Juliet," and a conducted tour of the theatre and backstage.

Leaving Tuesday afternoon, Aug. 13, the group will leave Ashland immediately after the play Wednesday evening and arrive in Klamath Falls around 2:30 a.m. Thursday morning, Aug. 15.

The tour will be limited to 20 girls and adult chaperones, so reservations should be made now at the Camp Fire Office.

The cost will be \$20.25 per person for Camp Fire Girls and a deposit of \$7 is required when the reservation is made and cannot be refunded. Full payment is due by Aug. 6.

The rate includes a round-trip bus ticket, meals up to \$5.50, hotel room, two theatre tickets, and the tour of the theatre.

A preparation meeting for everyone registered for the trip will be held at the Camp Fire office on Aug. 6 at 7:30 p.m.

Judge Levies Prison Term

Judge David R. Vandenberg sentenced Theodore T. Furber to serve a term not to exceed three years in the Oregon State Penitentiary after the accused changed his plea from innocent to guilty on a charge of obtaining money and property by false pretenses. It developed in circuit court before noon Monday.

Furber waived the usual presentencing waiting period and was sentenced moments after he changed his plea.

The defendant had been on parole from California when he passed a fraudulent check in the amount of \$75 to the Skeet's Tavern, 117 South Seventh Street, last Jan. 12.

He was indicted by the grand jury on June 12 and entered a plea of not guilty to the charge in circuit court the following day.

Meanwhile in the other circuit court, Judge Donald A. W. Piper continued until 9:30 a.m. today efforts by attorneys for the state and defense to select a jury for the trial of Sheriff Murray "Red" Britton, indicted by the grand jury April 30 on a charge of allowing a prisoner to escape detention.
