Public Access To 7 KFPA Administered Areas Held To Written Permission Only

Effective Friday, July 26, public access to seven areas administered by the Klamath Forest Protective Association will be restricted to those people who have received written permission from the association, according to George Wardell, supervisor of the KFPA.

Entry into the seven designated areas is being restricted because of the current high fire danger which has increased due to dry conditions in the forests and hot weather.

If the fire hazards increase further the association may suspend its permits for an indefinite period, Wardell said.

Notices describing the boundaries of the closures will be posted on the main traveled roads leading into the restricted area and will also include the date that the closures become effective and where permits may be obtained.

These lands have been set aside as closures because of an excessive amount of inflammable material existing in the area or other conditions tending to cause the rapid spread of fires which may occur.

The permits state that the entrant is to:

Refrain from smoking except in places designated safe, as specified in the permit; build no open fires except in places designated as safe in the permit; have as equipment when using campfires, except when traveling as a pedestrian or camping at posted campgrounds, specified tools for lighting fires.

Such tools include a shovel with a 36-inch handle and an eight-inch blade, an axe with a handle at least 26 inches long and a head weighing at least two pounds, and a water container with a capacity of at least one gallon.

The association has remarked that the fire danger is rapidly approaching "extreme" and has cautioned anyone going into the woods to be particularly careful with cigarettes and campfires.

Anyone seeing an unattended fire is asked to put it out, attempt to control it, or report it to the nearest fire warden or guard station. Information of such fires may be reported collect to the KFPA at TU 4-3282 or TU 4-3217.

Entry permits into closed areas may be issued when the class of day is "low" or "moderate"; however, specified portions of those areas may be closed if the fire hazard in those areas is critical.

Entry permits will not be issued, as a general rule, when the class of day is "high," "extreme," or "explosive," Wardell said.

A general description of the seven areas follows:

10-P—Bounded on the northeast corner by Wocus Bay, on the south by the Klamath River and the Oregon-California state line, Round Lake on the east, and Pinehurst and Old Baldy Lookout on the west.

12-P—Round Butte to the northeast, an imaginary line running east and west approximately three miles south of Bradford Butte, the Williamson River to the west and the Sycan Marsh to the east.

13-P—An area defined as follows: From the Northwest corner of Sycan Marsh to a point six miles east, then north 11 miles; east six miles to Sherlock Well; south 18 miles to Currier Camp;

west three miles; south four miles; then west 10 miles to Riverbed Butte.

4-P—A two-mile wide strip along the North Fork of the Sprague River bordered by Sheep Creek and Obenchain Road.

32-P—An area about 18 miles east of Beaver Marsh, bounded by Location Butte to the north, Bear Butte to the south, Bear Flat to the east and Bulldog Springs on the west.

22-P—A strip about three miles wide and 12 miles long with Kirk on the northwest boundary and Chiloquin on the southwest border of the area. The eastern boundary is near Solomon Butte and follows a meandering

line to the vicinity of Cave Mountain and then Chiloquin.

35-P — An area comprised largely of portions of T32S, T33S, and T34S in Range 11 East. Prominent landmarks are Calimus Butte on the south boundary and Taylor Butte to the east. More detailed information is available at KFPA headquarters.

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Jury Efforts Continue In Trial Of Sheriff

Testimony in the criminal trial of Klamath County Sheriff Murray "Red" Britton was expected to begin this afternoon, following the selection of a jury shortly before noon today, according to County Clerk Charles DeLap.

Efforts to impanel a jury for the trial of Sheriff Britton, indicted by the grand jury on a charge of allowing a prisoner to escape detention, resumed in the circuit court of Judge Donald A. W. Piper early this morning as the case entered its second day.
