

Massive Liston Demolishes Patterson In First Round Again

LAS VEGAS, Nev. (UPI)—With Floyd Patterson now demolished as a challenger, heavyweight champion Sonny Liston turned his attention today to zipping the lip of young Cassius Clay in a \$7 million title fight at Philadelphia's Municipal Stadium, Sept. 30.

Big Sonny, whose ham-like fists floored ex-champion Patterson three times for a knockout at 2:10 of the first round Monday night, will formally sign at Philadelphia on Friday for his second defense against cocky young Clay of Kentucky, it was learned authoritatively today.

Thus will Liston make good on a promise — or was it a threat — he made months ago when he told Clay, "You're next, loud mouth."

Brash Cassius and glowering Sonny will do their pen-wielding at Philadelphia at 2 p.m. EDT Friday.

28th Straight Win
Sonny, who registered his 28th straight victory and 23rd knockout before a sellout 7,816 at Las Vegas Convention Center,

will receive 40 per cent of net receipts from the Philadelphia fight. Clay has agreed to take 22 1/2 per cent.

Patterson, who announced he will not retire despite two first-round knockouts in his latest two-ring appearances, admitted he's out of the title picture right now. Surprisingly he added that he gives Clay a chance to beat Sonny in September because of Clay's youth, speed, weight (about 210 pounds), and punch.

Bob Nilon, president of International Promotions, Inc., admitted today that Liston and Clay

already have come to terms and that they will be in Philadelphia Friday afternoon for a "news conference."

Liston, weighing 215 1/2 pounds to Patterson's 194 1/2, had to take only one good punch — a left hook to the face early in the round Monday night — during his mayhem performance against Floyd. The left hook knocked Sonny back onto his heels for a split second, then he was after the challenger and required only 2-10 to blast Patterson's ambitions of winning the heavyweight crown a third time.

Floyd, 28, already will go down in history as the only heavyweight to win the crown twice — he did it against Archie Moore and Ingemar Johansson.

But Floyd's reputation was tarnished considerably Monday night because at times he seemed somewhat fearful of the massive, solid-punching champion.

And Floyd was booed by the fans when he left the ring. He could draw but little consolation from the fact that he had lasted four seconds longer Monday night than at Chicago on Sept. 23 last year when Sonny took him

out with a single knockdown at 2:06 of the first round.

Sonny battered Patterson to the body and head early Monday night and dropped him to one knee with a right to the head. Floyd was up at "one" and took the mandatory eight count on his feet.

Almost immediately the champion staggered Floyd with a left hook to the head and then barged him at close quarters. Patterson tried to tie up Liston in a clinch but Sonny smashed him again and again in the left ribs with his right fist and broke up the clinch. Then he dropped Patterson with another right to the head.

Again Patterson was up almost immediately and took the eight count standing.

But he wasn't standing long because Sonny, from his "rocking chair," unleashed a murderous barrage that sent Floyd reeling sideways. Then a left hook exploded in Floyd's face and he landed heavily on his haunches on the canvas. He was trying to stand up when referee Harry Krause of Las Vegas reached the full count of "10."

It was Patterson's fourth defeat and third knockout in 42 professional bouts that included 38 wins and 23 kayoes.

Boasts New Record
Las Vegas, the gambling metropolis, which staged its ninth title fight in three years, boasted today a new Nevada record gate of \$286,180, which bettered the \$270,775 drawn by Jack Johnson and James J. Jeffries at Reno on July 4, 1910.

Officials of Sports Vision Inc., estimated that approximately 300,000 spectators had paid about \$1,200,000 for closed circuit television of the fight at various cities in the United States and Canada.

Promoter Al Bolan estimated that Liston and Patterson will receive about \$300,000 each from the net proceeds of gate, television, radio, movies, etc., after exhibitors the television company and the promoters are paid off.

Liston is expected to make more than \$1,000,000 for his end of the September fight in Philadelphia, where promoter Nilon hopes for 80,000 fans and a \$10,000,000 gate. Movies and other ancillaries will collect a gross \$6,000,000.

NY Fashioning Old-Fashioned Runaway In AL

It looks like an old-fashioned New York Yankee runaway — perhaps the easiest since the Yankees themselves romped by 12 games in 1947.

That's the picture in the American League today with the world champions 7 1/2 games in front of the pack and just starting a long home stand where they almost always are at their best.

The Yankees made it four in a row on their current home stand when they whipped the Los Angeles Angels, 4-4, Monday night and opened a 7 1/2-game lead on the idle second-place Chicago White Sox. No other major league games were scheduled in either league.

Ralph Terry, the World Series hero of 1962, staggered the full nine innings on the strength of an early Yankee assault that produced a 7-0 lead after three innings. Terry was tagged for 12 hits — including Lee Thomas'

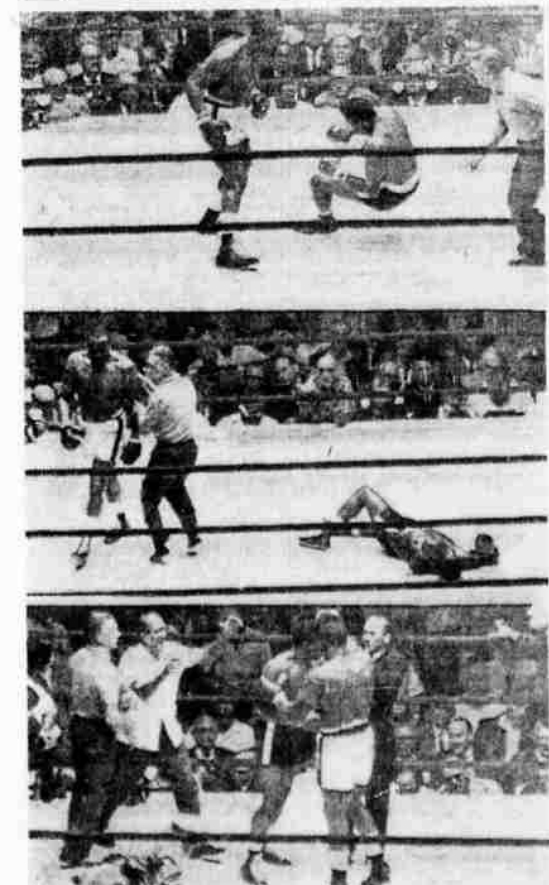
Chargers Hold First Scrimmage

Liston 'Guesses' Cassius Might Not Be Quite So Easy

LAS VEGAS, Nev. (UPI)—Except for four seconds and 1,900 miles, there wasn't any difference — it was still Sonny Liston, the heavyweight boxing champion of the world.

He won the title last September in Chicago when he knocked out Floyd Patterson in 2:06 of the first round.

Monday night, in Las Vegas Convention Center, it took him four more seconds to do Patterson in again.

It was Liston all the way — just like it was nine months ago in Chicago.

"But it was easier this time," said Liston.

He "guessed" it might not be so easy the next time when his opponent will be brash Cassius Clay in Philadelphia on Sept. 30.

"Who's Clay?" he asked. "Was that the guy who came into the ring, shook hands with Patterson and then just waved his right hand at me? I thought it was a fine gesture — that he wanted no part of me. Well, he won't after I get him in the ring at Philadelphia."

Public May Forget
Liston obviously does not think his second one-round kayo of the outclassed Patterson will make him a national hero but he does think zipping Clay's lip might help the public forget about his spotted past. Liston is an ex-convict.

"I just want to be known as a fighting champion," he said. "I'll

Roseburg Next Foe For Birds

Like the Sonny Liston - Floyd Patterson "return" match Monday night, the Klamath Falcon-Brookings game ended much the same as the so-called fight.

Th Falcons, who beat Brookings Sunday on the coast, 10-4, accomplished the feat in easier style Monday night at Gem Stadium to the tune of 14-1 behind the brilliant pitching of Gary Benson and the barrage of hits by the Falcons.

The Brookings players must have thought someone unleashed a pitching machine gone wild on them Monday night as the Falcons tagged two of its Southern Curry pitchers for 17 hits and the 14 runs.

Meanwhile, Benson was having one of his best games of the season. He allowed only two hits the entire game and he set, for himself and the Legion pitchers this summer, a new strikeout record as he set down 17 Brookings batters by the whirling route.

Benson was superb in that he wasn't his usual wild self. He walked only three Brookings batters all night and had a perfect game for four innings. He had a no-hit game going for four and two-thirds innings. In addition to this mound feat, he also slammed a triple and single for three runs-batted-in.

But the Falcons can't take all the credit. Brookings added eight errors. The night game seemed to bother them, for they had played only a couple of games all season under the lights.

The Falcons had pounded two Brookings hurlers for 16 hits in the Sunday game. They built their team average up considerably Monday night with the 17 safeties.

The game belonged to the Falcons from the first. After Benson had set Brookings down in the first frame, the Falcons came to bat and sent 17 men to the plate and scored five runs. LeVoy Young reached first on an error as did Larry Binney. Both advanced on an error by the second baseman of Brookings and John Parisotto got the first run. Mike Kitching walked and Lanny Guyer was the first out on a strikeout.

With the bags still loaded, catcher Jay Paxton walked to force the second run home. Dave Johnson then tied into one of starter and loser Bob Dunn's pitches for a single to right field to score both Parisotto and Kitching. John Gray singled and Benson plated Paxton with his first hit.

That was all the scoring until the fourth although the Falcons threatened in the second. The fourth found Binney whiffing but Parisotto singled again. Kitching doubled to deep right center but
