WALL STREET CHATTER
NEW YORK (UPI)—Investors Research Co. feels that what must be watched now is the nature of the summer rally from present price levels.

The firm says that, if upward momentum resumes the strong trend that it showed from January to May, a significant extension of the bull market can be predicted confidently. However, if the uptrend should falter during a spirited rally, the bull market will be in danger of reversal.

The Alexander Hamilton Institute feels that institutional investors are holding off on purchases awaiting a clarification of the domestic picture. They feel this is indicated by the lack of a summer rally which is usually stimulated by mid-year reinvestment demand. The institute says that under the circumstances, a hesitant market, susceptible to daily news reports, is no surprise.

Analyst James Dines says that the only saving grace in the market's recent downturn is that volume has been contracting over the past several months. He feels this indicates a diminishing buying interest rather than selling pressure.

William R. White of Hornblower & Weeks considers it logical to expect continued emphasis on a cautious policy until the outlook for autumn business becomes clearer.

Morse Pushes Cut In Funds

WASHINGTON (UPI)—A money-slashing amendment by Sen. Wayne Morse, D-Ore., to President Kennedy's foreign aid bill was approved by the Senate Foreign Relations Committee Tuesday.

The amendment would cut the amount of funds for U.S. participation in the "social progress fund" of Kennedy's "Alliance for Progress" in Latin America through the Inter-American Bank from \$200 million to \$100 million.

Court Brings Guilty Verdict

SALEM (UPI) — Louis Zahler, 29, Salem, was found guilty of armed assault by a Circuit Court jury here Tuesday.

Dairymen Purchase Medo-Land; Plan Operation Of Local Plant

Confidence in the future of the Klamath Basin was expressed Monday by Lawrence Geraghty of Merrill and Stanley C. Masten Jr. of Poe Valley, in announcing their purchase of a long-established milk distribution plant in Klamath Falls, the Medo-Land Creamery.

Thieves Hit Hillis Firm

A safe was reported broken into at the Hillis Refrigerator Company, 203 Riverside Drive, sometime Tuesday night and over \$40 taken.

The break-in was reported at 7:30 a.m. Wednesday by Hillis employees. After investigating the crime scene city police found entry was gained in the rear of the adjoining Western Beverage Company and then by forcing a door at the Hillis warehouse.

The safe was rolled back into Western Beverage and the thieves apparently worked on it quite a while before the door opened. Western Beverage reported a considerable quantity of beer was consumed by the thieves while they were working on the safe. About \$12 in the safe was overlooked by the inebriated thieves.

Walter Donart Services Held

Funeral services were held Wednesday, July 24, at 10 a.m. from the Adams Forkner Funeral Home in Seattle for Walter W. Donart, 71, who died unexpectedly on July 20. He lived in Klamath Falls from 1904 until moving to Seattle in 1942 where he purchased the University Transfer Company continuing part ownership until his death.

He was a furrier during much of the time he lived here.

Change of ownership becomes effective on Aug. 1.

The local firm was owned by Beatrice Foods Inc. of Eugene. Both Geraghty and Masten have long records of successful dairy operations and both are acquainted with the need for a return of the firm to the local processing of milk and milk products.

For the last 18 months, bulk milk purchased in this area by Beatrice Foods Inc. has been shipped to Eugene, bottled for retail distribution and returned to Klamath Falls.

Under the new ownership, the present plant is to be remodeled to accommodate return of the processing plant to handle whole milk and milk products. Some new equipment will be added to that of the plant which is now available.

The change will stimulate not only the dairy products industry, but it will benefit local producers of hay and grains and veterinarians with the anticipated increase in milk production and dairy cattle."

Lawrence Geraghty, present mayor of Merrill, has been in the dairy industry for 24 years, operating at his ranch north of Merrill during much of that time. He is a past president of the Oregon Dairymen's Association.

Masten is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Stanley Masten Sr. who pioneered dairymen in the Klamath Basin starting in 1908. He is past president of the Oregon Dairy Council.

A partnership, Masten and Son, formed 14 years ago will continue in the production of Grade "A" milk.

Issuing Starts Today For New Phone Directory

Delivery of the 1963-64 telephone directory started today in Klamath Falls and Bly, according to A. B. Dickerman, local manager for Pacific Northwest Bell.

The cover features full color scenes of western, central and eastern Oregon. The vista from Otter Crest on the coast, a fisherman on the Deschutes and the colorful John Day Canyon combine to urge everyone to "See all of Oregon."

Dickerman urged everyone to jot police, fire and other emergency service numbers in the spaces provided inside the front cover of the new edition. Small pictures of appropriate emergency vehicles have been printed next to these spaces to aid quick identification.

Expanded area code information for long distance calling will be found in the introductory pages of the new directory. Handbooks with area codes for hundreds of U.S. and Canadian communities are available at the business office. New Blue Books for personal number lists are also available for the asking. Both are free of charge.

The post office is delivering most of the phone books again this year, and expects to complete the job by Saturday, July 27.

Some 26,000 copies were printed, with nearly 18,000 to be delivered initially. Another 2,000 will be sent to other communities. The remainder will be used for new customers and for replacement of worn-out books during the year.

Sheriff's Defender Questions Validity Of Indictment

Raleigh Wheeler, state livestock inspector, observed a criminal warrant presented to him in circuit court early this morning and told a jury that the date citing the time he served it on Fred Beymer had been changed from March 16 to March 25.

The statement was made by Wheeler as the trial of Sheriff Murray "Red" Britton, charged with allowing a prisoner to escape official detention, entered its third day in the court of Judge Donald A. W. Piper.

The sheriff is accused of having released from custody Fred Beymer, who had been charged with the embezzlement of an animal upon his arrest by Wheeler on March 16.

Beymer, later acquitted of the embezzlement charge, had not posted bail when released from jail by the sheriff on the same day he was arrested.

Wheeler, one of three witnesses who testified in court before 11:30 today, took the warrant from Deputy District Attorney Bob Thomas and related to the jury that the date he had inscribed on the warrant had been written over in heavy ink.

Deputy District Attorney Thomas did not pursue the matter as to who may have changed the date on the warrant.

Later during the proceedings today, the deputy district attorney produced a record of the arraignment of Beymer which occurred in the circuit court of Judge David R. Vandenberg on March 25. Thomas read in part a statement made by the judge to the sheriff.

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ment made by the judge to the sheriff. The judge, the record shows, queried the sheriff, "Has this man been in custody?"

The sheriff's answer was, "Just got him, your honor," the record states.

Other witnesses in court today were Jess Abbott, circuit court reporter, and E. Nicholson, state brand inspector.

During opening testimony in court yesterday, Deputy District Attorney Bob Thomas sought to introduce as exhibits a number of records from the jail, county clerk's office, and the county court.

The proposed entry of most of the records as exhibits was the subject of objections by the defense attorney, who in expressing his opposition indicated the line of defense he would follow in defending Sheriff Murray Britton.

The defense attorney argued repeatedly that the case against Britton was faulty on three grounds. First, State Livestock Officer R. W. Wheeler, who is also a state branding inspector, did not have the authority to arrest Fred Beymer, the prisoner who had been charged with embezzling an animal and was later released from custody by Britton, the attorney said.

The point made by the attorney sent Judge Piper thumbing through the statutes and he paused at one page to read aloud that a state branding inspector did have the power to arrest.

Britton's attorney then pointed out to the judge that Wheeler had signed the warrant served on Beymer in the name of "Livestock Officer," and not "Branding Inspector."

The issue was pursued later under the cross examination of Wheeler by Britton's attorney.

To earlier testimony elicited by Deputy District Attorney Thomas, Wheeler said that on Friday, March 15, he sought and obtained from Sheriff Britton a warrant charging Beymer with the embezzlement of an animal.

Wheeler stated that the following day he served the warrant on Beymer, who was in Malin working for Stuart Nicholson, a Port Klamath rancher, and took him in custody to the Klamath County Jail.

Before cross-examination of the witness, Britton's attorney read to the court a paragraph from the state statutes which cited that

only peace officers or members of the Oregon State Police were empowered with the authority to arrest.

Then he asked Wheeler, "Are you a peace officer?"

"Yes, I am," Wheeler answered.

"Oh? And what kind of a peace officer are you?"

"Why, I'm a peace officer for the Department of Agriculture," Wheeler replied.

The attorney reiterated the paragraph from the state statutes and asked again of Wheeler, "Do you consider yourself a peace officer?"

"That's what I was told when I passed my state examination in Salem," Wheeler answered.

On the second point, the attorney charged that the indictment against Britton incorrectly stated that Beymer had unlawfully been released from custody on or about April 16.

The accurate date was actually March 16, one month earlier than that noted on the indictment. The attorney cited that Beymer was arrested March 16 and appeared in circuit court on March 25, when he posted bail and pled

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not guilty to the charge. It was during that period that Britton was charged with permitting Beymer to escape detention. The latter was later acquitted of the charge following a trial which began April 18.

Deputy District Attorney Thomas then pointed out to the court that the indictment read "on or about" April 16, and added that the state was not obligated to prove that the incident occurred on any specific day.

On the final point, the attorney for Britton argued that the indictment stated that the defendant, "as a public servant," was responsible for releasing Beymer from custody. No place in the document does it state that Britton is the sheriff and for that

reason the warrant is insufficient, the attorney said.

The highlight of yesterday's proceedings was in the form of testimony from Beymer and Larry Alexander, a Klamath Falls police officer who testified that he was assisting the sheriff's office in the county jail at the time Beymer was apprehended.

The testimony of the two witnesses was somewhat at variance.

Beymer denied that he had ever been booked at the jail or that he had relinquished property from his person to any of the jailers.

In later testimony, Alexander stated that he had entered Beymer's name in the jail ledger and had also received his person.

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
