

New Stamp Issue Set For Earhart

ATCHISON, Kan. (UPI) — A first-issue air mail stamp went on sale here today to commemorate the aerial feats of famed aviatrix Amelia Earhart and the 66th anniversary of her birthdate in this northeast Kansas town.

Postmaster Gen. J. Edward Day came to town for the occasion, along with Sen. Frank Carlson and Reps. William Avery and Bob Dole, Kansas Republicans. A military band from Scott Air Force Base, Ill., boomed out martial tunes.

Atchison Postmaster John E. Smith predicted 750,000 of the commemorative stamps would be sold. He said it would be the largest single sale of air mail stamps on record.

Folks in Atchison, all 13,000 of them, enjoy seeing the name of their hometown on Atchison, Topeka and Santa Fe Railway cars. They brag about having the only alcohol distillery in the state. But Atchisonians are most proud of Amelia Earhart.

A stadium and the city airport are named for her. A monument to Miss Earhart's aerial accomplishments was erected in 1938. Today, a plaque at the public library was to be unveiled in her honor.

Miss Earhart, known as the "First Lady of Aviation," disappeared with her co-pilot, Fred Noonan, on a globe-circling flight. They vanished somewhere near a Howland Island in the Pacific Ocean on July 2, 1937.

2 Killed, 31 Hurt In Train Crash

HARRISON, N.J. (UPI) — Two persons were killed and 31 others injured early today when a four-car commuter train rammed a switch engine at a track crossing.

The impact of the collision ripped off side panels of the first three units of the electric train operated by the Port of New York Authority. The first car was derailed.

Police said 18 of those hurt were taken to Newark in a Pennsylvania Railroad train which was flagged down at the scene of the accident. Others were rushed to hospitals by taxicabs summoned by authorities.

The dead were identified as Quinton Villanueva, 63, Irvington, N.J., and Mary Misiak, in her 30s, Jersey City.

Villanueva died in St. Michael's Hospital in Newark less than two hours after the wreck, which occurred at 1:10 a.m., EDT. Three other persons were treated at that hospital and released while a fourth was admitted with head injuries.

The woman died in Beth Israel Hospital in Newark, where 26 others were taken. Four of the 26 were admitted, two in critical condition. The others were treated and released.

One person was reported in critical condition at West Hudson Hospital in Karmy, N.J.

The port authority train, bound from New York City to Newark with 42 passengers and a crew of four, hit the Pennsylvania switch engine while it was pushing seven freight cars onto a siding.

Police said the switch engine, as well as one of the freight cars and part of a second, were extended past a clearance marker onto the track on which the port authority train was traveling.

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Off-Duty Officer Killed By Supermarket Robbers

SACRAMENTO (UPI) — An off-duty Sacramento policeman was shot to death Tuesday night when he attempted to stop two holdup men at a supermarket where he was shopping with his family.

A lone highway patrolman arrested the two suspects minutes later—thanks to quick thinking by the victim's son and a suspicious citizen.

The police department identified the slain officer as Eugene Edgar McKnight, 38, a 16-year veteran on the force. He was shot in the back of the neck in the parking lot of the supermarket.

The suspects were identified as James Leslie Turner, 30, and Harry Schader, 28, both prison parolees from Oakland, Calif. Police said they admitted the shooting.

Police officials said McKnight, in plain clothes, was standing behind Turner in the checkout line at the market when Turner ordered the checker to empty the till of almost \$1,000.

McKnight followed the two men out of the store, grabbed Schader around the neck with his left arm and covered Turner with his service revolver, which he held in his right hand.

Police said Schader wrenched loose, knocked McKnight down and shot him. The two suspects jumped into a car and sped off.

McKnight's son, Terry, 19, witnessed the shooting and took the license number of the car. Moments later, a suspicious householder reported to police that two men had hastily parked one car near his home and sped off in a red car parked in the lot of another market a few blocks away.

Highway patrolman Jack Morris spotted the red car on U. S. Highway 40 north of Sacramento and gave chase. The suspects stopped and surrendered to Morris without resistance.

Turner and Schader were booked on charges of murder, armed robbery and the theft of the getaway car.

DAYTON, Ohio (UPI) — A case of serious eye damage from the eclipse that occurred last weekend was reported here Tuesday when Paul Lessis, 33, consulted an ophthalmologist.

Scar damage was found and Lessis was referred to the clinic at Ohio State University in Columbus. Lessis said the damage was "pretty bad. I have kind of a blank spot when I look at things."
