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51 Runs Scored In Two Games Filled With Many Surprises

The stout-hearted and warm-clothed baseball fan got his money's worth Wednesday night at Gem Stadium as the District One Babe Ruth Tournament opened. The some 700 fans watched five and a half hours of baseball, saw 51 runs cross the plate, and just about anything else connected with the game of baseball.

Incidentally, the National All-Stars and the Cal-Ore All-Stars won the games.

The Nationals won the first game in a three-hour and five-minute marathon over the West Stars, 15-14, and had to shut off a big rally in the seventh to gain the victory.

The Cal-Ore Stars, made up of Lakeview and Alturas players, brought their base-hitting bats with them and had baseballs flying all over the park in blasting the American All-Stars, 16-6 in only four and a half innings of baseball.

The first game had a little bit of everything while the second game was virtually legitimate in that base hits accounted for the majority of runs scored.

The West Stars and the American Stars met tonight in the first game at 7 o'clock. The second game will start after the first and will pit the Nationals against the East All-Stars, the team with the first round bye.

The Nationals and West are favored while Cal-Ore draws a bye.

The first game was virtually a comedy of everything. There were many, many errors committed, 20 walks issued by the two sides, two hit batsmen, fly balls completely lost by outfielders, a rhubarb about bean balls being thrown by both pitchers, an inspection for a spit ball and the usual harassment of the umpires.

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The Nationals took the lead to stay in the third on a seven-run barrage which seemingly put them out in front with no worries. When they added to the margin for an 11-2 margin in the fourth, it appeared all over. But the West Stars had other ideas and made a valiant run at the favored Nationals.

Bob Moore started and eventually got the win for the Nationals. He left once to go to first base but returned five batters later and in the big inning when the West almost caught up—the last. He gave up seven of the eight hits and walked eight. Mike North, who relieved him shortly, gave up a triple and two walks and hit batsman.

Southpaw Tom Osa was the loser. He gave up eight hits also and walked 10 in his stint. He had a few more errors behind him than Moore and North did, however.

The winners were led by Dave Lyman at the plate. He had a pair of triples and a single for four runs-batted-in. Moore was the only other hitter with a pair of hits, both singles. Ferrell had a triple and single for the losers. Mike Milligan had two singles and Jim Goodman a triple and single.

The second game was all Cal-Ore despite the fact that the Americans got the first two runs. Cal-Ore came back with five in their half of the first and went on a hitting rampage in the second inning for 11 runs.

Norm Samples, Jeff Sullivan and Darrell Roush led the winners at the plate. Samples hit two ground rule doubles which bounced over the left field fence and a single to plate four runners. Sullivan had two singles for three RBIs and Roush a triple, double and single for two RBIs.

Jim Drew had two singles and John Crawford two singles for the losers. Steve Runge, the starter, was the loser. He was bombed out after one frame. Ruben Aldinger took over with none out in the second and gave up one in the third.
