

Drysdale, Koufax Gain Momentum As Dodgers Win

What a difference a year makes!
Just one year ago today the Los Angeles Dodgers were rolling out in front of the National League pennant race just as they are now with a seven-game lead. The pennant was being conceded to them because no one realized that Sandy Koufax was out for the remainder of the season and Don Drysdale would soon begin to feel the effects of his absence.
Today the picture appears the same — but actually it's vastly different.
The Dodgers are out in front seven games, all right, but this time the two key men — Koufax and Drysdale — are gaining momentum rather than losing it. Koufax stands 16-3 with nine straight victories and Drysdale, rather than beginning to lose strength, appears to be gaining.
The 6-foot, 6-inch, 230-pound sidewheeler, feared by all National League hitters, gained his 13th victory of the season Wednesday night with a five-hit, 5-1 victory over the Pittsburgh Pirates. He is the first pitcher in the major leagues to reach 200 innings pitched for the season and he says, "I'm stronger at this point of the season than I've ever been."
A Winning Trio
Koufax, Drysdale and Johnny Podres (10-6) have scored 39 victories among them and with 63 games left to play in the season shape up as one of those rare pitching triumvirates that can total 60 or more victories in a campaign.
Drysdale struck out eight and walked only one in cruising to his 13th win behind a seven-hit attack that included two hits each by Jim Gilliam and Johnny Roseboro. Earl Francis, tagged for the five runs in 4-2-3 innings, suffered his fifth defeat against three wins.
The San Francisco Giants shaded the New York Mets, 4-3, the Milwaukee Braves downed the St. Louis Cardinals, 8-1, the Chicago Cubs edged the Cincinnati Reds, 2-1, and the Philadelphia Phillies defeated the Houston Colts, 6-3, in other NL action.
Double Downs Meets
Jim Davenport's two-run ninth-inning double was the winning blow for the Giants and extended the Mets' league road-record losing streak to 10 straight games. Billy Hoelt, the beneficiary of the Giants' three-run outburst, picked up his second win while Al Jackson, who allowed only three hits and two earned runs, suffered his 12th defeat against six wins.
Denny Lemaster pitched a five-hitter to win his sixth game for the Braves, whose 11-hit attack featured homers by Dees Menke and Frank Bolling. Hank Aaron and Lee Maye also contributed two hits to the Braves' attack as Ernie Broglio suffered his seventh loss against 10 wins.
Dick Ellsworth, en route to becoming the Cubs' first 20-game winner since Hank Wyse in 1945, pitched a four-hitter against the Reds for his 14th victory against seven defeats. Doubles by Lou Brock and Ellis Barton drove in Ellsworth and Brock in the seventh inning with the runs that handed Bob Purkey his sixth loss against four triumphs.
Jack Baldschun's two-hit shutout relief pitching for 2-1-3 innings closed out Cal McLish's 10th win of the season for the Phillies. Ken Johnson suffered his 14th loss for the Colts despite three hits by Bob Aspromonte.

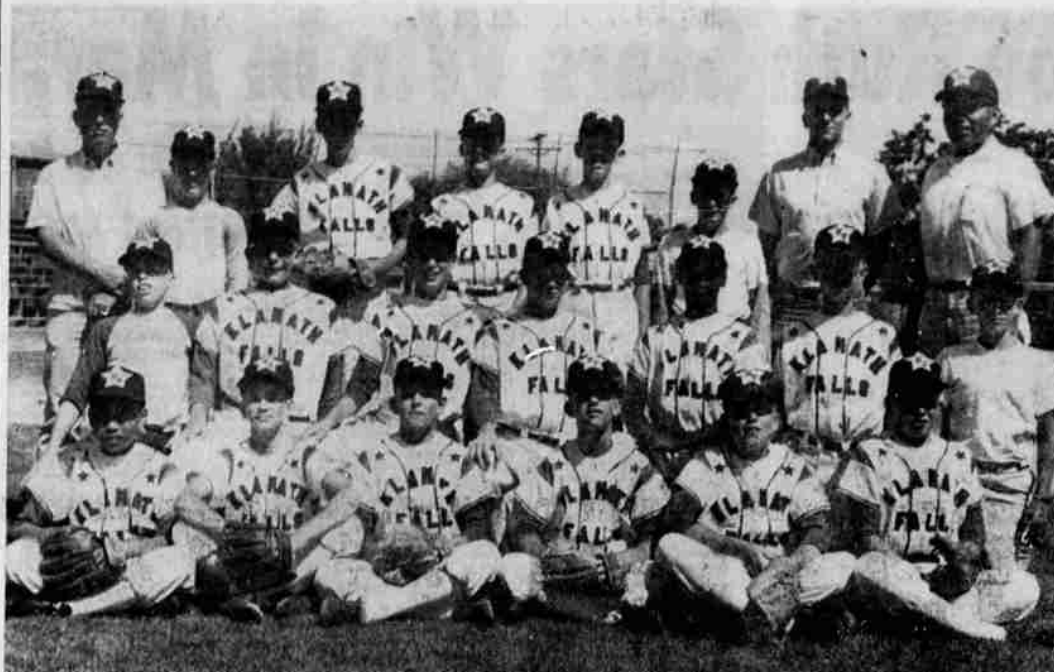

The list of undefeated regular hurlers in the Pacific Coast League has dropped to two. Ray Rippelmeyer of San Diego has a 7-0 mark and Jim Coates, also of the Padres, has 3-0.
Denver knocked Pete Richert out of the box Wednesday night to erase him from the perfect list. The Bears took a 4-1 decision from Northern Division leaders Spokane with Russ He-man going all the way for the victors and giving up but four hits.
In other games Oklahoma City took a pair from the Portland Beavers, 4-2 and 10-1. San Diego dropped a 5-4 decision to Dallas-Ft. Worth and Tacoma edged Salt Lake City, 4-2. In the contest at Hawaii, Seattle evened the series at three games each with 6-4 decision over the Islanders.
In the Spokane-Denver game, Herman chalked up his second victory against five losses, besting Richert all the way. He allowed no walks and retired 14 of the last 15 men he faced.
Low Kilmchuck's 11th home run of the year was enough to win the contest. He got the blow with one man aboard in the first inning. The Bears added two more in the sixth as insurance, getting 10 hits for the evening.
Spokane scored its lone run in the second on a double by Bart Shirley and a single by Mike Brumley.
The home run ball played an important role in the Ranger victory over San Diego. Round-trippers by Cesar Tovar and Ray Jablonski tied the score twice and the winning tally crossed the plate on a pinch single by Ray Belino, a single by Jay Ward and an infield out.
Chico Ruiz of the Padres planted the first pitch by Dallas-Ft. Worth starter Ted Sadowski out of the park and the Rangers went on to score two more tallies in the frame.
A crowd of 7,030 watched the contest. Don Williams working in his 38th game relieved Sadowski with one out in the first and got his seventh win. John Flavin was the loser.
Cap Peterson, Tacoma infielder, banged out a homerun in the second inning to start a three-run rally that gave the Giants a 4-2 decision over Salt Lake City. Jerry Thomas went the route to record his 11th victory against eight losses. Phil Murdock was the loser although he and reliever Tom Baker gave up but seven hits to nine for their teammates. Baker pitched brilliant ball giving up just one hit in the final 5-2-3 frames of relief duty.
The victory, coupled with the Spokane loss, put the Giants just three games away from the top of the Northern Division.
Oklahoma City's twin win over Portland strengthened its hold on top spot in the Southern Division and pushed the Beavers 12½ games behind Spokane.
Grady Hatton's 9ers took a nip-and-tuck opener of the double header mainly due to the bat of Danny Murphy who drove in two runs. They also scored on back-to-back doubles by Bob Boyd and Al Heist. Dave Theis was the loser (3-4) and Jerry Nelson the winner (7-5).
In the nightcap the 89ers sewed up the contest in early innings, counting on a run in the first, two in each of the second and third innings and three in the fourth. One of the tallies in the fourth was a solo home run by Glenn Vaughn. Ben Johnson was credited for his 7th win against as many losses and Lew Krausse was charged with his seventh loss against 10 wins.

Ford Nearing 200th Win As Yanks Continue Pace

Anything seems possible for the New York Yankees these days so why can't Whitey Ford go on to equal the American League record of 16 straight victories and join the 200-win club before the season is over?
The 34-year-old left-hander is approaching both goals with a string of 12 consecutive triumphs that have increased his career total of victories. His season record is 16-3 and the way the Yankees support him it looks like he can go on winning forever.
Ford has gone nine innings only five times in those 12 straight victories but the Yankees have supported him with excellent late-inning relief help and what's more important, runs—lots of 'em. They haven't scored less than three runs in any of the 12 games and have totaled 67 for an average of 5.6 runs per game.
Shout those figures at Roger Craig, the luckless New York Met pitcher who has lost 15 in a row and 17 in all, and he'll tell you in a few thousand words why it's great to be a Yankee.
Wins 12 Straight
Ford won his 12th straight and 16th of the season Wednesday when the Yankees drubbed the Los Angeles Angels, 8-4. Johnny Blanchard, subbing for Roger Maris, drove in four runs with two singles, and his fourth homer in three days to lead the Yankees' 15-hit attack. Ford retired after seven innings but Hal Reniff and Bill Stafford closed out the win for him.
Ford's winning streak is the longest in the American League since he won 14 straight in 1961. The AL record of 16 straight is shared by Walter Johnson, Smokey Joe Wood, Lefty Grove and Schoolboy Rowe.
The Minnesota Twins picked up a half-game on the leaders with a 9-0 and 5-0 sweep of a two-night doubleheader with the Cleveland Indians. The Chicago White Sox defeated the Detroit Tigers, 3-1, the Kansas City Athletics downed the Boston Red Sox, 5-2 and 7-6, and the Baltimore Orioles beat the Washington Senators, 8-5, in other AL games.
Hurts Seven-Hitter
Dick Stigman pitched a seven-hitter and Jim Kaat a six-hitter as the Twins double-blanked the Indians and crept within 8½ games of the runaway Yankees. Don Mincher hit two homers and Rich Rollins and John Goryl one each to lead the Twins' 11-hit attack in the opener. Jimmy Hall hit a tie-breaking ninth-inning homer as the Twins scored five ninth-inning runs in the nightcap after being shut out by Dick Donovan.
Ron Hansen drove in all three runs with a two-run homer and a sacrifice fly to help the White Sox' Gary Peters register his ninth win with an eight-hitter. Rocky Colavito homered for the Tigers' run.
Orlando Pena pitched a seven-hitter and had two hits himself for the A's in their opener. The A's won the nightcap on the strength of a five-run third inning featured by doubles by Wayne Causey, Jerry Lampe and George Alusk. The A's have won nine of 12 games with the Red Sox this season.
Jackie Brandt, Johnny Orsino and Bob Johnson hit homers and Dick Hall pitched 6-2-3 innings of shutout relief for the Orioles, who handed Washington's Jim Duckworth his eighth setback. Minnie Minoza hit a grand slam homer for the Senators.



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
