Ward Admits 'Thoroughly' Immoral Man

LONDON (UPI)—Dr. Stephen Ward, admitting that he is a "thoroughly immoral man," testified today at his vice trial that he thoroughly disapproves of any woman who takes money "for sex alone."

Ward, whose introduction of play girl Christine Keeler to War Minister John Profumo opened the door to Britain's sex and security scandal, was called to the witness stand as the defense opened its case in Old Bailey Court.

His attorney described him as a "highly sexed man who has had affairs with a great many women." Ward, osteopath, artist, and 50-year-old playboy, agreed that he was "thoroughly immoral."

He began his testimony shortly after Miss Keeler, 21-year-old red-haired call girl, testified for a second time and then ran the gauntlet of a jeering, hooting crowd of more than 1,000 persons as she left the court. Two eggs were thrown at Christine, but they missed, and she was unharmed as police held back the crowd and hustled her away in a taxi.

Beginning his story of the scandal that threatened to topple the British government, Ward said he was introduced to Profumo by Viscount Astor, owner of the famed Clevedon estate where Ward maintained a cottage.

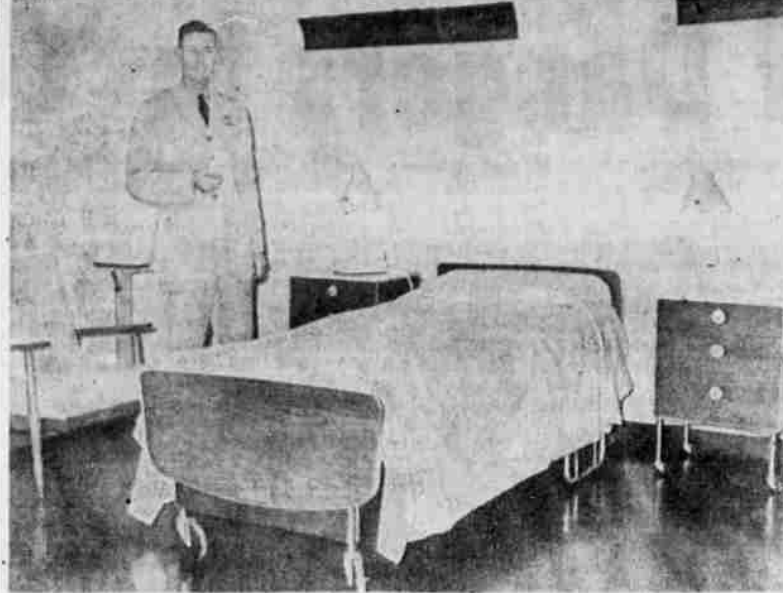
The subsequent affair between Christine and the war minister after they met at Clevedon resulted in Profumo's resignation and an uproar against the Conservative government of Prime Minister Harold Macmillan. As the scandal spread, Ward was brought to trial on charges of living on the immoral earnings of Christine and of seducing young girls into a life of vice.

Under questioning by defense attorney John Burge, Ward said he did not feel that Christine was a "prostitute."

"It all depends on what you mean by a prostitute," he said. "If you simply mean a woman who sells her body—that would apply to any woman who married for money."

"I myself thoroughly disapprove of any woman who takes money for sex alone."

Ward, who said he had had many distinguished sitters as an artist, testified that he has been a friend of Lord Astor, 55-year-old son of American-born Lady Nancy Astor, for 12 years.

BLM Starts 2-Day Tour

The Bureau of Land Management's Keno and Galice roads are principal points of interest in a tour of the Medford District to be taken by representatives of the western Oregon counties, District Manager Ronald J. Schofield announced. The tour started today and will end Friday, July 26.

A similar tour is arranged annually for the five-member road committee of the Association of O&C Counties. The committee has functioned for more than a decade, and Judge Clayton Nyberg of the Washington County Court is the current chairman. Judge Nyberg this year has invited representatives of all of the 18 western Oregon counties to participate, and about 35 persons are taking the tour, Schofield said.

Departing by bus from the Medford District office at 8 a.m. on Thursday, the group traveled to Hyatt Lake via a road recently completed by purchasers of BLM timber, thence past Howard Prairie Lake to the Keno road.

The road committee is particularly interested in the Keno road because it was constructed with appropriated funds which the Association of O&C Counties recommended be made available for that purpose, according to Schofield. Grading of the 27.5 mile road was completed a year ago, with rock surfacing planned during the next year. It connects the Dead Indian and Klamath Falls highways.

The group also will visit the just completed Surveyor and Topsy recreation sites and will see brush eradication and tree planting projects on Thursday, returning to Medford that evening.

On Friday the group will travel westward to the Galice road, which was the first one constructed in the Medford District with appropriated funds. Other points of interest will include recreation sites developed by the Bureau of Land Management and Josephine County, and the recently completed Alameda bridge across the Rogue River at Grave Creek.

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Judge Raps Demonstrators

NEW YORK (UPI)—Five civil rights demonstrators, reprimanded by a tough-talking judge for their lack of "remorse," will spend 30 to 60 days in the city workhouse for taking "the law into their own hands."

Criminal Court Judge T. Vincent Quinn ignored a lawyer's plea for suspended sentences Wednesday when, in response to the judge's question, the five white defendants refused to promise they would not repeat the actions that led to their arrest.

First Sentences Imposed
The sentences, on charges of disorderly conduct, were the first to be imposed in the current wave of arrests at city construction sites where civil rights groups have been demonstrating against alleged job discrimination.

Two of the defendants, Mrs. Rita Schwerner, 21, a housewife, and Harold Kerster, 27, a social worker, were sentenced to 30 days in the workhouse after they pleaded guilty to the charges.

The other three—Mrs. Schwerner's husband, Michael, 22, pub-

lic relations man Samuel H. Friedman, 66, and Lisa Henry, a 29-year-old actress-singer—pleaded innocent and were slapped with 60-day sentences.

He said CORE felt that "an obvious 'example' is being made" of the five and that CORE "describes the aggressive and disciplinary tactics of the court, making peaceful citizens its victims."
