Slam Invite Given Early

Sally Johnson of Westport, Conn., and Bee Schenck of New York, have specialized in winning women's team tournaments for the last several years. Their last victory was at the Easterns where their partners were Ruth Sherman and Muriel Kaplan.

One of the essentials of good partnership is the ability to reach slams at the right time and by methods which allow the slam invitation to be given before game is reached.
Mrs. Johnson's opening spade bid was sound on account of her distributional values, although she only held 12 high card points. Mrs. Schenck intended to get to game once her partner opened and had hopes for a slam if Sally held the right cards. Therefore Bee set out to give the complete picture of her hand.
Her series of bids clearly showed that she did not hold more than one heart and that she was interested in a slam. Had she not been interested she would have jumped to four spades over two. Sally still had the 12 points she started with, but she knew that Bee was short in hearts. In that case it would be easy to ruff some of her heart losers in dummy, so Sally bid five diamonds to invite the slam above game. That invitation was enough for Bee. She went to the slam.

There wasn't much to the play. Sally won the club opening and led a heart. West won and led a second club. Sally ruffed in her hand, ruffed a heart, drew trumps and discarded her last two hearts on two of dummy's high cards.
