

Judge Orders Speedup In 'Stairstep' Desegregation

A concerted campaign by integration groups for faster public school desegregation has received a new boost from a significant federal court decision.

U.S. District Judge Edwin M. Stanley ruled Wednesday that a "stairstep" desegregation program in the schools of Durham, N.C., after just one year's trial, is too slow. He ordered elementary and junior high schools desegregated in September and high schools one year hence.

Stanley's decision, if upheld in the higher federal courts, could provide the legal foundation for attacking similar plans in operation in a number of other Southern school systems. It was one of the rare cases since the Supreme Court school decision of 1954 in which a court has thrown out a gradual desegregation program already in operation.

Durham, which began a grade-year integration program by school divisions in 1962, admitted to previously all-white schools 53 Negroes at the elementary level, 30 to junior high and 15 to high school.

Stanley ordered almost 200 Negroes admitted to Durham white schools this fall, gave others the chance to transfer by Aug. 12 and directed the total desegregation of everything through high school by September of 1964.

Until recently, federal courts have been inclined to accept "stairstep" desegregation plans as moves in good faith by school boards. The jurists usually have retained supervision over the procedure to make certain it was not being used in a discrimina-

tory fashion.

District Judge Frank A. Hooper refused to speed up the grade-year program of the Atlanta schools. Hooper ruled that the city school board was moving in good faith.

At the pupil placement level, Alabama's law has been upheld by the Supreme Court which left its good faith application up to Alabama school authorities. A district judge has ordered Birmingham to prepare a September desegregation plan under the law.

Latest figures show that fewer than one out of 200 Negroes in 11 Southern states attend classes with white children.

The National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP) has led the legal fight for more speed. Of the 70 school cases the NAACP has pending, most "involve some question of gradualism," according to Jack Greenberg of the agency's legal defense fund.

Supreme Court Justice Arthur Goldberg, speaking for the court in a Memphis, Tenn., parks desegregation case, warned that it "was never contemplated that the concept of 'deliberate speed' would countenance indefinite delay in elimination of racial barriers in schools, let alone other public facilities."

Dear W.T.L.: It is in perfectly good taste for a woman to pow-

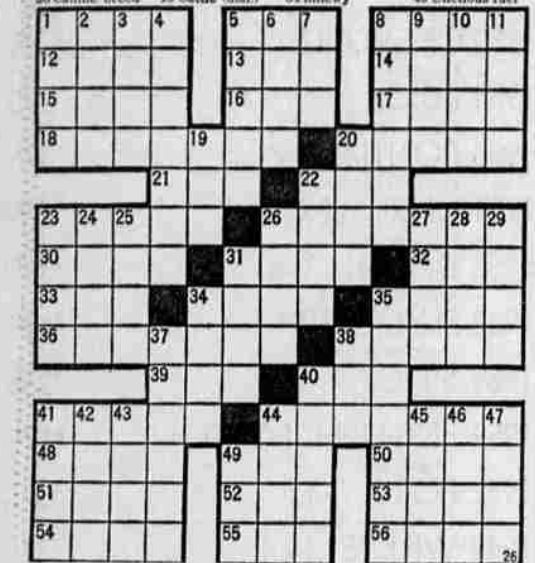

AF Scientists Conduct Ionosphere Experiment

Air Force scientists have made detailed studies of the ionosphere and the surface of the sun in experiments conducted during the solar eclipse on July 20.

Representatives of the Office of Aerospace Research (OAR) saw the eclipse from the Canadian Northwest Territories to the state of Maine. Two OAR units—the Air Force Cambridge Research Laboratories (AFCLR) and the Aerospace Research Laboratories (ARL) also took part.

A research physicist in the General Physics Research Laboratory at the Aerospace Research Laboratories, Wright-Patterson Air Force Base, Ohio, flew with the Douglas Aircraft-National Geographic Society expedition. This group flew north from Edmonton, Canada, to follow the eclipse from the vicinity of Great Slave Lake.

The ARL research physicist secured flash spectra of the solar chromosphere in infra-red. His photographs showed lines of light coming from highly excited atoms in the region from over 12,000 miles to just under 40,000 miles above the sun's surface. Through the studies, the ARL physics group hopes to learn something about the workings of the outer areas of the sun.

To obtain the necessary data, work had to move rapidly. Only at the start and at the finish of the eclipse are conditions exactly right for the work. The ARL research physicist had a total of 12 seconds—six at the beginning and six at the end—in which to shoot over 200 photographs of light from the sun. This work cannot be duplicated in the laboratory, and can only be done during a total eclipse.

Further to the east, at OAR's Churchill Research Range at Fort Churchill, Canada, rockets were fired, instrumented for the Air Force Cambridge Research Laboratories, Bedford, Mass., the National Aeronautics and Space Administration and Johns Hopkins University. The ionosphere is of prime concern to aerospace re-
