Wall Street Chatter

NEW YORK (UPI) — Bache & Co. says its optimistic outlook for the remainder of the year has been bolstered by the impressive string of excellent second quarter earnings reports and the generally encouraging market response.

The firm believes that if higher earnings and dividends are the basis for higher stock prices, "then the groundwork has been laid for a stronger market later in the year."

Leslie M. Pollack of Reynolds & Co. feels the market's present easiness is nearing an end and suggests accumulation of favorably situated issues if further weakness should develop.

Indicator Digest says the market abhors uncertainty and it is questionable if it can withstand any further adverse news. The firm feels that if a rally should develop it would be limited in scope by the unsettled state of affairs.

Goodbody & Co. believes that renewed investor interest in the steel sector could provide attractive opportunities in issues which have the best competitive cost and growth positions.

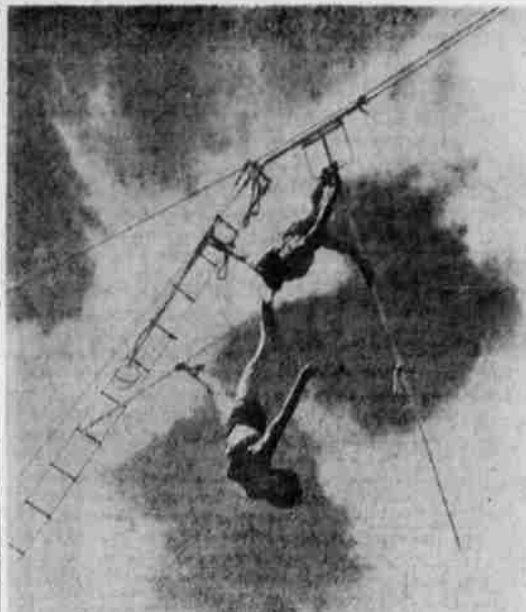
Teams posting the highest scores regionally will receive recognition for their achievement, while the team with the best score nationally will receive a silver trophy.

Mishap Injures Billie Chambers

BLV — A Klamath Falls man, Billie Chambers, 3210 Bristol, was taken to Lakeview Hospital Thursday where he is recovering from injuries received when his car struck a fully loaded logging truck at Milepost 64 on Highway 66 on Quartz Mountain at 4:40 p.m. His condition was listed as good early Friday morning.

A. J. Myrick, owner and driver of the truck, was uninjured.

Lakeview sheriff's office reports indicate that when his car rounded a curve, Chambers was momentarily blinded by the sun, crossed the center line and careened into the truck. The impact spun the car around and into the side of the hill. The cab of the truck was forced into the opposite bank, blocking the road. Traffic was diverted to the dirt road leading to the stone quarry. The highway was cleared for traffic late last night.

There was major damage to the truck and the car was totally demolished.

The Lakeview Disaster Car removed the injured man to the hospital. Klamath Falls towing firms helped remove the car.

Lumber Unions Spread Strike To Added Operations

Northwest lumber unions followed their rejection of a Timber Operators Council wage offer in Portland Thursday with a strike at all Pope and Talbot, Inc., operations in Oregon and Washington today.

The action by the International Woodworkers of America (IWA) and the Lumber and Sawmill Workers Union (LSW) idled another 970 workers, pushing the number out of work in the industry contract dispute to about 25,000.

Negotiations between the unions and the Timber Operators Council (TOC), of which Pope and Talbot is a member, were broken off Thursday after a wage increase offer of 26 cents an hour was rejected.

A TOC spokesman said the unions demanded 33 1/2 cents over a three-year period. That was the increase in an agreement with Simpson Timber Co. last Friday.

The TOC quoted union officials as saying they would close all 196 members of the employer organization, one by one, if necessary.

"The unions' decision to spread the strike would be regrettable," commented Karl F. Glos, executive vice president of the TOC. "Additional closures of mills in an effort to pressure settlement on the basis of unrealistic demands would only bring more hardship to workers and families and to many communities."

Pope and Talbot was the second TOC member to be struck in as many days. Edward Hines Lumber Co. plants at Westfir and

Dee, near Hood River, closed Thursday.

Scott Meeting Monday

Federal mediator LeRoy Smith said today only one more meeting has been scheduled in the industrial dispute which broke out over terms of contracts to replace those which expired June 1. That

is between the IWA and Scott Paper Co. in Portland Monday.

The strike today against Pope and Talbot idled 425 men in logging crews, a sawmill, particle board plant and veneer plant at Oakridge; 120 men at St. Helens plywood plant, and 140 at a saw-

mill at Port Gamble, Wash., the company said.

Dick Gillman, public relations official for Region 3 of the IWA, said a decision on which firms will be next would be made at a meeting of his union's regional advisory board in Portland Sunday.

Jury Declares Sheriff Not Guilty Of Charges

A circuit court jury deliberated eight hours and 32 minutes before returning a unanimous verdict for the acquittal of Sheriff Murray "Red" Britton, charged with permitting a prisoner to escape detention, at 2 a.m. this morning in the court of Judge Donald A. W. Piper.

The sheriff had been charged with releasing from custody a Poe Valley farmer, accused of the embezzlement of an animal, before

the defendant had posted bail. The Poe Valley man was later acquitted of the embezzlement charge.

The jury of eight women and four men began its deliberations at 3:30 p.m. yesterday and in halts cast throughout most of the evening the panel voted 8-4 for acquittal, a reliable source said.

At 1 a.m. following a ballot which resulted in the same vote,

the jury discussed the entire case and then voted unanimously for acquittal.

The four-day long trial started Monday and concluded late yesterday afternoon when the jury began its deliberations.

The incident involving the Poe Valley man occurred March 16, 1962, when he was indicted by the grand jury at the end of April and later pled not guilty to the charge.

Khrushchev Appeals To West For More Talks On Cold War

MOSCOW (UPI) — Soviet Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev appealed to the West today to follow up the partial nuclear test ban pact with new negotiations aimed at erasing cold war differences.

He pledged "there would be no shortage of goodwill on the Soviet side."

In a joint interview with the official government newspaper Izvestia and the official Communist party newspaper Pravda, Khrushchev said the Soviet Union, the United States and Britain should not rest now that a partial test ban treaty has been reached.

The Soviet leader said the treaty "ought to promote a general relaxation of international tension, thus creating favorable conditions for a solution of long-matured international problems."

But he warned that it did not end the arms race and could not by itself "avert the danger of war."

Appeals To West

"We appeal to the Western powers with a proposition—let us agree on all these questions," the Soviet leader said.

Emphasis NATO

He placed major emphasis on the conclusion of a non-aggression pact between the 15-nation North Atlantic Treaty Organization (NATO) and the eight-nation Communist Warsaw Pact organization.

"It should be a pact of peace among the nuclear powers," he said.

Khrushchev met today with Averell Harriman, chief U.S. negotiator at the concluded test ban talks.

Khrushchev listed a series of other points that could be negotiated.

He named them as:

—Freezing or diminishing of military budgets.

—Establishing of means to avert surprise attack.

—Liquidation of foreign troops in both West and East Germany.

—Exchange of Western and Soviet representatives to take up stations with Western troops in West Germany and Soviet troops in East Germany.

Before meeting Khrushchev, Harriman told newsmen that the West was able to conclude the historic nuclear treaty because the Soviet premier "very much wanted one at this time."
