

Spiritual Meeting, Dance Planned For Area Youths By LDS Church

Oregon's first "Youth Spectacular," a program initiated by the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, will be held in Klamath Falls on July 30 at the new National Guard Armory.

Beginning at 3 p.m., the all-day event will include a spiritual meeting with special guest speakers, dinner, and entertainment by a professional folk singing trio. The activities will be rounded out with a dance.

LDS youths will play host to an expected crowd of 500 young people between the ages of 14 and 21 from Klamath Falls, Lakeview, Tulelake, and Alturas. All youths in the area are invited to attend and may obtain tickets by calling TU 4-4879 or TU 2-2670. Tickets are \$1.

The program, sponsored by the Klamath Stake, is under the supervision of Ronald E. Phair, Stake president, and coordinated by two other local men holding positions in the Stake Presidency, Harold Catmull, counselor, and J. S. Humphries, mission president.

Along with providing a variety of entertainment, the purpose of the LDS Youth Spectacular is to "stimulate non-members to have a desire to learn more about the church" and to give members a greater testimony. Humphries said the spiritual portion of the spectacular will emphasize the church's mission program, showing what the young missionaries accomplish to create more interest in their work.

This year the LDS Church has conducted the spectacular on an experimental basis in three different sections of the West Coast, Humphries stated. With successful results, they have now been adopted as part of the church's regular program, and each area will sponsor such an event once a year. The local spectacular will be repeated in Ashland on July 31, also under the auspices of the Klamath Stake.

Jim "Bud" Deming of Lakeview will be the master of ceremonies for the opening session of the Youth Spectacular. The featured speakers will be W. Howard Allen of San Francisco and Hugh B. Brown of Salt Lake City.

Allen, who supervises more than 200 young missionaries as president of the Northern California Mission, will show a film explaining the church and its standards entitled "What Is A Mormon?" Brown is a former officer in the Canadian Army and industrialist who currently serves as counselor to David O. McKay, president of the LDS Church.

Following testimonials led by the Klamath Stake young people, dinner will be served by the combined MIA groups from the first and second wards of the local church.

The 3 Ds, a popular young trio of folk singers organized at Brigham Young University, will highlight the entertainment planned for the spectacular. Dick Davis, Denis Sorenson, and Duane Hiett, all of Utah, joined forces in 1960 and have toured over 100,000 miles in the United States, Canada, and the Orient to perform on television and before USO, college, civic, and church groups. They recently turned professional.

With a repertoire ranging from light comedy to folk and classical music, the trio writes, composes, and arranges many of its numbers. The young musicians also

The three musicians are all graduates of Brigham Young and have served as LDS missionaries. Denis served in Brazil, Dick in Alaska, and Duane in the Tonga Islands of the South Pacific.

They will also give testimonials during the program. The floor show scheduled for the dance will incorporate local talent, with an exhibition of three-dance performances by sev-

eral LDS youths who won a trip to a recent Salt Lake City dance exhibition. A close harmony quartet, composed of Gary and Ronnie Phair and Douglas and Elmo Keck, will sing several numbers, and Jan and Steve Humphries will present an organ and piano duet.

The dance, ending at 11 a.m., will feature disc jockey Bill Gardner at the turntable. The 3 Ds will present the grand finale to conclude the first Youth Spectacular.

TREAT
Cheese, potato and onion packets make a side dish treat for outdoor parties. Quarter 2 large peeled baking potatoes lengthwise. Place 1 quarter on each of 8 squares of aluminum foil, top each with 1 thin slice cut from a large Bermuda onion, and 1 tablespoon of butter.

Seal foil and cook on charcoal grill about 25 minutes. Open foil, top vegetables with 1 tablespoon each of crumbled blue cheese and return to grill about 5 minutes, until cheese melts.

BUILT-IN TASTE
Pickles are built right into new-style cheeseburgers. Lightly mix 1 pounds of ground beef with 1 teaspoon of salt, a dash of pepper, 1 tablespoon of sweet pickle liquid, and 2 tablespoons of finely chopped scallions. Shape into 4 patties and broil to taste. Two minutes before burgers are done, top each with 1 rounded tablespoon of chopped sweet mixed pickles and 1 slice of mozzarella cheese. Broil 2 minutes or until cheese melts. Serve with catsup on split, toasted buns.

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Church Officials Back Civil Rights Move

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Prominent representatives of the nation's three major religious faiths joined Wednesday in backing President Kennedy's full civil rights program as a moral and practical necessity.

They urged Congress to pass it immediately with a prayer that the racial struggle "will remain a social revolution and not degenerate into civil chaos."

The testimony was read before the House Judiciary subcommittee by Dr. Eugene Carson Blake, chief executive officer of the Presbyterian Church, U. S. A., who recently was arrested while taking part in an anti-segregation demonstration. He read a joint statement on behalf of himself, the Rev.

Pastor Gets New Church

Rev. C. O. Treman has been appointed pastor of the Calapooia Free Methodist Church, four miles west of Sutherlin, Ore. His appointment was announced at the Annual Oregon Conference of the Free Methodist Church held recently in Turner.

Minister of the Klamath Falls Free Methodist Church for the past six years, Reverend Treman is scheduled to begin his new pastorate on Sunday, Aug. 4.

A member of the South Dakota Conference, Rev. Ernie Franklin, was appointed pastor of the local church. He is expected to arrive within the next few weeks.

John F. Cronin of the National Catholic Welfare Council, and Rabbi Irwin M. Blank of Englewood, N. J., chairman of the Social Action Commission, Synagogue Council of America.

Blake said the "religious conscience of America condemns racism as blasphemy against God. It recognized that the racial segregation and discrimination that flow from it are a denial of the worth which God has given to all persons."

He said denial of the basic rights of the individual is immoral.

A number of national religious organizations joined with the clergymen in supporting the program and Blake said these groups and the Negro people also are aware of "the disabilities upon Spanish-speaking Americans, Indian Americans as well as upon people of Asian background" in the United States.

"There is growing dissatisfaction with gradualism and promises of future progress," Blake testified.

"There can be no further delay in keeping faith with the responsibility to put the principles we profess and the obligations that we acknowledge into action," he said.

The Presbyterian official said the President's civil rights message "clearly sets forth the need for legislation."

The statement defended each of the White House requests individually. It said the controversial request for a public accommodations law "is not a drastic step," nor is it an invasion of property rights as some have claimed.

Community Will Complete Final Details Of Chapel

CHRISTMAS VALLEY—A small rustic chapel, styled to harmonize with the Christmas Valley Lodge, is near completion. A gift of Carlo Giuntini, president of the M. Penn Phillips Company, the building is being constructed by Coy Amacker and Owen Holmes, builders.

Local residents will also have a part in readying the chapel for weekly services by finishing the interior with decorative paneling. The volunteer labor will be headed by Amacker and Holmes, with Fred Kennedy in charge of the painting.

The community church structure, the first to be built on the 20-acre site south of the lodge which was set aside for schools and churches, will seat about 30 people. It is designed of wood, with an exterior color scheme of brown with white trim.

Services will be conducted on an interdenominational basis. Ministers from several churches in the surrounding area will serve the chapel on alternate Sundays.

The first service, Seventh-day Adventist, will be conducted by Larrie Porter, a Christmas Valley resident.

Sites consisting of approximately two acres will be granted to any denomination interested in establishing a church here. Lutheran and Southern Baptist groups have indicated their intentions thus far.

New Christmas Valley residents have contributed both time and equipment to the chapel project, making it a real community endeavor. Virgil Hall cleared the site; Bob Byam's crew volunteered to lay a portion of the waterline; and Lakeview Building Materials donated some of the timbers for the roof structure.

A 1947 graduate of Concordia Seminary, St. Louis, Mo., Rev. Graef earned his bachelor of divinity degree at the seminary in 1949 and his master of theology degree at Pacific Lutheran Seminary, Tacoma, in 1959.

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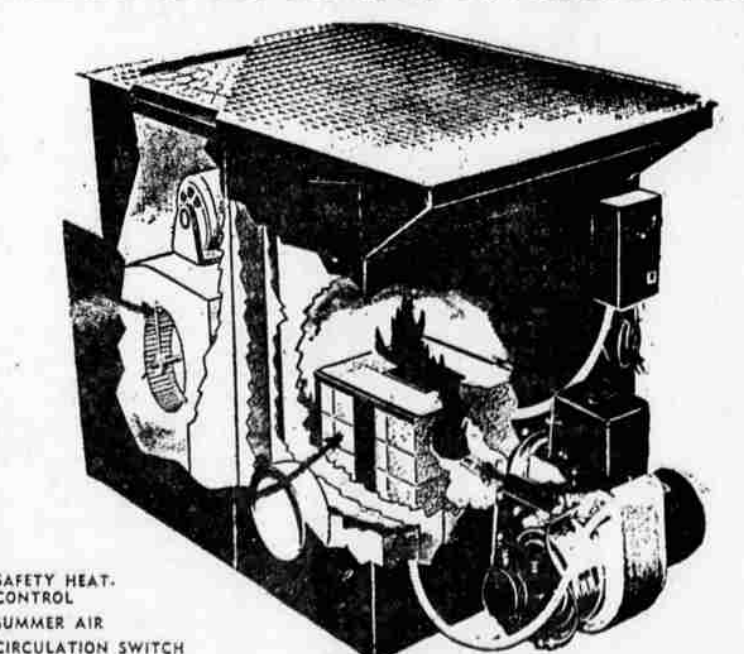
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
