Giant KBAA Track Meet Set Saturday At Modoc

The Klamath Basin Athletic Association is putting on what is expected to be the largest track meet ever held in Klamath Falls Saturday with an All-Corner meet which will cap off part of a summer program and aid the KBAA in selecting a team to take to the Emerald Empire Games in Eugene in early August.

Some of the participants in the Saturday meet will be selected to go to the Eugene (EAAA) meet Aug. 3-4, on the basis of their showing Saturday while others might be named from their past performances in the twice weekly meets that have been held.

The biggest field ever run is expected by KBAA officials for this giant meet. It is for anyone interested who would like to run. There is something for boys 6 and under up to adults who wish to enter.

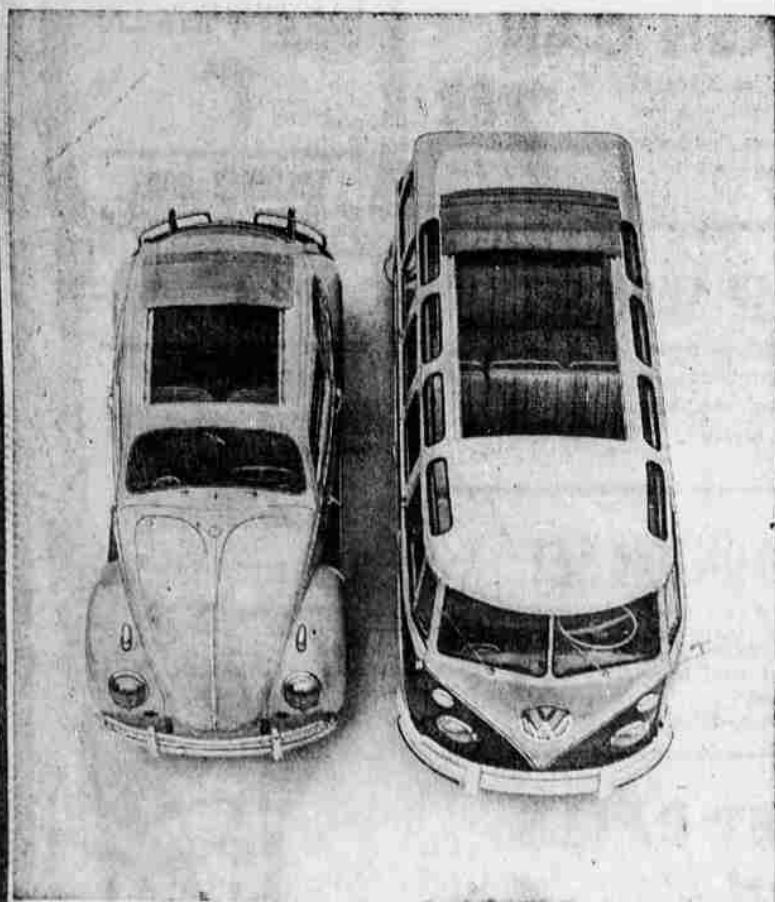
There will be a 25 cent entry fee for those entering which will cover ribbons. Everyone entering the meet will get a ribbon. The first five places will receive ribbons and those who do not competitors ribbons. No entry goes away without a ribbon. 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Semifinal Round Slated Tonight

The National All-Stars, after having considerable trouble Wednesday night in the opener, showed its power Thursday night in the second round game of the District One Babe Ruth Tournament at Gem Stadium by rocking the East All-Stars of the South Suburban Babe Ruth League, 19-2. The West Stars remained in contention in the losers' bracket with a 14-5 win over the American Stars, knocking them from the tournament.

The Nationals, after winning a somewhat controversial game from the West Stars in the opener, 15-14, left no doubt about the outcome of this game Thursday night as they sent 19 batters to the plate in the first inning and tallied 15 runs. The game was eventually cut short to five innings.

Today's action will pit the Nationals against the heavy-hitting Cal-Ore Stars from Lakeview-Astoria in the second game. The first game will pit the West Stars against the East Stars.

Thus far there have been an amazing 90 runs scored in four games measuring 24 innings of baseball. That averages out to 22.5 runs per game so there isn't any lack of action on the diamond.

The West dumped the Americans in the first game Thursday night with Mike Milligan going the distance on the mound and getting the win on a six-hit walk. He struck out six and walked only three. John Crawford opened for the American Stars and finally gave way to Jim Bridges. Crawford absorbed the loss.

The West opened with four runs in the first frame on a walk to John Ferrell, a hit by Mike Long, Tom Osa, Milligan and Larry Ward for the four runs. The Americans had two runs in the first on a walk to Jim Meyers, a hit by Jim Drew and a hit by Bridges.

The American Stars knotted the game and went ahead in the third. They scored one in the second and went ahead with two in the third off a hit by Drew, Crawford and Ruben Aldinger for the runs. But that was all they got for the night.

The West Star roared back with six runs in the fourth to go ahead to stay. Long singled, Jim Goodman singled, Osa doubled and Milligan was safe on an error. Steve Hammill was safe on a fielder's choice and Ward singled but was cut down going to second. Nolan Ferrell laced a pinch hit single and Barry Hacker walked. A fielder's choice scored the last run.

Stars Lose Game To Bears

EVANSTON, Ill. (UPI) — The College All-Stars returned to serious training today for their Aug. 2 clash with the Green Bay Packers, heartened by a close one-point loss in their first clash with a National Football League team.

The Chicago Bears outscored the Collegians 13-12 in a scrimmage Thursday at the Bears' training camp at Bensenville, Ill. The winning point came on a conversion kick by Roger Le Clerc.

The scrimmage was comprised of 144 offensive plays, equally divided between the two teams. There were no kick-offs or punts.

A pair of field goals by Bob Jencks of Miami of Ohio put the All-Stars in front in the second period. Jencks booted field goals from the 17 and 30 yard lines.

Rudy Bakich, quarterbacking for the Bears, flipped a pass to end Mike Ditka, who in turn lateralized to Charley Blivins for an 11-yard touchdown run.

Le Clerc missed the kick for the extra point, but succeeded in the fourth period after Bill Wade's 16-yard scoring pass to Ditka.

Falcons Tackle Roseburg Saturday

The Klamath Falcons begin another rugged series tonight when they will journey to Roseburg to battle the Lockwood Motors American Legion team in a Legion playoff game, the first of a best-of-three series.

The second game will return to Klamath Falls and Gem Stadium Sunday night at 8:30. The third game, if needed, will be in Roseburg Monday night at 8:30.

Tonight's game will be the first of the set of three against the champions. Roseburg has built up a splendid record in the past years as a Legion team. Klamath, however, has had its good years, also, and this appears to be one of the better ones.

The Falcons sewed up the right to meet the Lockwood Motors group by downing Brookings in straight games, 10-4 and 14-1. This will be the first playoff game for the Roseburg group.

Catch John Paxton probably will open tonight's action with Rich Jackson on the hill. Jackson, the fire-balling right hander, has had some arm trouble this rather cool summer but says he is ready to go now. He has a 5-2 record. He has hurled 48 innings and given up only eight earned runs for a very respectable 1.42 earned run average. He has allowed only 23 hits in those 48 innings and has struck out 64. He has given up 21 walks.

In addition to which Jackson is the leading hitter on the team with a sparkling .452 average. He has an 11-game hitting streak going.

Hawkins Setting Pace In Tourney

CHICAGO (UPI) — Golf pro Fred Hawkins was in a familiar spot today, he hoped the road would take a different turn to a new ending Sunday.

Hawkins, on the pro tour for sixteen years with only one victory, was the first round pace setter in the \$50,000 Western Open with a four under par 67 on the thickly roughed, heavily wooded Beverly Country Club course.

It was the same position he held at the same milepost of the same tournament on Medinah No. 3 course last year. But last year he sagged to a third place tie, earning only \$3,073, when young Jack Cupit, one stroke behind after 18 holes, came from behind for the \$11,000 first prize after 72 holes.

Today Hawkins held a one stroke margin over three players heading into the second round, 48 year old Skeet Reigel, 27-year-old Joe Campbell, and 25-year-old Australian Bruce Devlin. The field was bunched tight behind them with eight players at 69, among them the Masters and PGA champion Jack Nicklaus.

Hawkins held first place by virtue of almost sensational putting on an erratic trip around the

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
